# SAN ANTONIO PUBLIC LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS

## System-wide Highlights

In February, the San Antonio Public Library celebrated Black History Month with a special focus on Creative Expression in its featured programs for adults. The Central Gallery showcased the work of the African American Quilt Circle of San Antonio (AAQCSA), which also hosted a "Quilt in a Jar" workshop. Additionally, local artist Kaldric Dow, whose work was displayed in the Central Gallery in 2024, led a collage-making workshop. Throughout the month, SAPL offered a diverse range of programs to honor and commemorate Black History Month.

## Performance Highlights

Almost four million library materials have been checked out this fiscal year to date, which exceeds the FY25 target by three percent. Year to date circulation is 132,000 more than the same time period last year. Over 700,000 hours of technology use has occurred, which is below the year-to-date target by twenty percent. Year to date hours of technology is 174,000 fewer hours than the same time period last year. Starting in June 2024, new equipment and software was deployed after FY25 target development. The number of in-person library visits for the year to date is over a million, which is above target by twelve percent. Year to date visits is 145,000 more than the same time period last year due to several library locations serving as venue for the Presidential election.

## Media Highlight

On February 24, KSAT aired a segment on the Library's Read to a Dog program and highlighted events for that day at both the Semmes and Encino Branch Libraries. The brief highlight aired multiple times throughout the day in various news broadcasts.



The total circulation of library materials of both physical and digital formats.






## FY25 year to date Physical Circulation



## FY25 to date total circulation by type




## FY25 year to date Digital Circulation



## Year to date total circulation comparison




## FY25 year to date Hours of Technology


The total number of hours of technology used from both public computers and public Wi-Fi.

## FY25 to date Technology Use by type




## FY25 year to date Wi-Fi Hours



## FY25 year to date Computer Hours




## Year to date Technology Use comparison

The number of visits (physically) at any library location reported annually to Texas State Library and Archives Commission.



### Year to date Visits comparison




## FY25 year to date engagements







## II. SYSTEMWIDE SERVICES

### LATINO COLLECTION AND RESOURCE CENTER

On February 5, Professor Elena Foulis of A&M University-San Antonio brought students from the department of Language, Literature and Arts to take a tour of the Latino Collection & Resource Center (LCRC). LCRC program manager Sarah De La Rosa and Information Services librarian Patricia Perez presented an overview of the LCRC’s resources, programs and mission with the students. One of the goals of the LCRC is to strengthen relationships with regional universities, so that students may utilize the abundance of academic and contemporary resources found within the collection.


On February 8, the LCRC presented a program titled *Latine Literati*, featuring local author Jonathan Fletcher who debuted his award-winning chapbook titled, “This Is My Body,” with our library community. Jonathan was joined by San Antonio’s Poet Laureate, Eddie Vega, who engaged in discussion with Jonathan regarding the creative process of writing poetry. Both Eddie and Jonathan answered questions from the audience after their presentation. On February 22, during a week that honors the founding of the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), Dr. Cynthia E. Orozco delivered a presentation that focused on Alonso S. Perales. Perales was a principal founder of LULAC, a US diplomat, author, and civil rights leader. Perales is credited as one of the most influential Mexican Americans of the twentieth century.

### LEARN AT SAPL

Learn at SAPL fielded over 1,050 patron visits and guided 1,700 hours of public computer use this month. Learn staff hosted over 50 programs, with new additions of “Adulting 101 with Learn” at Johnston Branch Library, and “Practical Spanish” at Memorial Branch Library. The Learn team was active in

continuing partnerships with Launch SA for small business development, LEAD Enterprise for American Sign Language teaching, and Credit Human for financial literacy. The Learn at Central team built on previous work with Haven for Hope, bringing computer classes to residents in partnership with Community Tech Network.

Learn at Central Manager Cate Prazak, together with Communications Manager Scott Williams, presented to over 300 Metro Health Department City employees. Online participants learned the many joys of library card ownership, including the individualized assistance available through Learn at SAPL. Cate also presented to 60 students as part of Straus Middle School’s “Career Day,” sharing about the educational requirements to become a librarian, and all the interactions that might pop up in a “typical day.” Learn at Westfall Training Officer Louis Medellin showcased the transformation of his service area, thanks to knowledge gained at Visual Merchandising training with Sarah Linley, Access Services Manager.

Louis presented the new aesthetic during an online staff training together with Westfall Branch Manager Machaia McClenny. Their accompanying “before” and “after” pictures inspired staff systemwide to think about engaging patrons through visual displays.

## **LITTLE READ WAGON**

The Little Read Wagon (LRW) is the San Antonio Public Library’s (SAPL) early literacy outreach team. In February Library Services Specialist Julia Lazarin and Librarian III Kristin Yourdon presented to SAPL’s Children's Librarians. Lazarin and Yourdon shared research from the Harvard Center on the Developing Child. This research gives three principles that children and families need to thrive. Children and families need strong relationships. They need to build cognitive and social-emotional skills. They also need to have their stress reduced. The team discussed what children’s librarians can do to help. According to the research, play is an excellent way to support all three principles. The team gave tips for how to incorporate more play into children's programs and services. The team also discussed other ways they have used the research to reflect on their own programs.

In February, Library Services Specialists Julia Lazarin and Melisa Hill presented at an AVANCE Health and Mental Health Advisory meeting. The meeting was for parents, health and community experts, and program staff. There were 72 people who attended this presentation. The topic of the presentation was Strengthening Family Connections through Shared Reading. Lazarin presented in English, and Hill presented in Spanish. The team shared that reading together helps children recognize and name their feelings. It helps children empathize with others. It boosts the mental health of the reader and the child. The team encouraged everyone to visit their local SAPL branch and check out lots of books. When families read with their children as part of their daily routine, it helps children feel comforted and secure.

## TEXANA

On February 1 Librarian Lucy Agado hosted the online class “Ancestry Library Edition: Introduction” that provided basic search techniques using the Ancestry database. She then hosted a second program on February 8 that demonstrated Ancestry’s advanced searching features. Librarian Andy Crews presented “Using Newspaper Archive” at Collins Garden Library on February 4 and the online class “Genealogy Without Subscribing: Alternatives to Ancestry” on February 22.

Librarians Sylvia Reyna and Deborah Countess facilitated a new older adults' program on February 13, “Coloring, Crosswords and Coffee,” designed to stir creativity and foster new friendships in a relaxing atmosphere. On February 14, Librarians Arland Schnacker and Mr. Crews conducted “Veteran Genealogy for Seniors: part 2” at the Northeast Senior Center. Participants were provided hands-on experience navigating the Fold3 database. On February 19, Ms. Reyna, Ms. Countess and Information Services Librarian Jordan Torres hosted a Wowzitude pre-recorded walking tour of downtown Mexico City, “Vibrant Heart: Exploring the Soul of Mexico City.” These tours are designed to bring the world to older adults curious about other cultures. To celebrate Black History Month, Ms. Reyna was invited by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) on February 20 to present on African American genealogy at Schaefer Library. Additionally, Ms. Agado presented the class “Finding Your Roots: Genealogy for Beginners” at San Antonio College on February 27. These programs focused on African American genealogy research and beginning genealogy methods.

Ms. Reyna was invited by Scouting America (formerly Boy Scouts of America) to lead a cemetery research class for scouts on February 22. Her presentation demonstrated library databases that can help unearth biographical information on cemetery residents. Mr. Schnacker presented a February 22 beginning genealogy class at Central Library where patrons were introduced to library databases and received helpful tips for genealogy research.

# III. AGE-BASED SERVICES

## CHILDREN’S

Dr. Catherine O’Brien of Texas A&M University, San Antonio, began a series of child development webinars on February 4. This first session provided an overview of child development topics. Notable themes included recognizing and honoring children’s competence and need to develop autonomy. Seven members of the Children’s Services team attended Future of San Antonio, a panel discussion on social determinants of health and outcomes for children in San Antonio. The discussion included vaccinations, food insecurity, walkability and safe routes to school.

Shannon Seglin, Kate Simpson, and Cresencia Huff met with Dr. Deepti Kharod of University of Incarnate Word. Dr. Kharod shared her project of exploring belief in play, how children experience things like awe and wonder, faith, and joy while engaged in play. While at the Children’s Library at Central, she was shown some of the collection related to faith traditions. Dr. Kharod invited the team to participate in a community event in March.

At the February Children’s Services Team meeting, the Summer with SAPL children’s programming work group presented an overview of special activities to offer school age children in June and July. Options include opportunities to explore and imagine through art, science, puppetry, and cardboard construction. Supplies will be provided through purchase for each location or sharing of material kits.

## ADULTS

In February, the Library celebrated Black History Month. This year, the Library’s featured programs for adults during Black History Month all focused on various forms of Creative Expression. On February 1st, the Library hosted a two- hour, hands on, Quilt in a Jar workshop two-hour workshop presented by the African American Quilt Circle of San Antonio (AAQCSA). This workshop was presented in conjunction with the Central Gallery exhibit Game Changers, which showcased the work of AAQCSA. Later in February on February 21st, the Library hosted a hands-on workshop presented by local jewelry artist Glenda Fikes. The workshop, called Culture Inspired Jewelry, provided participants with the opportunity to learn Ms. Fiks’ process for making jewelry with fabrics and techniques native to her culture. Finally, on February 22nd, the Library hosted a third hands on workshop presented by Kaldric Dow, whose work was featured in the Central Gallery back in 2024. In this workshop, Dow shared his artistic knowledge with

participants and helped them create collage art inspired by his own vibrant work. Participants left with their own creative work and new craft skills.

On February 8th, the Library hosted PokeFest for the 3rd year. This event, which has been hosted each year at McCreless Branch Library, provides Pokemon enthusiasts of all ages the opportunity to celebrate the many forms of this fandom. This event includes the opportunity for individuals to trade Pokemon cards with other collectors (with staff on hand to look up values of various cards, to participate in a Pokemon Go Go Battle League Tournament, play Pokemon Loteria, and take a picture with Pikachu. Roughly 950 individuals attended this event.

## **OLDER ADULTS**

On February 20th, the Library hosted a genealogy program at Schaefer Branch Library in conjunction with AARP. Sylvia Reyna, Librarian II in Texana, presented on African American Genealogy. Ms. Reyna discussed databases, books, and resources that are available to help discover your family history. This presentation helped community members who are wondering where to begin and how to start their journey. AARP partnered with the library on this program by promoting it to their members as well as by providing attendees with helpful information on topics such as fraud, caregiving and healthy living.

In February, the Library hosted one session each at Great Northwest Branch Library and Encino Branch Library of a four-hour workshop called Dealing with Dementia. This workshop is presented by WellMed Charitable Foundation's Caregiver SOS program. These workshops covered topics such as understanding what dementia is, managing difficult behaviors in loved ones with dementia, and helping caregivers of individuals with dementia to handle stress and find time for themselves.

In February, the Library hosted two sessions of a presentation called Plan Your Retirement Course at Great Northwest Branch Library. These sessions, presented by National Retirement Academy, provided participants with information about planning their retirement and taxes Mission Branch Library continues to offer Mission Table Tennis Club (MTTC) twice per week, however the session offered on Thursday afternoons is attended by many older adults. At MTTC, participants practice single and double play. Participants of all table tennis skill level are also offered the opportunity to improve their game in a friendly environment.

## IV. LOCATION-BASED SERVICES

### Central Library

Programs at the Children’s Library in February were colorful and messy! Children enjoyed multi-sensory experiences with colored ice cubes, contact paper collages, and baking soda and vinegar eruptions. The Tween Time crowd made candy sushi and paper stuffed animals with cotton batting and watched another Harry Potter movie.

Manager Kate Simpson attended the United Way of San Antonio ReadyKidSA quarterly meeting where she met with representatives from other organizations that serve children and families. She and Assistant Manager Shannon Seglin also attended Future of San Antonio: Shaping the Social Determinants of Health for San Antonio’s Future Generations at Texas A&M University at San Antonio. These conferences inspired them to develop several proposals for new services for families at the Children’s Library.

The Teen Library continues to see an average of 60 teens after school on weekdays and teen regulars on Saturdays. As always, teens take ownership of the Teen Library by developing, leading, and engaging in activities that speak to their interests – a

highlight this month included a teen-led Valentine’s Day party in which teens made valentines, chocolate strawberries, and heart-shaped tortillas. In addition, teen volunteers made a book display for Black History Month and prepared book recommendations for the 210teenlibrary Instagram for Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month.

Patrons attending Habla Conmigo led by Information Services staff Patricia Perez and J.D. Elizondo engaged in lively conversation about professions, countries and pastimes in order to practice their Spanish and English language skills. Patrons thanked facilitators for providing this community program. Patrons were provided with print resources for use and were directed to books for support and self-directed learning.

Library Assistants Kristin Gutierrez and Melissa Gomez hosted the Spellbound Book Club where members gathered to discuss the latest paranormal selection *Bride* by Ali Hazelwood: the group dived into spirited conversations and shared their insights. Attendees enjoyed light refreshments in a cozy, welcoming setting that perfectly complemented the book’s atmosphere.

San Antonio Public Library Zine Committee members Jordan Torres and Brianna Glass provided the

Trinity Diversity Connection at Trinity University with a zine workshop at the Central Library. During this lively outreach, 53 attendees were present and artfully willed wonderful zines into existence.

Library Assistant Eliza Perez hosted a unique collage workshop with local artist Kaldric Dow. Dow shared his artistic insights and engaged participants throughout the program. Over half of the participants left comment cards about their positive experience and how much they enjoyed Kaldric's advice and engagement. They requested more weekend arts & crafts programs and more programs highlighting local artists of color.

Learn at Central staff in collaboration with Community Tech Network (CTN) are providing digital literacy classes to 25 participants at Haven for Hope. Participants learn digital skills such as how to create an email account and how to safely navigate the internet. At the end of the program, participants will receive a smartphone with one year of data service.

## **DISTRICT 1**

### **Landa Branch Library**

The Landa Branch Library team is comprised of individuals who enjoy using their talents to provide exceptional library services to the surrounding community, even outside of their regular duties. In late January, tweens at the weekly Tween Time program expressed an interest in learning how to improve their drawing skills to Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas. Knowing he is an exceptional artist, Jasmin asked Circulation Attendant Walden Booker if he would be interested in serving a guest host during a drawing-focused Tween Time. Walden worked with Jasmin to plan accordingly, identifying the types of supplies needed as well as preparing how to be responsive to the tweens' drawing interests and abilities. During the program on February 17, Walden's expertise in art and drawing as well as his friendly demeanor allowed him to offer a great and welcoming environment for tweens to explore art.

Teen volunteers are essential for the success of teen programs at the Landa Branch Library; as the leaders for teen programs, they plan, develop, and implement library activities for themselves and their peers. In these decision-making roles, teen volunteers are responsible for responding to the interests

and needs of the surrounding teen population. After months of offering a Homework Help program, teen volunteers Inaayat, Taj, and Reyna recognized there was not a strong community demand for the program. Working with other teens and teen volunteers, they identified two teen communities of interest at Landa—manga (comics or graphic novels originating from Japan) and chess. Teen volunteer Inaayat took the initiative to lead the “Manga Drawing Book Club,” focusing on learning how to write and draw manga—while teen volunteers Taj and Anthony oversaw the “Teen Chess Club,” providing a welcoming environment for teens to play chess and learn new strategies.

### **San Pedro Branch Library**

In February, the San Pedro Branch held twice monthly “Knights of San Pedro”, where patrons had the opportunity to learn more about chess and have friendly game play. The matches were 30-minute time control for each side with an entire game of 1 hour. Additionally, the branch continued to host “Yarn Over to San Pedro” where the public could knit and crochet different projects. Needle crafters of all kinds were welcomed and invited to bring their own project to work on. Beginners were welcomed as well. Once you get started, we’ll have you hooked! In addition to programs for adults, the San Pedro Branch also curated a “Shelf of Sharing” during February. The shelf provides those in need with items such as socks, knit hats, gloves and scarves. Member of the community also donated items for giveaway.

In February San Pedro Branch Assistant Manager, Karen Braeuler facilitated a monthly book discussion group at Chandler Estate Senior Living Center. Members are supplied with the book checked out from the library, received questions to assist their reading, and then met to discuss the questions. This month’s book selection was “Covenant of Water” by Abraham Verghese. The group has been gathering for nearly two years and continued to be a popular and well attended program. The group at the Chandler Center helped promote life-long learning as well as social engagement with residents.



Staff provided information about the various programs, including access to technology, Learn at SAPL, upcoming events, and resources in digital and print formats. This was an eye-opening experience for him, but he was concerned about the cost but was immediately relieved and delighted to learn that it was all free! His experience definitely speaks to the library’s mission about changing lives through the transformative power of information.

The program was initially introduced as a bi-monthly event, but due to its growing popularity, it is now offered it weekly. February’s trips included: Paris, France; Soho, New York City; Bath, England and Prague, Czech Republic. Participants have really enjoyed the tours that they have taken and are pleased that they can interact with the guides in real-time.



In February BHL Library Assistant Lilliana Aguilar and SAPL/BHL Intern Hoa Luu, a University of North Texas (UNT) Library School student, facilitated BHL Teen Time on Tuesday evenings. Teens decorated the teen space for St. Valentine’s Day, made yarn letters and played video games. They enjoy cooking new foods and eating flavored popcorn as well. A steady group of teens, many from Churchill High School, attend BHL’s Tuesday Teen after school and take a city bus to arrive at the library. A BHL Teen volunteer helps prep for Teen Time each week and create new book displays each week.



The Let’s Move programs include one song in Spanish and counting rhymes in English and Spanish. The counting rhymes are interactive and encourage children and parents to count in any other language.
