SAN ANTONIO PUBLIC LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS

SYSTEM-WIDE HIGHLIGHTS

Pop Madness, the Library's annual free, all-ages pop culture convention, was held at Central Library on March 8, 2025, from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM. This year's featured guest was actor Paul Scheer, best known for his roles in *The League* and *30 Rock*. The event was a tremendous success, drawing a crowd of 2,750 attendees—a 60% increase from 2024. The 2025 convention featured sixty-six exhibitors and presenters. New additions this year included a cosplay contest specifically for tweens. Additionally, the introduction of City of San Antonio Employee Volunteers proved highly effective, providing the extra support needed to help the event run smoothly.

LIBRARY DIRECTOR ACTIVITIES

The new Director of the San Antonio Public Library officially began her tenure on March 3, 2025. Her first day included a warm welcome from Assistant City Manager David McCary and Library Board Chair Juspreet Kaur, followed by a meet-and-greet breakfast with the Library's Senior Management Team—a meaningful opportunity to begin building relationships with key leaders across the system.

On March 5, the Director attended the Book Appetite Literary Lunch Feast, featuring acclaimed author Salman Rushdie. During the event, she reconnected with former Library Director Ramiro Salazar, and the two later toured several work units at the Central Library, offering her a closer look at daily operations.

March 8 marked her first Pop Madness event at the Central Library. The event was lively and engaging, and she enjoyed meeting staff and exploring more of the facility during the day's festivities.

The SAPL Town Hall meetings took place on March 12 and 13, with Assistant City Manager McCary delivering opening remarks and Assistant Director Dale McNeill serving as moderator. The sessions were well-attended, drawing 117 participants on Wednesday and 122 on Thursday.

On March 17, the Director attended the 2024 Veteran of the Year ceremony in support of Arland Schnacker, a Librarian I with Texana and the honored recipient. It was a proud moment for the Library and a moving recognition of Arland's service.

Later that week, on March 19, he participated in the San Antonio Public Library Foundation's Board meeting, followed by the Las Palmas Branch Library Art Selection Panel on March 20. The panel, hosted in collaboration with the Department of Arts and Culture, focused on selecting an artist for a new public art piece at the Las Palmas Branch Library.

On March 22, she attended two community-focused events: the Play and Learn program at the Central Library—a joint effort between SAPL and the Department of Human Services—and the Friends of the

San Antonio Public Library meeting at the Johnston Branch Library. Both events provided valuable opportunities to connect with families, partners, and supporters from across the city.

PERFORMANCE HIGHLIGHTS

Almost five million library materials have been checked out this fiscal year to date, which exceeds the FY25 target by three percent. Year to date circulation is 160,000 more than the same time period last year. Over 900,000 hours of technology use has occurred, which is below the year-to-date target by nineteen percent. Year to date hours of technology is 204,000 fewer hours than the same time period last year. Starting in June 2024, new equipment and software was deployed after FY25 target development and data is reported differently. The number of in-person library visits for the year to date is over one and a half million, which is above target by nine percent. Year to date visits is 122,000 more than the same time period last year due to several library locations serving as venue for the Presidential election.

MEDIA HIGHLIGHT

On March 6, SAPL was a featured guests on KSAT's SA Live to promote Pop Madness. The segment featured several guest cosplayers, SAPL mascot Smarty, and an in-studio interview with Pop Madness program organizer and Tobin Branch Library at Oakwell Librarian Rhonda Woolhouse.

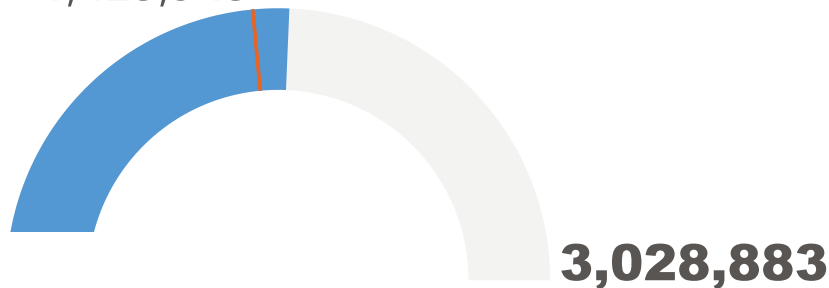

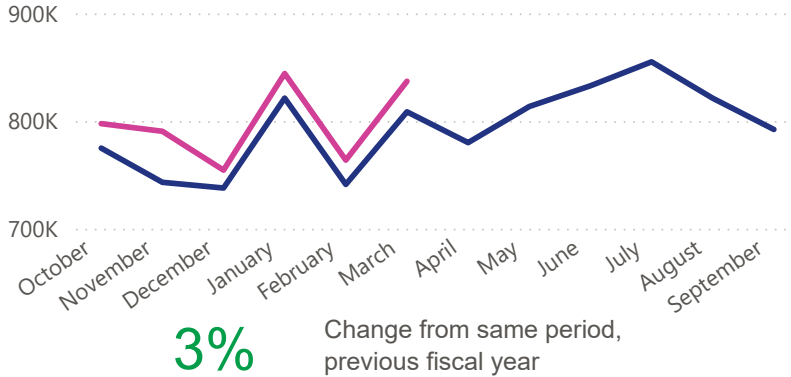

The total circulation of library materials of both physical and digital formats.

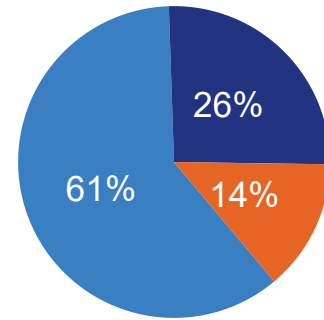

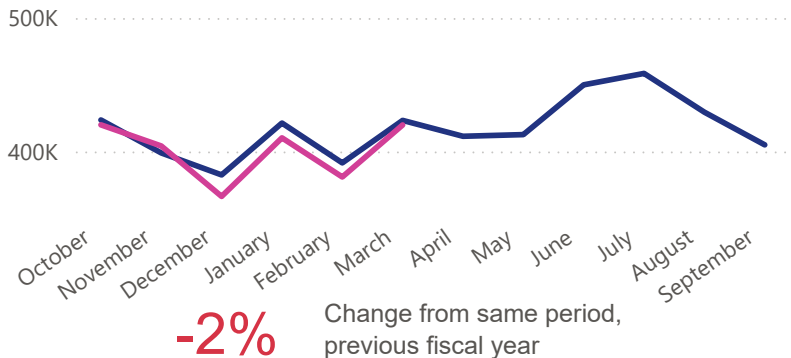


FY25 year to date Physical Circulation

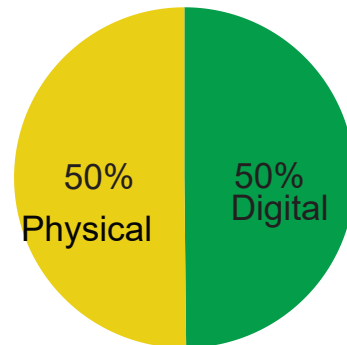

FY25 to date total circulation by type

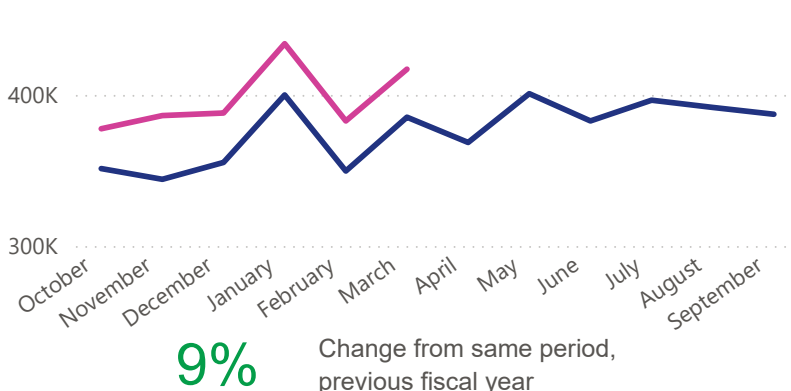


FY25 year to date Digital Circulation

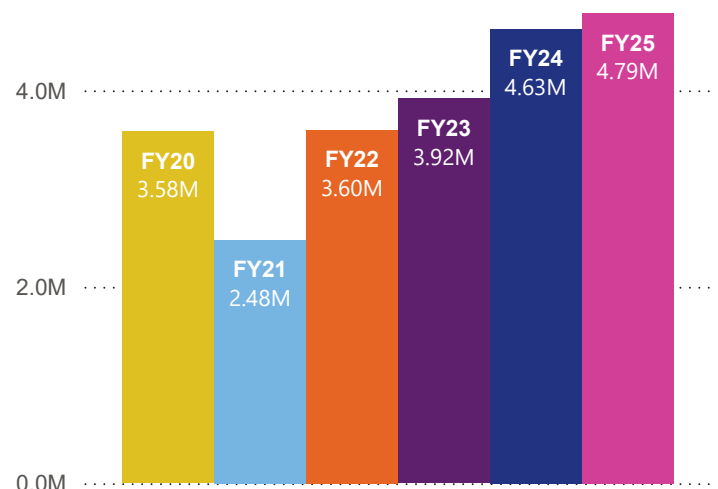

Year to date total circulation comparison

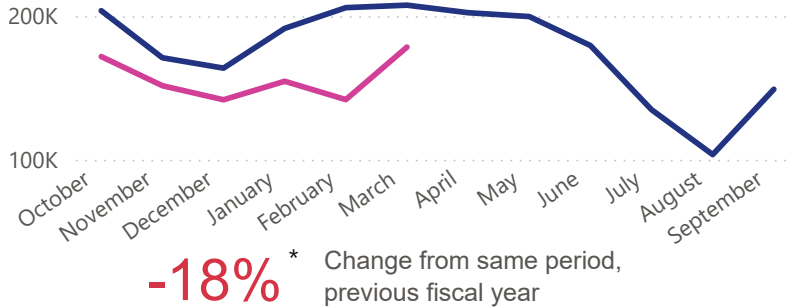

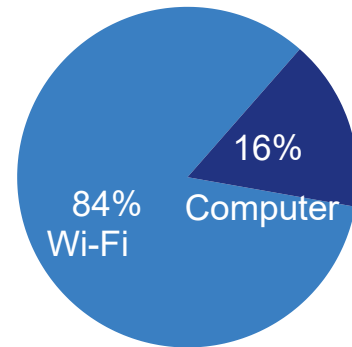

FY25 to date Technology Use by type



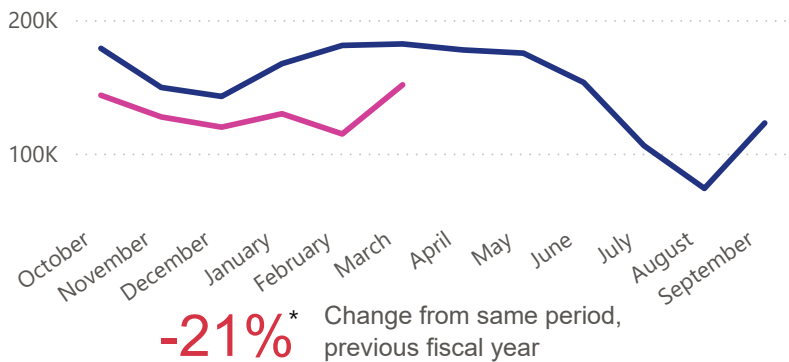

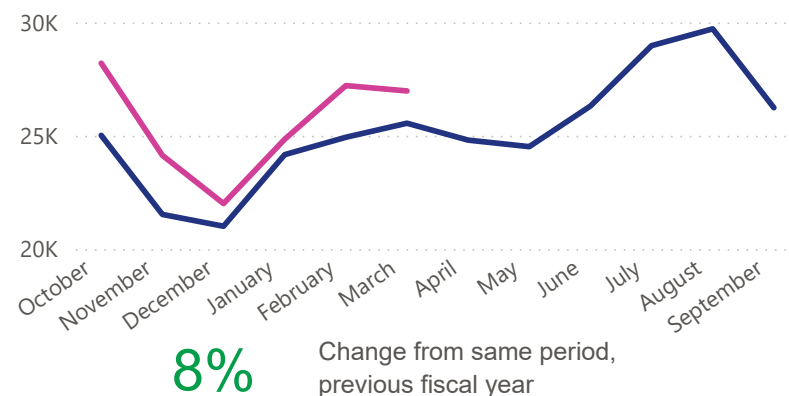


FY25 year to date Computer Hours

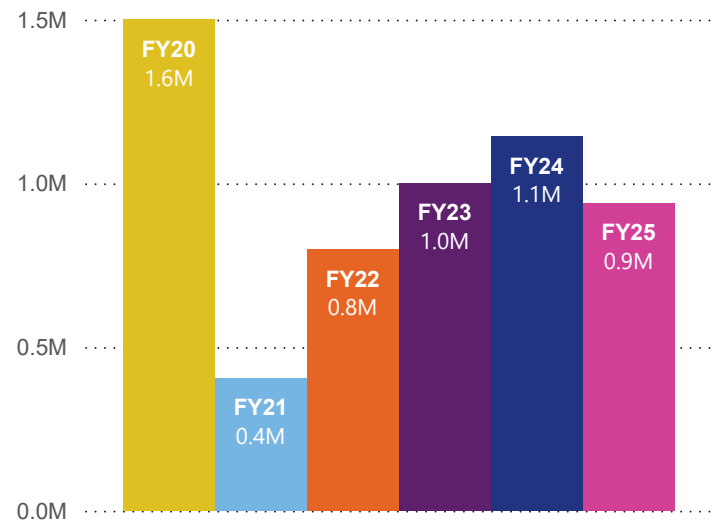

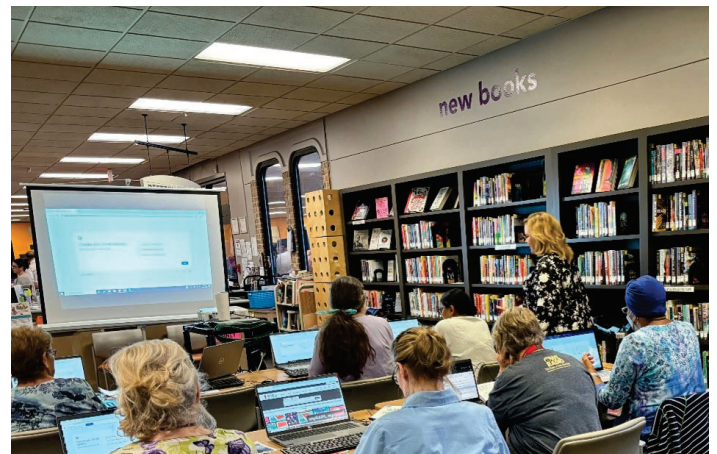

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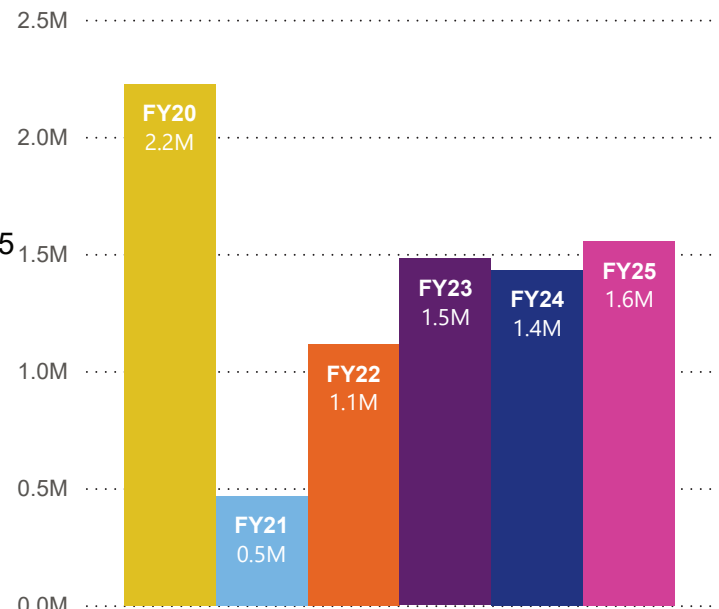

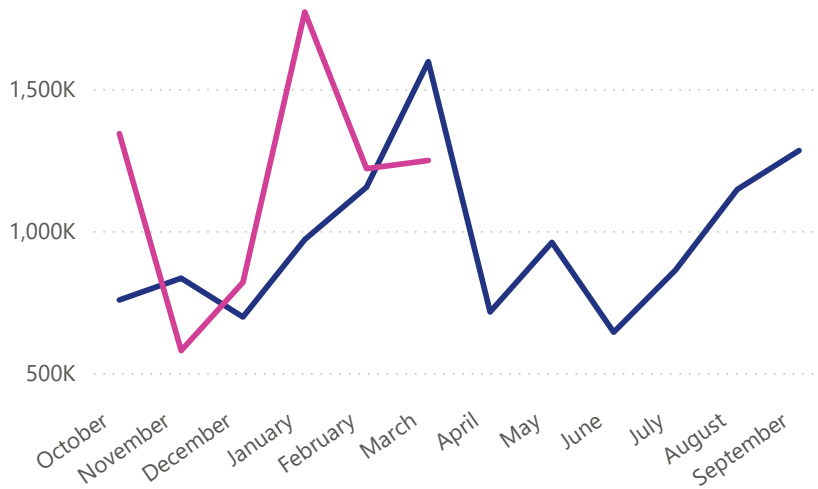

FY25 year to date Marketing Engagements

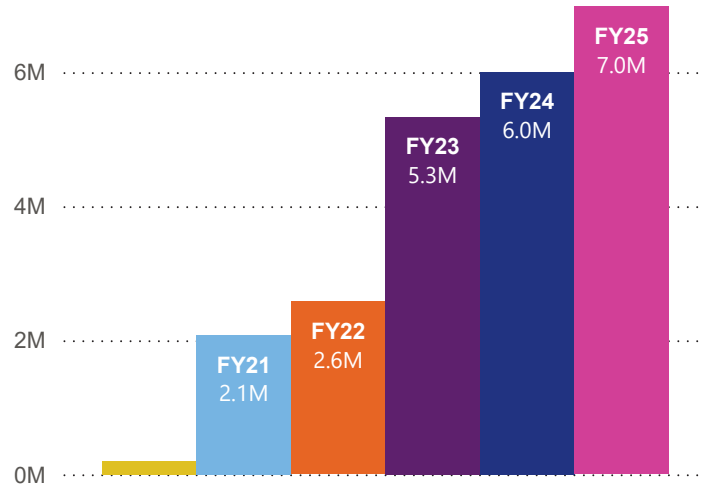

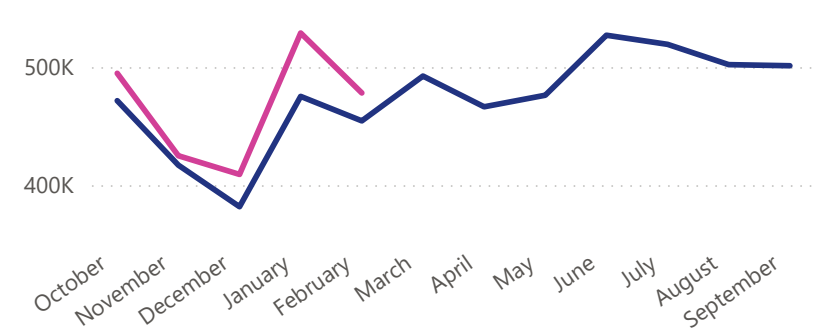

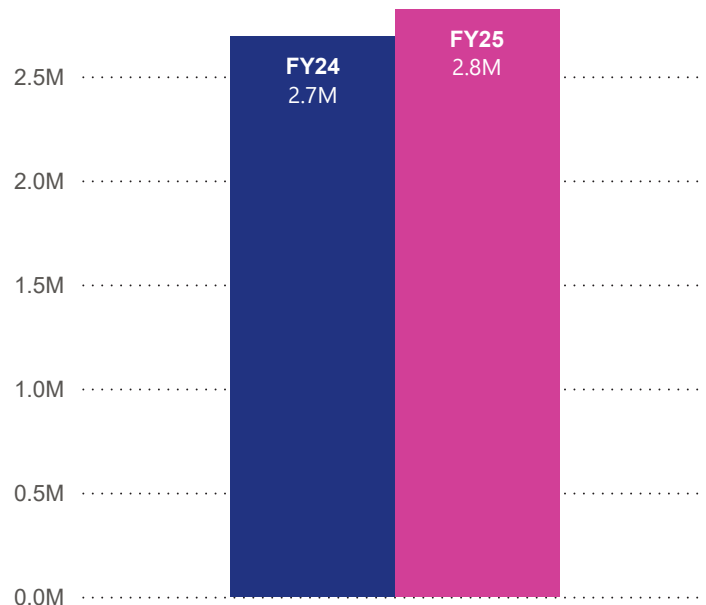

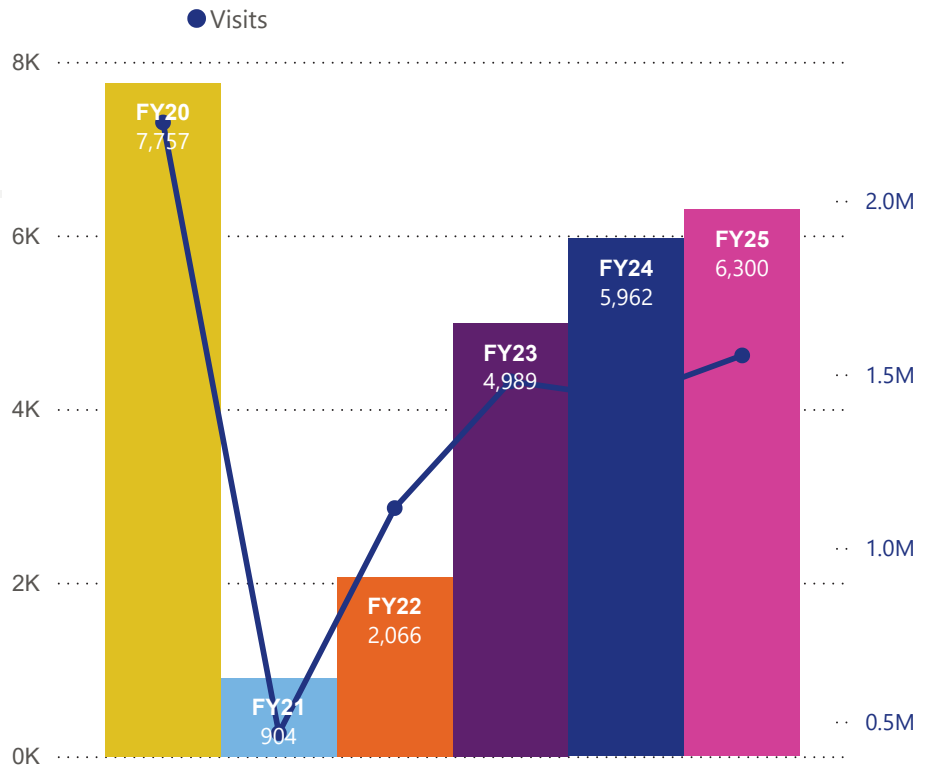

II. SYSTEMWIDE SERVICES

LATINO COLLECTION AND RESOURCE CENTER

On March 6, the Latino Collection & Resource Center (LCRC) partnered with Gemini Ink to present a special “after library hours” event in Central Library’s art gallery space. The event was titled Floricantos y Tumbaos: A Panel on Latinx Music in Poetry.

On March 13, the LCRC partnered with Cresencia Huff, Coordinator of Childrens Services to present and sponsor two presentations, highlighting author Steena Hernandez’s book, *Lupita’s Brown Ballet Slippers*. The first

presentation took place at Westfall Library, then later that day at Encino Library.

On March 18, in coordination with Trinity University and the Cesar E. Chavez Legacy and Educational Foundation (CECLEF), the LCRC presented two programs in honor of Cesar Chavez holiday. At noon, filmmaker, and Cesar’s grandson Eduardo Chavez, joined library community for a luncheon in the LCRC event space. Later that day, the LCRC hosted a round table discussion about Cesar Chavez’s legacy on community organizing, which included Trinity University Alumni, members of CECLEF and was moderated by local activist/musician, Joaquin Muerte.

On March 22, the LCRC hosted poet Violeta Garza, who guided attendees through a writing workshop titled, “Loving Los 13 Aires Cósmicos”. The workshop was based on the wisdom of indigenous cultures in ancient México, helping folks address the various emotions — cosmic airs — which can create imbalance in our bodies.

On March 26, Cresencia Huff and the LCRC presented a Cartonera Workshop — cardboard books — for library staff. The workshop was led by educator Jesse Gainer and was presented to staff for future programming initiatives.

LEARN AT SAPL

Learn at SAPL welcomed over 1,100 patron visits and oversaw more than 1,400 hours of public computer use this month. Learn at SAPL staff hosted 55 public programs, including instruction in English, Spanish, and American Sign Language as new languages.

Programs extended beyond the Library walls with outreach to several community partners. Learn at Memorial Adult Educators Daniel Gomez and Adult Education Program Manager Michelle Rickman presented “Beyond Books: Library Services for Adults” to older adults at Bethel Nutrition Center. Ms. Rickman also coordinated a site visit to the Divine Women community with Learn at McCreless Adult

Educators Lodie Mueller and Christina Flores and connected with leadership from adult literacy organization Each One Teach One. Learn at Central staff members Daniel Gonzalez and Francisco Rodriguez visited the San Antonio Clubhouse during their “Welcome Week” to encourage members and offer strategies for job retention.

A new “Citizenship Corner” at Central Library took shape this month, with the support of Central Information Services Manager Emerson Stanley, Library Assistant Eliza Perez, LCRC Program Manager Sarah De La Rosa, Access Services Manager Sarah Linley, and Learn at Johnston Adult Educator Shauna Mendoza. The display features free





informational materials, and SAPL books for borrowing around the topics of immigration, language learning, and American history.

Finally, Adult Education Program Manager Michelle Rickman began teaching “Family ESL” at Cody and Igo branch libraries. The weekly program caters to adult English as a Second Language learners who are caregivers, and their children. The class brings together students of all ages on the northwest side, with an active and encouraging approach to family literacy.

LITTLE READ WAGON

The Little Read Wagon is the San Antonio Public Library's (SAPL) early literacy outreach team. The team's work promotes early literacy and connects families with the library. The team held a Pequeño Pop-Up

Play program on March 11th at Elmendorf Lake Park. The Pequeño Pop-Up Play programs are designed to promote nearby libraries. While at the park, the team promoted the Bazan, Memorial, and Collins Garden Branch Libraries.

Children's Librarians. Hope Sonnen from the Bazan Branch and Melissa Fulmer from the Memorial Branch were able to attend the program and talk to families. The team distributed




flyers for programs and services at the nearby SAPL branches. Children and families who attended the program spent time playing together. They made giant bubbles. They used mortars and pestles to grind chalk. They used their imagination to create artwork at the makerspace. They played on the splash pad. It was a gorgeous day for a program. The team had 98 people attend the program.

The team continues to offer a weekly Let's Play! program at the Mission Branch Library on Wednesdays. This month, a mom who attended the program for the first time with her children thanked the staff for offering the program. She said, "We live in a small apartment with no outdoor space, so coming here to play and explore is a dream!" The team sets up open-ended play materials in the courtyard and in the meeting room of the branch. Children build with giant magnetic building blocks. They make marks with chalk. They mix and measure sand in the nature play kitchen. During Spring Break 200 people attended the Let's Play at Mission! program. The team advocates for play because it is essential for healthy child development. When children play, they build healthy brains and bodies.

TEXANA

Librarian Arland Schnacker II was honored this month as a recipient of the 2024 Veterans of the Year award. Schnacker is one of seven veterans selected from community nominations that received this honor from the City of San Antonio's Veteran Advisory Commission and Military and Veteran Affairs Department. Recognized for his exceptional service to fellow veterans and the community, Schnacker regularly organizes library programs focused on serving veterans and their families.

As part of the Organizational Health Unit's offerings of staff development trainings, Librarian Andy Crews led an online presentation that focused on the HeritageQuest and Ancestry Library Edition databases. The March 14 presentation illustrated information that can be found using these genealogy resources and how they can aid staff in answering patrons' questions. Librarian Deborah Countess led the online class "Genealogy Databases: Using NewspaperArchive" on March 15. The presentation went over how to structure research queries and browse through the digitized newspapers available from all over the United States.

In celebration of Women's History Month, Librarian/Archivist Sylvia Reyna led the cemetery tour "Women and Their Significant Others Buried at San Antonio's Eastside Historic Cemeteries" in

partnership with the City's Parks and Recreation Department. Ms. Reyna led the enthusiastic group through Alamo Masonic and City Cemeteries #1 and #3. To close-out Women's History Month, Librarian Lucy Agado hosted the Bexar County Historical Commission's Dr. Erika Arredondo-Haskins presentation "Legacy of Influence: Honoring the Women of SAISD" at the Central Library on March 29. Accompanying her presentation was a six-panel traveling exhibition she developed and that highlighted her research on women who

had schools named for them within the San Antonio Independent School District (SAISD). Many of these Texas women helped transform education and shape the earliest schools in our city.

III. AGE-BASED SERVICES



CHILDREN'S

Children's Services, with leadership from Children's Library at Central staff Ashley Palacios and Mary Elizabeth Hernandez contributed substantially to the success of the March 8 Pop Madness event hosted at Central Library. Activities specifically for children included a two-hour bubble party on the West Terrace, family escape rooms, an instrument petting zoo, and sticker-making. The event drew people from across the city, and a line for the bubble party started forming more than 30 minutes before the terrace opened.

Cresencia Huff, Coordinator of Children's Services, was interviewed for a news story on Library-hosted family activities during spring break. While most weekly activities continued, there were some special additions in consideration of the children who would be out of school for the week. Tobin Library at Oakwell hosted a STEAM Fest. The event organized by Tobin Branch Library at Oakwell Children's Librarian Lisa Ramirez was supported by staff from multiple locations and included multiple science demonstrations and a printing activity. The Westfall and Encino Branch Libraries hosted an author talk with movement activity highlighting a recently released story, *Lupita's Brown Ballet Slippers* by Steena Hernandez. Ms. Hernandez is a local author and, with coordination by Latino Collection and Resource Center Program Manager Sarah De La Rosa, teamed up with local dancer Tanesha Payne.

On March 22 Children's Services and Central Library hosted Family Learn & Play Day. This was the fourth year the Library partnered with the City of San Antonio's Department of Human Services Head Start Program to host a special event for families of young children. Attendees engaged in child-led play, art, drumming, and gathering information from community partners. This was the first year to host at a Library instead of a park. The event brought in over 600 people, including many who had not been to Central Library before or in recent years.

TEENS

This month, Teen Services focused on planning, outreach, volunteer recognitions and young poets: Teen Volunteers Teen Librarians completed "Active Volunteer" forms to inventory the number of teens donating time throughout the system. The count of active volunteers will help the Teen Engagement workgroup with distribution of teen volunteer branded water bottles to be distributed for upcoming Volunteer Appreciation Week.





Teen Services has participated with San Japan, an annual event celebrating Japanese culture, anime, gaming, and cosplay, since its inception in 2008. This event has since become one of the largest anime conventions in Texas. Teen Services will be represented on the San Japan Committee by Molly Pruitt Library at Roosevelt High School Teen Librarian Sarah Phillips and Encino Branch Library Teen Librarian Elissa Vura.

Young Pegasus Poetry Competition judges completed their selection of poems for this year's anthology. Just under 1000 poems were considered for publication with a strong showing from teens in this year's submissions. Selected poets will be contacted via email, and a public announcement will be made during National Poetry Month in April. Work on the print anthology is underway in coordination with Giselle Weyte of Communications. The Young Pegasus Celebration will take place on Sunday, May 5.

Forty designs were submitted by teens for consideration for the 2025 teen summer t-shirt design. The image will appear on t-shirts and other promotional material for the teen portion of Summer with SAPL. Teens in all library locations, including Discord, will vote on their preferred design. This represents the 5th year teens will design and select the image to be used for their summer program. Voting concluded at the end of March and the selected design will be announced in May.

Teen Services' monthly meeting took place on Wednesday, March 19 at the Teen Library at Central. This month's training was conducted by Nohemi Lopez-Rosdahl from Collection Development and consisted of hands-on training for weeding and dealing with duplicate titles in the respective YA collections. The April Teen Services meeting will take place at Johnston Branch.

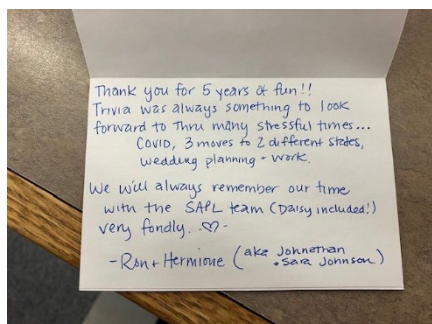

ADULTS

Pop Madness 2025 was held on Saturday, March 8, at Central Library and welcomed 2,750 attendees — a 60% increase from 2024 and a return to pre-pandemic attendance levels. The event featured 66 exhibitors and presenters, with consistent participation in all areas throughout the day. Highlights included a standing-room-only panel with actor and comedian Paul Scheer, whose meet-and-greet drew a line stretching across the second floor. The local film showcase at LaunchSA drew steady crowds. All three cosplay contests — tween, which was offered for the first time in 2025, teen, and adult — saw

enthusiastic participation and large audiences. Approximately 200 – 300 people lined up before the library opened, reflecting strong community anticipation. The Library’s Communications Office implemented an extensive promotional campaign, including local media appearances, social media outreach, and e-newsletters. The new addition of City of San Antonio Employee Volunteers helped provide added support throughout the day, contributing to the event’s energetic and well-received return.





SAPL Live Trivia concluded its nearly five-year run with a final online session on March 28, 2025.

Launched in May 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic, the program was created by Brooke Mjolsness, Vicky Villalobos, Maria Adams, Dan Garcia, and Morgan Yoshimura as a virtual alternative to in-person events. Held monthly, it consistently drew both returning and new participants, offering a fun, engaging way for adults to connect. Even after in-person programming resumed, the event maintained strong attendance and community support. Over the years, the team created 249 themed trivia categories and celebrated annual anniversaries with loyal attendees. As staff capacity to support this program declined, the team made the tough decision to end the program. The final session featured 17 teams and a warm farewell, closing a well-loved chapter in SAPL’s virtual programming for adults.

OLDER ADULTS

Molly Pruitt Library at Roosevelt High School Adult Services Librarian Hannah Johnson led two offsite programs for older adults at the Walzem Family YMCA during March 2025. On March 12, she facilitated a book club discussion where attendees also voted on future reading selections. She returned on March 18 to lead a Spring Collage Cards arts and crafts session, providing supplies, creative examples, and themed books from the library’s collection. Library cards were also issued to participants interested in borrowing materials. These outreach efforts brought meaningful library engagement to older adults and addressed accessibility barriers caused by Pruitt’s limited weekday hours, which often make it difficult for this audience to attend onsite programs.

In March 2025, Parman Branch Library at Stone Oak continued hosting its popular weekly Qi Gong classes for older adults, held every Thursday at noon. Led by certified Qi Gong and Tai Chi instructor Catalina Gonzalez, these sessions promote stress relief, balance, and overall wellness through gentle, meditative movements. Open to all experience levels, the classes offer a welcoming space for older adults to stay active and engaged. This program reflects the library's ongoing commitment to offering diverse health and wellness opportunities that meet the needs of its community.

Karen Braeuler of the San Pedro Branch Library facilitated an offsite book club for older adults at Chandler Senior Living on Friday, March 7, 2025. The program allowed participants to engage in thoughtful literary discussion and receive distributed reading materials. Designed to support continued access to library services for individuals in residential communities, this initiative provided valuable enrichment for patrons who may face challenges in visiting a library location. The session demonstrated the library's dedication to connecting with older adults where they are and fostering community engagement through accessible, offsite programming.

They coordinated with Classical Music Institute, Goldfish Swim School, and Parks and Recreation to table the event and created the very popular Children's Haunted Escape Room, as well as passive origami activities and photo ops. Assistant Manager Shannon Seglin's popular weekly Family Story Time featured a pasta-themed program with an oversized bowl of "spaghetti and meatballs" for children to jump into!

The Teen Library continues to see an average of 60 teens after school on weekdays and teen regulars on Saturdays. As always, teens take ownership of the Teen Library by developing, leading, and engaging in activities that speak to their interests. During March, teens new to the Teen Library visited and participated in activities led by teen volunteers, such as making flower cakes and going on a scavenger hunt for 3D printed dice in the book stacks. In addition, an art class from Reagan High School visited the Central Library for a tour — particularly, to look at the Chihuly sculpture — after visiting Caliente Hot Glass studio. The students also received library cards.

Information Services Librarian Sheran Awe hosted a lively Spring Break Silent Disco program with fellow colleagues. Patrons enjoyed dancing, making glow-in-the-dark art, and playing Jenga. The program consisted of three different music genres: Throwback Hip-hop and R&B, Pop, and Disco. Eliza Perez and Valerie Saucedo from Information Services welcomed Ana Camacho Espiritu, co-founder and co-organizer of the San Anto Zine Fest, for a special Women's History Month takeover of Zine Lab Monthly. Espiritu's workshop explored uncommon practices in zine production, design, assemblage and distribution and showcased examples by different women. Patrons enjoyed making unique creations. Information Services staff Pannaga Prasad and Patricia Perez offered the program, "Explore Vegetarian Dishes: Make Yogurt, Yogurt Lassi & More". The audience learned how to prepare cultural dishes through a live demonstration and savored yogurt lassi samples.

Central Learn Adult Educator Daniel González and Library Assistant Francisco Rodriguez visited the San Antonio Clubhouse to provide a presentation on “How to Keep a Job” to the members of the Clubhouse. Adult Educator Denise Cadena continues weekly visits to Darner Senior Nutrition Center with two branch Adult Educators to provide technology help. The weekly Bilingual Computers y Creative Learning is an informal computer class taught by Daniel González and Learn Library Assistant Brianna Glass. The class is situated around the patron learner, highlighting their strengths, and using zines to capture what they learn during the class. One recurring patron has over twenty years of typewriting experience but was curious about how to use the mouse and navigate the internet. Over the course of four classes, she has shown progress in how expertly she navigates the internet.

Alcorta researched different options and moved a table lamp into the space, acquired a beautiful new standing chandelier lamp to match the aesthetics of the branch, and rearranged the seating and table arrangements to provide more versatile accommodations for patrons needing a peaceful space to read or work. The immediate positive feedback from patrons highlights the impact libraries can have when being attentive and responsive to patron suggestions, and reinforces the idea that libraries are here to serve the community.

The project incorporated new SAPL branding, increased consistency across locations, and improved the user experience. Re-designed signage at San Pedro included both adult and children’s areas. Additionally, staff revamped the community bulletin board to better showcase both library programs and community information. Staff also featured community resources for the public that included information on shelters, food, hygiene, and medical assistance.

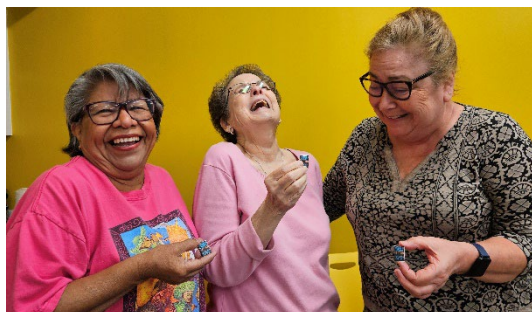

She not only read "Chester Van Chime Who Forgot How to Rhyme," by Avery Monsen, she also got to announce one of the four finalists and speak to local media about the importance of early childhood literacy.

Cortez Branch Library continues to hold impactful teen programs which allow teens use their space and form community with their peers. The library's Young Adult (YA) collection encourages patrons to interact with the mysterious "blind date" book displays. This allows patrons to borrow books without knowing their titles, while giving them a chance to keep the specially designed book covers they are wrapped in. During spring break, Cortez Teen Services Librarian Ciana Flores invited teens to celebrate Pi Day on March 14, by sampling a variety of pies in honor of the mathematical constant. The wide range of experience and age will allow for people to gather learn, interact, and gain new experiences through a mutual love of Magic: The Gathering. The first event was held on March 14th with a "Bring Your Own Card" policy. In addition, the library provided a small selection of cards available for participants to use on a first-come first-served basis from the library's own collection. Ms. Piña and Mr. Mertz intend to continue the program into the following months.

Potranco Branch Library

Teen participation at Potranco Branch Library continues to be vibrant, with weekly Teen Time an example of how library programming builds community. Attendees come from various educational backgrounds and include multiple homeschooled teens and students from at least six different high schools in three different school districts. Teen Time gives teens an opportunity to interact with peers outside their usual circle. Teens sometimes even seek further connection by sharing contact information and planning get togethers outside the library. This type of community building is especially impactful to individuals that are new to San Antonio. For example, one Teen Time volunteer recently moved to the United States of America and is an English language learner. One of her express purposes for volunteering at the library is to strengthen her language skills. She has become an integral part of Teen Time, gaining enough confidence in her communication skills to teach card games from her home country to the group.

In March, Potranco Branch Library began offering a program called Inner Peace for Teens. This program provides an alternative to the oftentimes boisterous Teen Time, providing a quieter, meditative atmosphere for teens to gather and decompress after school. Soft music, muted lighting, and scented diffused oil set the mood, and attendees can choose from activities like coloring books, watercolors, or guided meditations. A teen volunteer initiated the program after seeing a need among her peers for a time and place to just “be,” where teens can socialize or not, but still feel supported and included. The volunteer leading the program plans to attend college next fall in hopes of becoming a child psychologist. This new program provides her an opportunity to share her interests and skills while promoting mental health among young people. For the Potranco community, it provides a way for introverted or introspective teens to engage with the library and each other.

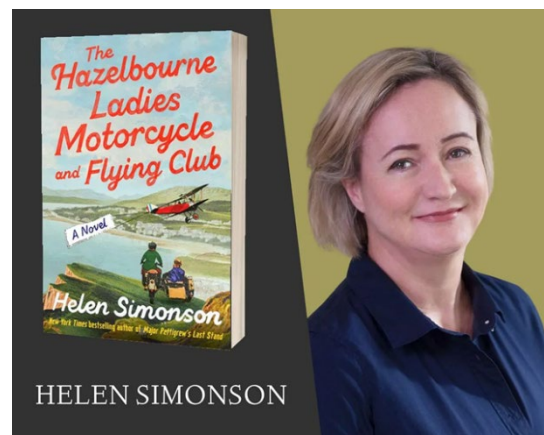

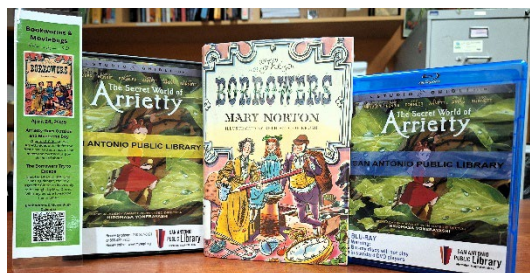

Preschool Story Time attendees were treated to a very special art project in March, themed around “The Yellow Bus” by Loren Long. This picture book portrays the life cycle of a school bus, showing the many ways that the vehicle can be reused and repurposed. Library Assistant Nicole Jacob read the book aloud to a group of 63 attendees — 36 children and 27 adults — and then the project was revealed. Igo Library Aide Antoinette Rosalez drew the outline of a school bus on white butcher paper.

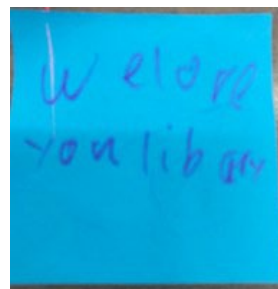
