The San Antonio Public Library and the Holocaust Memorial Museum of San Antonio proudly presented the 13th Annual *Holocaust Learn and Remember* program series in January 2025.

This year's theme, **LIBERATION**, highlighted the powerful stories of concentration camp survivors and the U.S. soldiers who played a vital role in their rescue. Their firsthand accounts of resilience and courage remind us of the enduring strength of the human spirit and the importance of confronting hatred in all its forms. By remembering their experiences, we reaffirm our commitment to upholding human dignity and ensuring that history's lessons continue to inspire future generations.

Performance Highlights:

Over three million library materials have been checked out this fiscal year to date, which exceeds the FY25 target by three percent and is 109,000 more compared to the same time period last year. Over six hundred thousand hours of technology use has occurred, which is below the year-to-date target by nineteen percent and 110,000 less hours compared to the same time period last year. Starting in June 2024, new equipment and software was deployed after FY25 target development and data is reporting

differently. This change is a -15% from same time period last year. The number of in-person library visits for the year to date is over a million, which is above target by sixteen percent and two hundred thousand compared to the same time period last year due to several library locations serving as venue for the Presidential election.

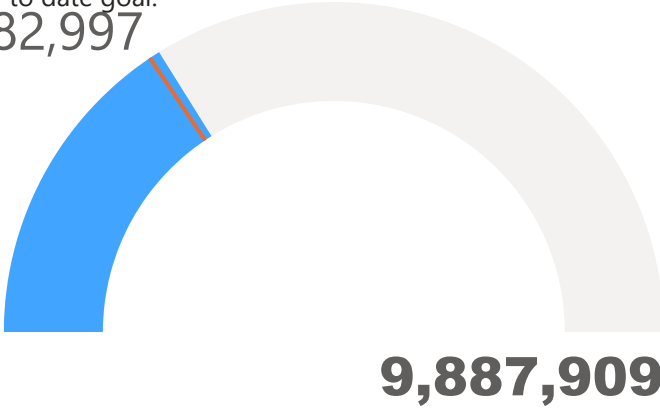

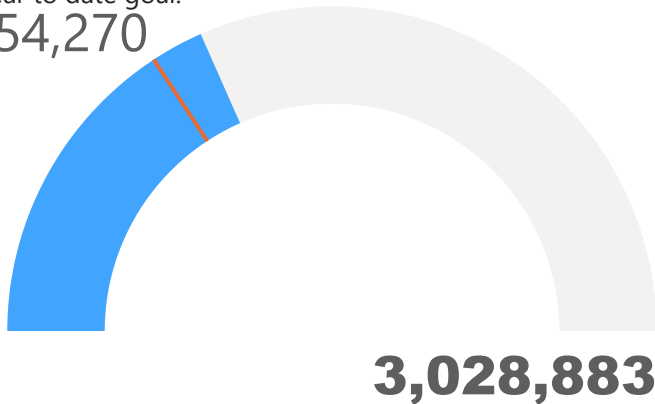

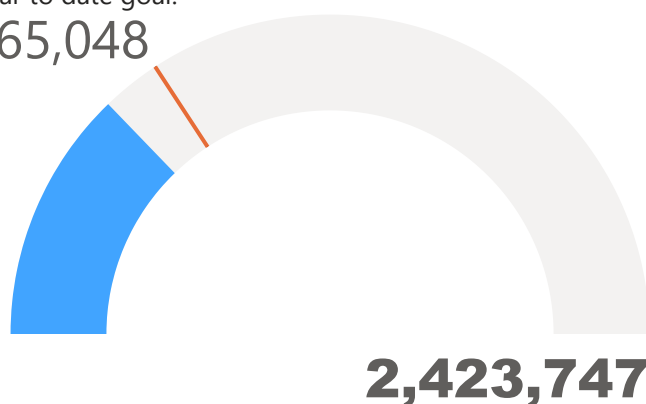

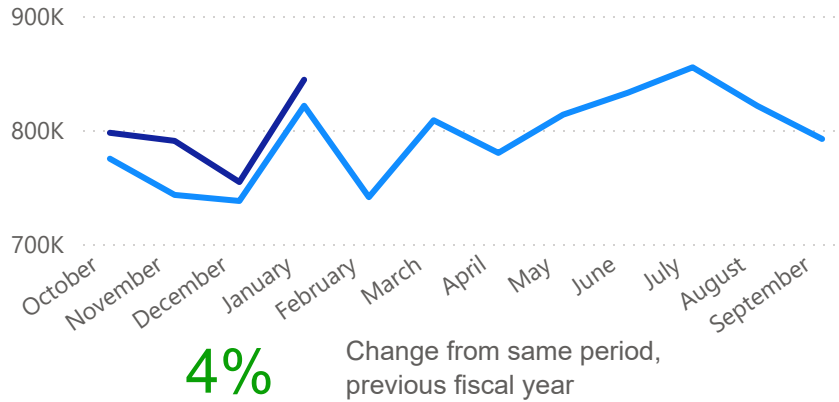

The total circulation of library materials of both physical and digital formats.

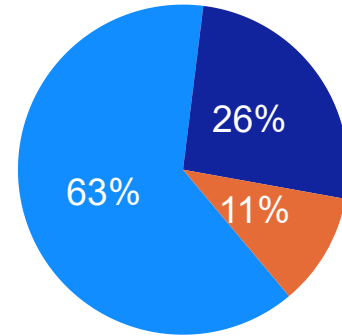

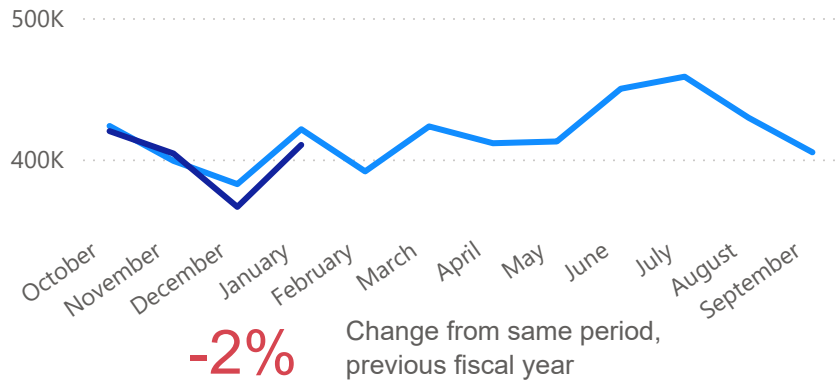


FY25 year to date Physical Circulation

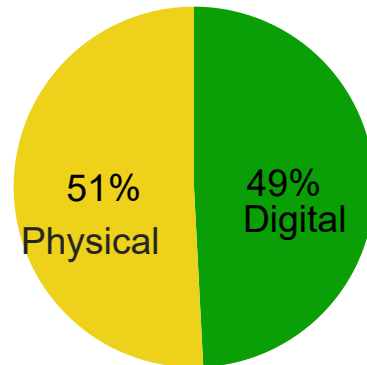
The number of checkouts and renewals of physical library materials.

FY25 to date total circulation by type

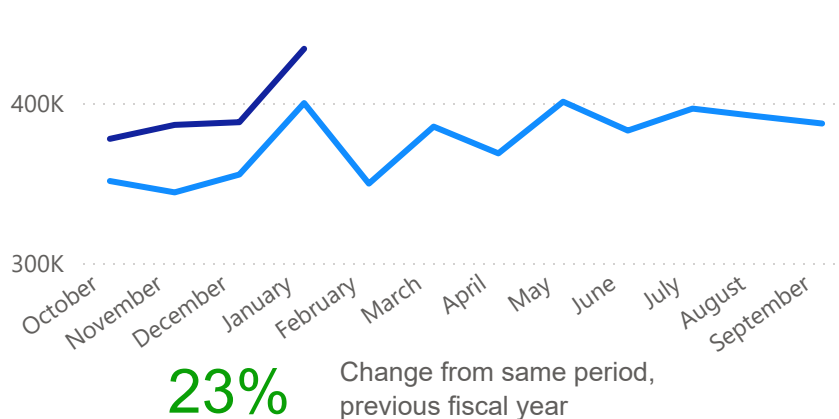

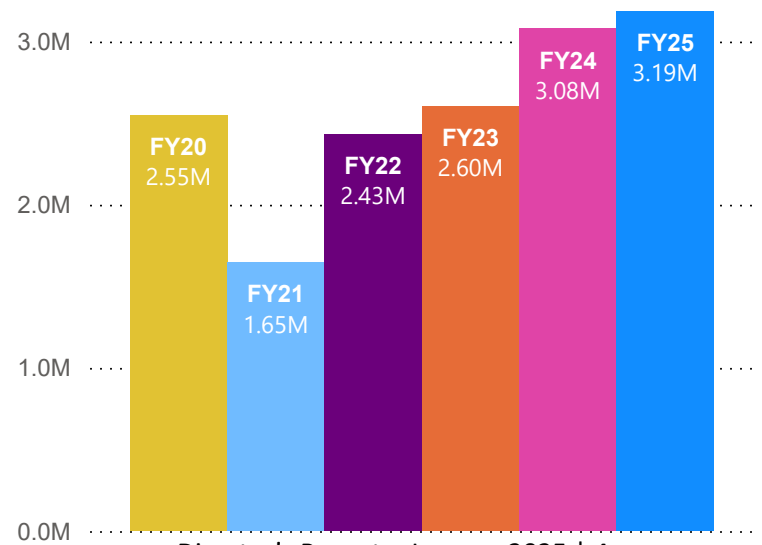

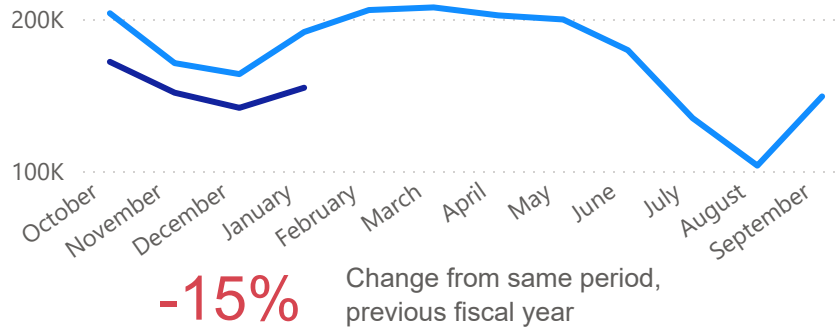

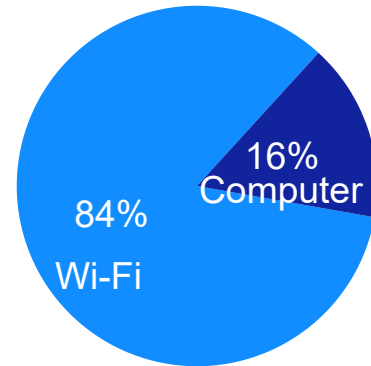

FY25 to date Technology Use by type

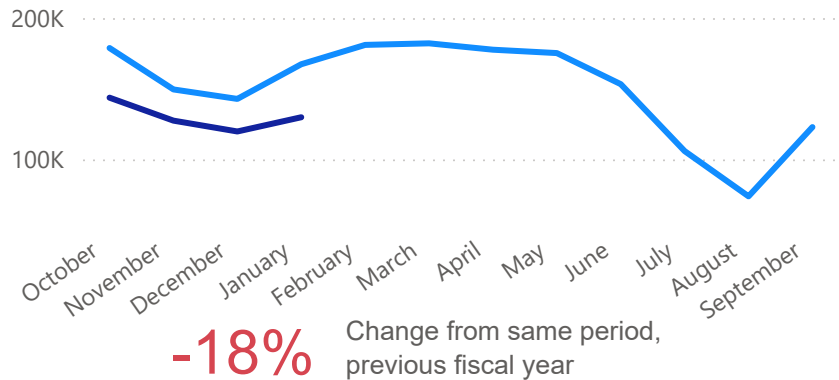


FY25 year to date Wi-Fi Hours

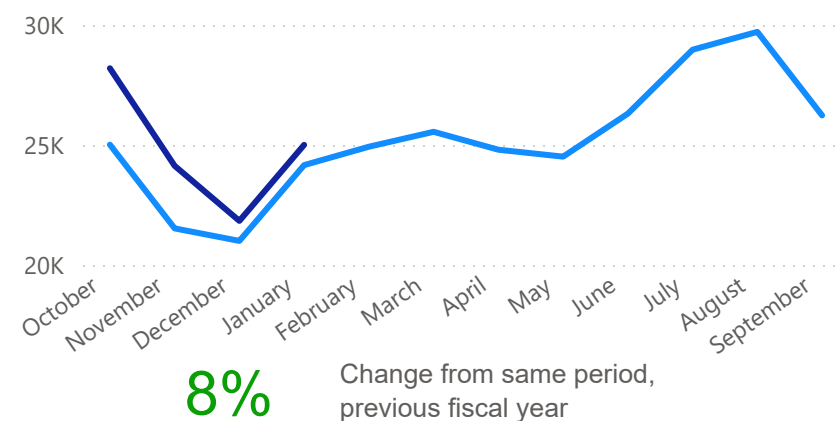


FY25 year to date Computer Hours

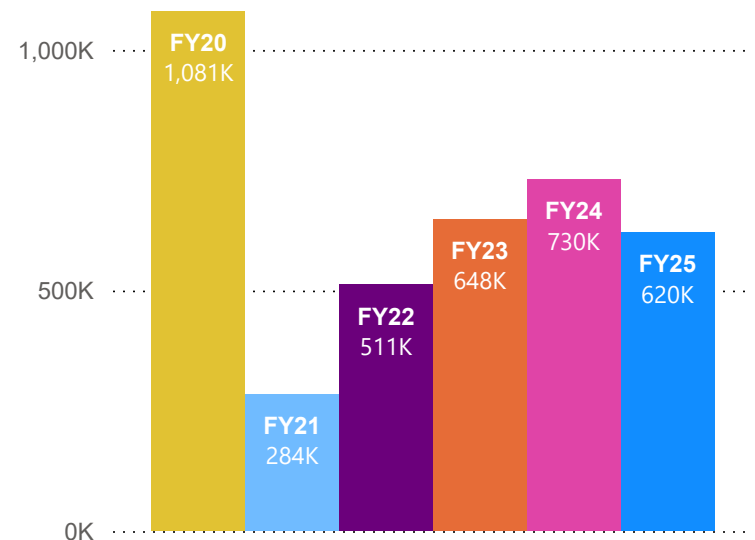

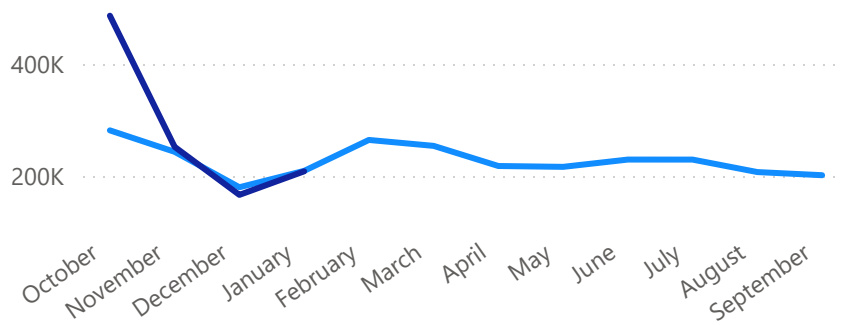

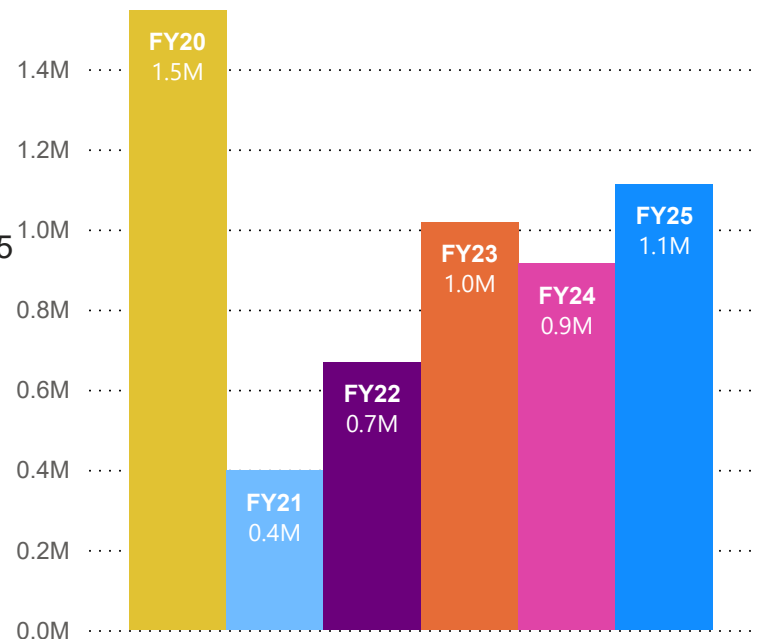

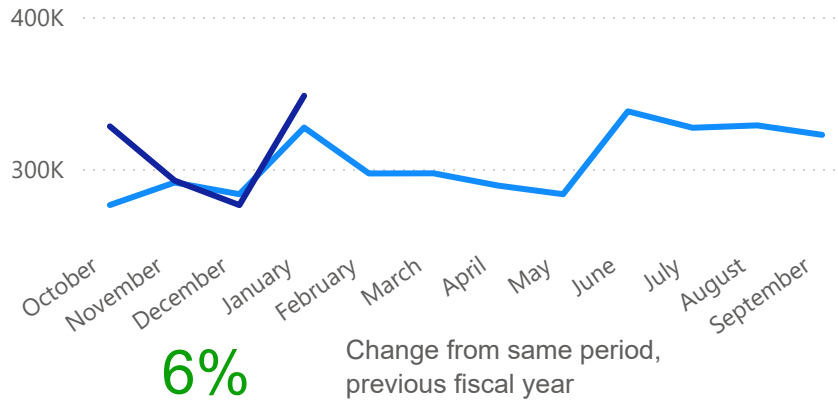

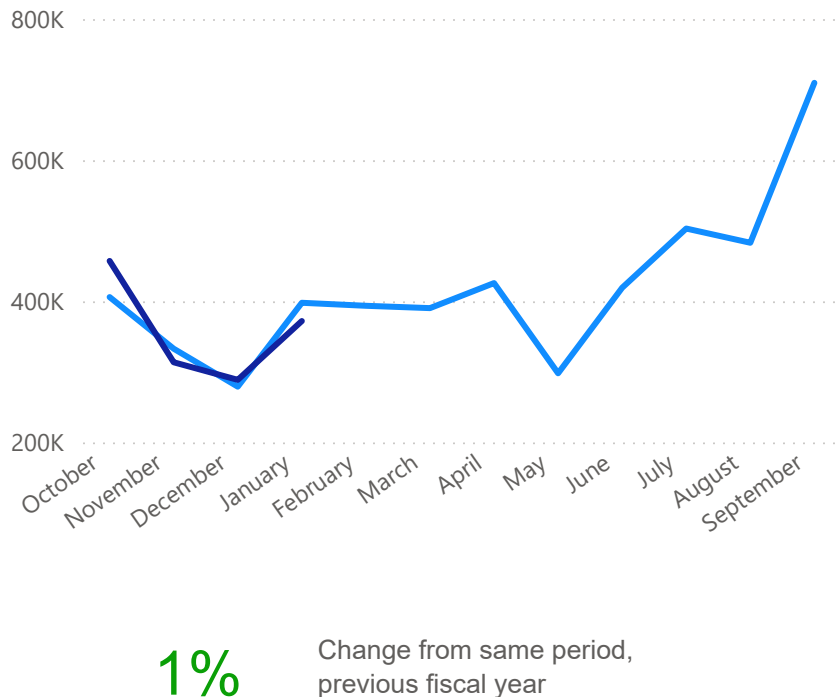


FY25 year to date impressions

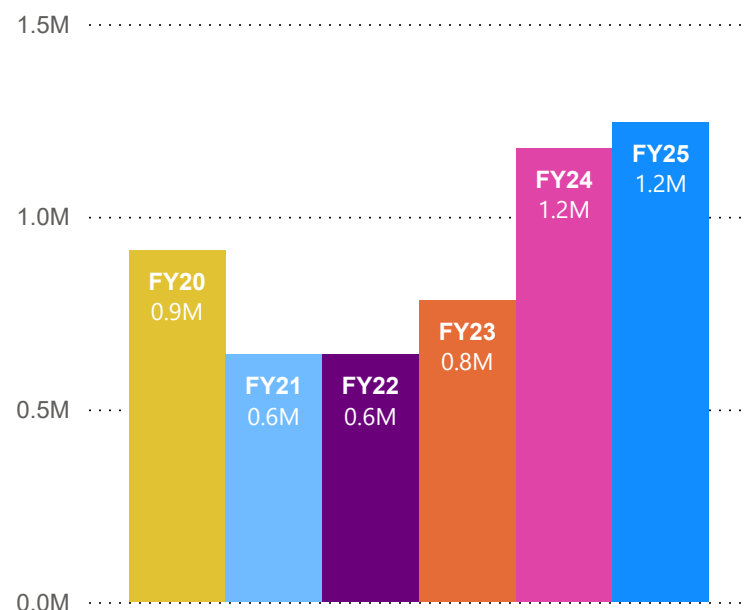

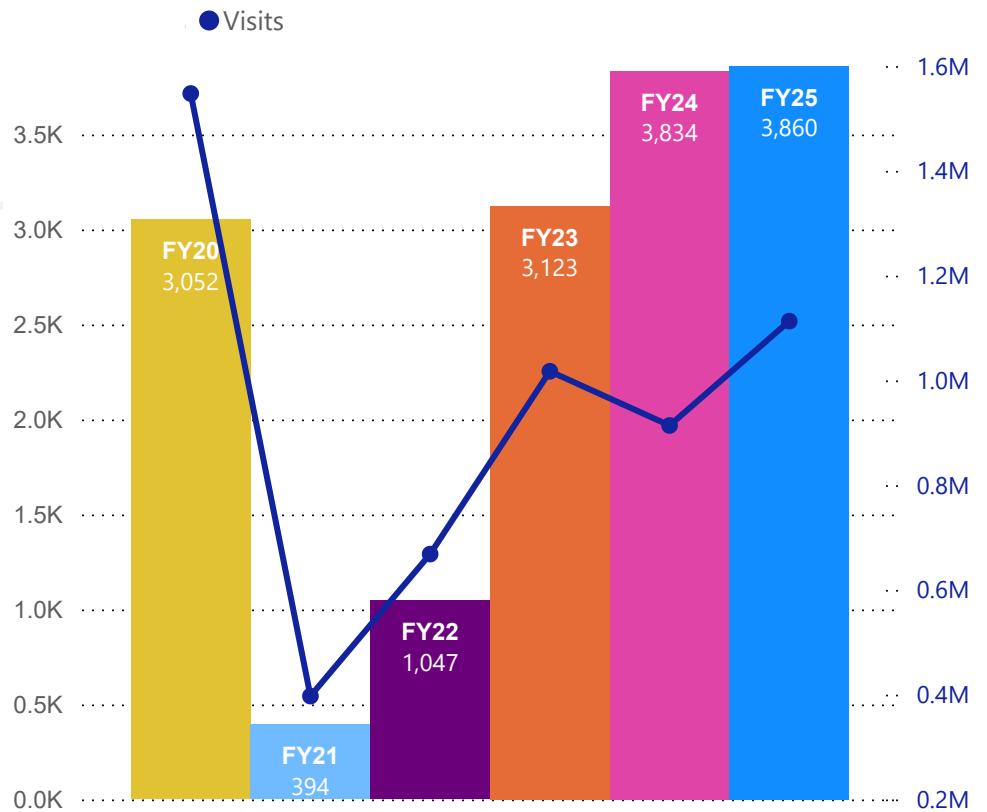

II. SYSTEMWIDE SERVICES

LATINO COLLECTION AND RESOURCE CENTER

On January 11, in collaboration with Mexican American Civil Rights Institute (MACRI) & Monte Video, the Latino Collection & Resource Center (LCRC) presented a public film screening featuring two films that explored the history of racial violence along the Texas/Mexico border. The two films featured were titled *Porvenir, TX* and *They Call Us Sediciosos*. After the screenings, *Porvenir, TX* producer Christina Fernandez engaged in a discussion with Texas Public Radio's, Marian Navarro, followed by a Q & A session with audience members.



On January 14, the LCRC hosted a Mixed Media Memory Collage Art Workshop, presented by Raíz Infinita (Elizabeth Rodriguez).

Attendees created mixed media collage art in honor of a loved one. For three consecutive weekends (January 18, 25 & February 1), the LCRC hosted, *Voices of San Anto: A Series of Bilingual Storytelling Workshops*, in collaboration with Gemini Ink and hosted by Marisela Barrera. During the first two sessions, Marisela helped attendees craft their stories and fine tune performance techniques. The final session celebrated a public performance of the attendees' stories which was recorded and archived by frequent LCRC collaborators at Empower House.

LEARN AT SAPL

Learn at SAPL served over 800 patron visits and facilitated over 1,000 hours of public computer use in January. Learn staff taught nearly 50 programs, including many technology classes for computer and mobile devices, and Learn volunteers led several cultural programs like an English / Spanish Language Exchange at Memorial Branch Library, and English as a Second Language (ESL) tutoring at McCreless Branch Library.

Adult Education Program Manager Michelle D. Rickman teamed up with San Pedro Adult Services Librarian Diana Starrett to present "Beyond Books: Library Services for Adults" to lifelong learners

through San Antonio Oasis at Chandler House. Presenters were able to share many of the Library's newer services like the digital collection and services inside the Libby app, as well as learn about the older adult experience of San Antonio Public Library (SAPL) offerings.

January also marked the wrap-up of a 12-week pilot program, formed in partnership with Haven for Hope and Learn at Central. Training Officers Denise Cadena, Daniel Gonzalez and Gerardo Arizpe brought Learn services to the Haven for Hope campus on Tuesday mornings, utilizing an on-site computer lab. Learn staff worked with Haven for Hope's Income and Skills Development team for a successful project, ultimately receiving over 150 visits from residents to build their digital skills.

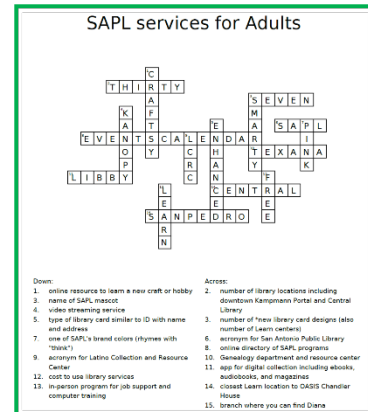

LITTLE READ WAGON

The Little Read Wagon is the library's early literacy outreach team. In January the team began two new series of programs. The new Pequeño Pop-up Play is a child-led play program that will happen once per month at a new park in a different area of San Antonio each time. This will make the program more accessible to families throughout the city. It will connect families with library programs and services at nearby branch locations. Many of the parks the team chose were requested by customers. All the parks are within a few miles of a library branch. The first Pequeño Pop-up Play program was at O.P. Schnabel Park on Tuesday, January 28th. During this program the team displayed program flyers and pictures of the Maverick Branch Library and the Igo Branch Library. Families took pictures of the flyers. They asked staff questions about the programs and the libraries.

The team also began a new series of Let's Play! programs at the Mission Branch Library. The name of the program is the same, but it is now an all-day play program for children and their families. The program happens every Wednesday from 10 am – 4:30 pm. Children and families can attend the program when it works best for them. This allows the program to be more accessible to families. The team sets up play materials inside and outside of the library. Since the team offers play inside, the program will be comfortable for families no matter the weather. When children play, they build their brains and their bodies. Play in early childhood promotes lifelong learning and wellness. When libraries offer play, families see that the library is a welcoming space for them.

TEXANA

Librarians Andrew Crews and Arland Schnacker II presented "Veteran's Genealogy and Research Tips: Part I" at the Northeast Senior Center on January 6. Mr. Schnacker prepared the classroom set-up, managed technology, and distributed handouts while Mr. Crews led the instruction. On January 7, Librarian Lucy Agado held a beginning genealogy program in Spanish. This was the first time "Introducción a la Genealogía" had been offered online. The class provided a Spanish language approach to getting started on genealogy research. Working with SAPL's Organizational Health Unit (OHU), Ms. Agado also presented a beginning genealogy class for library staff on January 17.

Librarian/Archivist Sylvia Reyna was invited to participate in an Ancestry Workshop at the McNay Art Museum on January 11. Ms. Reyna presented Tools and Techniques for Exploring Your Genealogy. The presentation complimented the McNay's "Whitfield Lovell: Passages" exhibit which documents and pays tribute to the history and cultural memory of ancestors. Mr. Schnacker assisted with the "Game Changers: Meet the Artists" event on Jan 18 at the Central Library Gallery. This event offered attendees an opportunity to hear the stories of people, places, and events behind the quilts created by the African American Quilt Circle of San Antonio Texas (AAQCSA). He also presented a January 22 beginning genealogy class at the Central Library which gave attendees an overview of resources available for researching their family history. On January 28, he led a "Winter Preparation Program" at the Central Library and instructed patrons in how to do a Do-It-Yourself (DIY) space heater using terracotta pots and bricks.

III. AGE-BASED SERVICES



CHILDREN'S

In January, Children's Services team members had multiple opportunities to increase public awareness of San Antonio Public Library (SAPL) resources. Jacquelyn Gonzales (Johnston), Linda Lopez (Guerra), and Cresencia Huff (Central Administration) visited with Northside Independent School District elementary school librarians on January 13. Ms. Lopez presented on NovelList+, a reader's advisory resource available to any SAPL cardholder. On January 25, Melissa Fulmer (Memorial), Linda Childs (Cortez), and Ms. Huff hosted a children's activity area and SAPL information table at the annual Housing in San Antonio event hosted by Neighborhood and Housing Services. Kristin Yourdon (Little Read Wagon) and Kate Simpson (Children's Library at Central) joined Ms. Huff at the quarterly meeting of Ready Kid SA, a gathering of community organizations serving young children and their families. The group received updates on projects such as Crisis Childcare and broke into smaller groups for focused discussions of child health, school readiness, and development. Jasmin Salinas (Landa) hosted several online sessions to select summer incentive books. Ms. Salinas walked team members through the steps to login to their account, browse selection lists, and add titles to their carts. The team also discussed the likely popularity of specific titles relative to their cost.

TEENS

Each month, Teen Services holds a meeting of the Teen Services Librarians and Liaisons. This month's meeting took place on January 15, 2025 in the Teen Library at Central. The Teen Services professional development component entailed a structured discussion about maintaining personal space and boundaries while working with the public - and particularly with teens. Strategies were provided and teen staff conducted break-out sessions to share additional strategy suggestions which were then shared with the group. Also at the meeting, a new Teen Services staff workgroup was discussed organized. As background, each Teen Librarian II leads a staff workgroup comprised of Teen Librarian 1s for the purpose of enacting a system-wide teen service or program.

With the addition of Brandy Walthall Teen Services Librarian II (Guerra), the opportunity to develop a new teen services workgroup presented itself. The new workgroup, called the teen data workgroup, will develop community profiles for each SAPL location, examine community demographics and appraise SAPL teen usage patterns and levels of participation. It is exciting to have a group of teen librarians using

data and employing critical thinking to help determine service opportunities and gaps as they strive to provide exceptional service to the teens (13 to 18) of San Antonio. The teen data workgroup joins the existing teen services staff workgroups which are: teen engagement, teen summer, teen pride, teen services professional development, teen virtual services. Additionally, the leadership of the teen summer workgroup has transitioned to Teen Services Librarian II Chris Castillo (Carver).

ADULTS

In January, the Library hosted the 13th annual Holocaust Learn and Remember event in partnership with the Holocaust Memorial Museum of San Antonio (HMMSA). The 2025 theme, focusing on liberation, honored concentration camp survivors and the U.S. soldiers who helped liberate them, marking the 80th anniversary the liberation of Auschwitz. The event began on January 9th at Central Library with remarks from San Antonio Mayor Ron Nirenberg, Bexar County Judge Peter Sakai, State Senator José Menéndez, Interim Library Director Kathy Donellan, and HMMSA Director Leslie Davis Met. Texas A&M Professor Dr. Edward Westermann and Fort Sam Houston Museum Director Jacqueline Davis presented on the U.S. Army 90th Infantry Division's role in liberating the Flossenbürg concentration camp. Despite cold and rainy weather, 70 attendees participated. Throughout January, six adult programs took place at three libraries, and three online presentations were offered. For the first time, a program for families explored genealogy through preserving stories, and recording family trees. An exhibit shared additional voices of liberation. On January 27th, International Holocaust Remembrance Day, the closing event was moved to Norris Conference Centers due to high demand, with 500 community members attending. Attendees heard the testimonials of Auschwitz survivors and learned about the legacy left to their descendants.

On January 19, Carver Branch Library had the honor of hosting Ms. Arndrea Waters King in partnership with San Antonio African American Community Archive and Museum (SAAACAM). Ms. Waters King is the daughter in law of late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr and spouse of Martin Luther King III. Mr. Waters King spoke to attendees about her book *What Is My Legacy?* Attendees also had the opportunity to participate in a meet and greet with Ms. Waters King.

OLDER ADULTS

In January, eight branch library locations began offering Wowzitude Livestreamed Worldwide Travel. Wowzitude is an exciting series of livestreamed travel experiences designed for culturally curious older

adults. Through this series, participants can explore 200+ destinations worldwide through interactive walking tours led by passionate local guides, offering an authentic and unscripted glimpse into diverse cultures, landmarks, and hidden gems. Whether you're a travel dreamer or a lifelong learner, these awe-inspiring tours will spark your curiosity and inspire your next adventure, all while being connected to a vibrant community of fellow explorers in San Antonio and around the world. Destinations explored in January included Arequipa, Peru; Olich Creek, British Columbia, Canada; Cusco, Peru; Bath, England; Mexico City, Mexico and London, England. Wowzitude will be an ongoing program for older adults at a variety of Library locations and this opportunity is funded by Wellmed Charitable Foundation. Once per month, Memorial Branch Library offers an opportunity for older adults to play the classic game Scrabble. This game allows older adults an enjoyable opportunity for social connection while improving mental skills through vocabulary and spelling. All these benefits are offered in a casual, intellectually safe environment. Two San Antonio Public Library Locations offer a monthly offsite book club for older adults. Robin Alcorta, Adult Services Librarian at Landa Branch Library, offers a monthly book club for residents of the Village at Incarnate Word. Kimberly King, Adult Services Librarian at Thousand Oaks Branch Library offers a monthly book club at Northeast Senior Center, one of the Senior Centers operated by City of San Antonio Senior Services. In January, the Notheast Senior Center Book Club discussed "Saint X" by Alexis Schaitkin. This thriller follows a woman's obsessive search for the truth behind her sister's death, exploring grief, identity, and a haunting connection with a suspect.

V. LOCATION-BASED SERVICES

Central Library



Childrens Wall of Warmth

This winter, the Children's Library at Central offered a new resource for families: the Children's Wall of Warmth, featuring child-sized warm clothing available for anyone who needed it. This initiative was developed by Manager Kate Simpson and supported by Assistant Manager Shannon Seglin. Shannon coordinated with The Temple Beth-El Sisterhood to lead a clothing drive. Ms. Seglin also pioneered the first children's program for The Holocaust Learn & Remember program series: "Dig Into Your Roots," which she conducted at the Igo Branch Library and focused on sharing and preserving family stories.

The Teen Library continues to see an average of 60 teens after school on weekdays and teen regulars on Saturdays. As always, teens take ownership of the Teen Library by developing, leading, and engaging in activities that speak to their interests – some highlights this month include teens making dumplings and bookmarks to celebrate Chinese New Year, teen volunteer Liss showing teens how to make banana milk, and teen volunteer Anthony assisting teens and staff with 3D printing. In addition, Teen Library staff provided Mexican American Studies students from Marshall High School a tour of the Central Library to view the art and architecture of the building, a group of students from Shavano BASIS High School visited the Teen Library to do research for class projects, and the Library Club students at Academy High School in Kingsville, TX received a tour of the library and participated in engaging activities in the Teen Library. Central Library served as a place to stay warm for over 150 people during the cold weather in January. Patrons enjoyed games, coloring sheets and magazines provided by staff. Patrons chatted and sheltered from the cold.



The Creative Collective Open Mic, cohosted by JD Elizondo and LC Keefe, met twice with regulars and new participants taking the stage. The event continues to foster a sense of community by providing a space for people to connect, express themselves, and be inspired by one another. Patricia Perez and Leti Guerra presented the Envision Success vision board program on January 25. Attendees enjoyed creating vision boards with inspirational words, goal-setting images, and vibrant colors. A curated collection of books was available for patrons to checkout.

Learn at Central had three patrons throughout the month that needed help accessing their probation classes online which they were able to complete with staff's help. The patrons were very thankful to staff for introducing computer skills to them while they completed the classes. Two patrons were impressed by the computer accessibility setting, Narrator, that read the probation course material to them, so they were able to listen and read simultaneously.

Upon leaving, the group expressed their gratitude towards Alcorta and the Landa Branch Library team for creating such a positive, welcoming, and inclusive morning of events.

Their presentation included information about the LEARN@SAPL program as well as various services that includes both print and digital materials. The residents were encouraged to visit their local library to either get a library card or renew their existing one. By coincidence, the following day at San Pedro, Branch Manager, Nathan Laubner, happened to strike up a conversation with a couple at the public service desk. Sure enough, they were visiting San Pedro to renew their library cards because they had attended the previous day's library outreach event at the Chandler. This interaction proves that outreach helps connect San Antonio residents with the library.

This program has been both rewarding and impactful, allowing the Training Officers to share their knowledge beyond the library's walls. These classes not only support the Learn mission to improve computer literacy but also brings the Learn program's benefits directly to the community.

For the past thirty years, at least, the first graders of Discovery School and their teachers have walked down to the Westfall Library for a brief story time with Children's Librarian Imelda Merino and an opportunity to select and check out books of their own choosing. This is done throughout the school year, about once or twice a month. It is always a joy to see the interest and enthusiasm of these students, especially as they share their favorite books with their friends. Their eyes light up as they talk with exuberance about their interests, whether it be LEGOS, animals, unicorns, or Minecraft. The Discovery School teachers have a special gift for engaging these children in a way that fires their eagerness to learn. One cannot help but catch some of their spirit when they come!

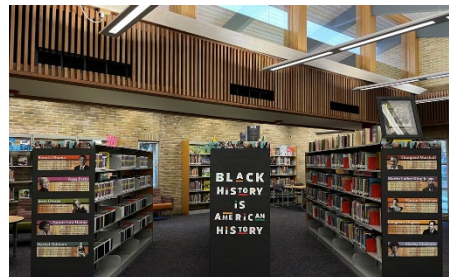

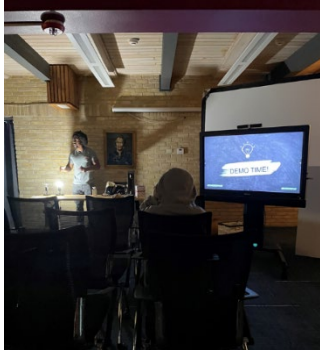
DISTRICT 2

Pruitt Library at Roosevelt High School

The Molly Pruitt Branch offers weekly Teen Time on Fridays. This program aims to allow teens to feel like they belong in a library space without the pressure that school or home might make them feel. At a recent Teen Time, it was confirmed that the library was meeting this goal when a teen confided in the teen librarian about how comfortable they felt and enjoyed being there. Seeing the impact of the program’s goal reinforced that Molly Pruitt's services and programs impact the patrons it serves.

Pruitt Library hosts a unique weekly Sensory Play Time program designed for early childhood. This engaging program provides babies, toddlers, and preschoolers with a variety of thoughtfully curated sensory experiences. Participants can improve their fine motor skills, foster language development, promote creativity, and enhance sensory awareness. Additionally, children can collaborate with their peers, which helps develop their social skills. This program also allows parents to connect while actively engaging with their children in these essential developmental activities.

She was 5 months pregnant, expressed a need for some good stretching, and spontaneously borrowed a Learn yoga mat so she could participate in that night's session. Since the class follows Austin-based yoga instructor Adriene Mishler's YouTube channel, Learn Training Officer Lodie Mueller found a pre-natal yoga video safe for all three trimesters of pregnancy and another with an emphasis on deep breathing and relaxation. The mom was delighted that she could meet her own wellness needs while her 8-year-old daughter stayed nearby, entertaining herself with a tablet during the class. The mom declared how wonderful she felt at the end of the class and made plans to come again the next week.

A variety of sensory items, open-ended items and art supplies are offered to stimulate young minds.

Jennifer Gutierrez, assisted by the Children's Librarian, also provided Come & Go Crafts which included creating a paper plate owl at the Pan American Branch Library.

Cortez Branch Library

Three Getting Crafty classes were held for the month of January. On January 8 the craft was emailed to the crafters due to inclement weather as a "Craft From Home" project. The class received different recipes to make in an air fryer. On the 15th the class sewed Fleece Mittens. The 22nd was a "bring your own craft" day. On the 29th the class made heart shaped wreaths. Crafty Tea-time happens once a month. This program is more of a social gathering for community members to come in meet new people and enjoy nice hot flavored teas. While they are here, they can craft, read, or just enjoy each other's company. These programs are impactful because they give older adults in the Cortez community to create meaningful and lasting connections with their fellow community members.

The Cortez Young Adult (YA) collection has introduced an innovative Manga display featuring "mystery" titles. Patrons can take a chance and check out a Manga book without knowing its title, thanks to specially designed book covers. As an added bonus, patrons get to keep the unique book cover. This engaging display has led to an increase in circulation within the YA collection. This display continues to help create connections with the teen community and engages their senses of discovery and enjoyment.

Johnston Branch Library

Johnston library began offering a scavenger hunt for children in January. Each visit to the library, children are invited to partake in a small hunt to find 10 images hidden throughout the children's area. In January images were Winter-themed including a mug of cocoa and mittens. When the children successfully locate all 10 images, they can choose a small prize out of Johnston's treasure chest. Prizes include stickers, fun pencils, and themed erasers. Thus far the response to this has been exceptional. Not only do children enjoy this fun game, but the parents helping them with this game have expressed enjoyment in the hunt. The game is simple yet also spotlights many areas within the children's section that might otherwise have been unnoticed by families. Staff have observed children and parents return to areas where the images were located and examine the area more closely.

In January Johnston started a new program series: Adulting 101. This series is a collaboration between Teen Librarian Ana Pina, Adult Services Librarian Cris Yamada, and Learn Training Officer Shauna Mendoza and focuses on helping young adults (18-25) learn life skills as they move into adulthood. The program has two tracks: Adulting 101, and Adulting 101 with Learn. Adulting 101 focuses on life skills such as basic sewing, cooking, and financial literacy. The first meeting on January 14th was a presentation by Cafe College about financial aid and scholarships. Adulting 101 with Learn by Ms. Mendoza focuses on helping young adults transition into the workforce. The first session, "Discover Your Path", on January 11th focused on an aptitude and career assessment to discover potential career paths. The response to the Adulting 101 concept has been positive, if surprising. In addition to the target age range of young adults, older patrons have also demonstrated strong interest.

Bazan Branch Library

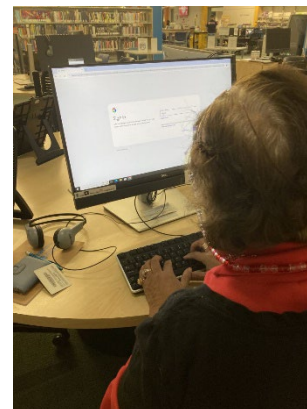

The donated clothing items, displayed on a designated stand-alone shelf, included hats, scarves, jackets, and other cold-weather essentials. One generous customer contributed three bags full of clothing. Both the Wall of Warmth and the library itself proved invaluable as temperatures dropped below freezing, offering visitors not only free extra layers of clothing but also a safe place to escape the cold.





Bazan branch Training Officer, Carlos Loera, launched a new series of computer literacy classes for adults in January. This six-week course focused on essential

computer skills and internet safety. Participants first learned about the importance of creating strong passwords, with step-by-step guidance on how to make one. The class then reviewed how to recognize online fraud such as phishing, job scams, and shopping scams. Additionally, students learned how to set up an email account and how to use productivity tools such as Google Suite and Microsoft Office Suite for both personal and professional use. The next series of classes will focus on using smartphones and exploring the free library apps available.

Las Palmas Branch Library

While construction progresses on the transformative renovation at Las Palmas Branch, staff continued to offer interim services at the Sueltenfuss Library at Our Lady of the Lake University. Las Palmas staff offered holds pickup and account and reference services.

In January, recruitment moved forward on two staff positions for Las Palmas. A new Training Officer to staff the Learn at SAPL Las Palmas location was funded as part of the Fiscal Year 2025 Library budget. That position is being advertised in February 2025.

Recruitment began in December 2024 to fill a vacant Children's Librarian position at Las Palmas. The new Las Palmas Children's Librarian was selected in January and that staff member will start in March 2025.

Phase 2 of construction at Las Palmas is on-going and the project is estimated to be 65% complete as of January 2025.

Memorial Branch Library

Memorial staff has worked hard to make the branch inviting; their demeanor and service have played a significant part in the success of the branch. Collectively, the team has received 19 enCORE cards from patrons during the beginning of FY2025. Common themes are the kindness and patience of the staff, their helpfulness and good cheer, and the welcome patrons feel. Staff dedication has driven statistical improvements, as well. Memorial's total circulation for the first four months of Fiscal Year 2025 (FY2025) has seen an increase of 2% over the same period in FY2024. Technology use has likewise increased by 4.6%.

Adult Services Librarian Freddy Hudson conceived of a Walking Club last year and kicked it off in September of 2024. Since then, a small group of walkers has toured the local community every Thursday morning. They explore different parts of the community each week, including the campus of St. Mary's University. As they walk, they are not just getting a little bit of casual exercise; they are connecting with their community, connecting as individuals, and building friendships. First-time walkers receive a re-useable water bottle inscribed with the words, "Sometimes you forget you are awesome, so this is your reminder."

This partnership also highlights the value of collaboration by coming together to provide a vital service that eases the burden of tax season for many in the community.

On January 11, the Guerra Branch hosted Agarita, a chamber ensemble rooted in San Antonio, dedicated to producing collaborative, free musical events and devoted to reaching new audiences. Patrons enjoyed the opportunity to sit back, relax and enjoy the beautiful sounds of this mobile concert experience. This was the group's second visit to the branch and their performances were well received. The branch plans to continue hosting this group so members of the community can continue to enjoy new ways to experience classical and contemporary music.



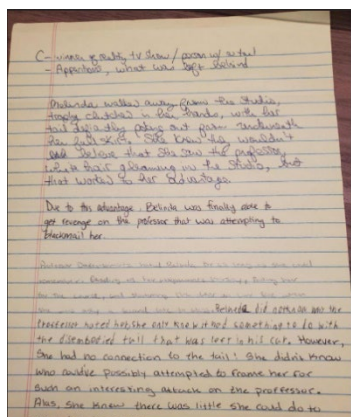

Collaborative story created by Inkognito teen participants as an icebreaker activity.

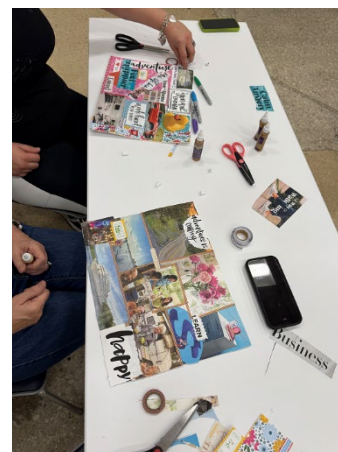
In January, Potranco Branch Library revived its teen literary club, Inkognito. The club started as a book club, but teens found it difficult to read a novel-length work with the demands of school. Last fall, the program was reimagined as a discussion group for short fiction. The concept was further refined by the teen librarian and teen volunteers. Working together, they identified changes to better engage participants, including selecting teen-authored works, adding icebreaker games and take-home writing prompts, and reading a longer work periodically to maintain a “book club” feel. The planning process provided the teen volunteers’ an active role in developing teen programming. With a recent analysis showing San Antonio students reading below grade level, Potranco’s Inkognito group’s “right-sized” selections and social atmosphere invites teens to enjoy reading again.

On Sunday, January 5, the Potranco Library hosted its annual vision board program. Several attendees from last year shared their 2024 outcomes and were excited to return to make boards for 2025. The library supplied discarded magazines, mini-poster boards, and scrapbooking materials while patrons brought their creativity. All left feeling focused on fulfilling their 2025 goals. The program is impactful precisely because participants leave looking forward to the new year.

In addition to installing solar panels on the roof, Big Sun Solar also added a canopy to the Igo parking lot. The 336 panels will offset up to 70% of Igo's energy costs. Any gathered electricity that is not needed by the library will be added to the power grid to benefit others in the community.

Semmes Branch Library

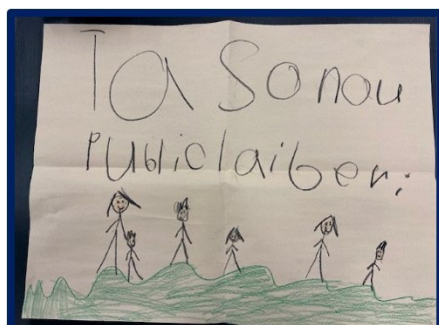
