City Council Chambers

The City Council convened a regular meeting in the Norma S. Rodriguez Council Chamber in the Municipal Plaza Building beginning at 9:10 a.m. City Clerk Debbie Racca-Sittre took the Roll Call noting a quorum with the following Council Members present:

PROCEDURAL

1. Invocation

The invocation was delivered by Pastor Reverend Carolyn Pittman of Bethel United Methodist Church, guest of Councilmember Cabello Havrda, Council District 6.

2. Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Nirenberg led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mayor Nirenberg recognized the opening day of baseball.

Mayor Nirenberg recognized Monday, March 31, 2025, as Transgender Day of Visibility in San Antonio.

Mayor Nirenberg proclaimed April 5th through 7th to be NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four days in San Antonio.

ITEM FOR STAFF BRIEFING

3. Briefing on the 89th State Legislative Session. [Jeff Coyle, Assistant City Manager; Sally Basurto, Director, Government Affairs]

Sally Basurto, Director of Government Affairs (GA), reported that 8,901 bills and joint resolutions had been filed breaking the record for the most bills filed in a session. She reported that March 14, 2025 was the last day of bill filing and over 2,000 bills were filed in the last three days. She commented that the focus would shift from bill filing to committee hearings and noted that the Senate Bills (SB) were advancing more quickly than the House Bills (HB).

HB 150, filed by Capriglione, would establish the Texas Cyber Command as a component institution of The University of Texas System (UT) that would assume specific cybersecurity responsibilities currently managed by the Department of Information Resources (DIR), according to Basurto. She indicated that Texas Cyber Command would also include the establishment of a cybersecurity threat intelligence center and a cybersecurity incident response unit. Basurto stated that HB 150 was pending at the House Committee on Delivery of Government Efficiency.

Councilmember Whyte provided testimony in support of the Texas Cyber Command being established in San Antonio at the hearing and written testimony in support was given by General Juan Ayala, Director of Military & Veteran's Affairs Department (MVAD).

Basurto provided an update on the East-West Corridor (Parkway) which included City Council adding the Parkway to the Major Thoroughfare Plan. She noted that the State was expected to call for Major Projects in the summer of 2026 and it was the time to add the Parkway to the Metropolitan Planning Organization's (MPO's) Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). Basurto added that Public Works had prepared cost estimates for pre-construction components and submitted a \$12.5 million appropriations request that would include schematic design, environmental, and public engagement.

Basurto reported that HB 2806, filed by Lujan, would allow increased flexibility for Animal Care Services (ACS) Officers to identify and make dangerous dog designations, increased the penalty for multiple bite incidents from a Class C to Class B Misdemeanor, and would restrict ownership of dogs for five years for individuals with multiple convictions for dangerous dog bites. She added that HB 2806 was referred to the Committee on Public Health.

Basurto stated that HB 2325, filed by Campos, would create a statewide registry for dangerous dogs and mandate that the Department of Public Safety collaborate with local animal control authorities to create and maintain a publicly accessible online registry which ACS already did. She noted that HB 2325 had been referred to the Committee on Public Health.

Basurto reported that HB 1816, filed by Lujan, would allow cities and counties to prohibit e-cigarette retailers from operating within 1,000 feet of a public primary or secondary school campus. She mentioned that HB 1816 was not applicable to retailers whose gross receipts from the sale of e-cigarettes were less than 50% of the total gross receipts. Basurto added that HB 1816 was pending at the House Committee on Intergovernmental Affairs. Councilmember Courage submitted written testimony in support.

HB 377, filed by Cortez, would prohibit municipalities from having a services agreement with a property owner earlier than 90 days before the date of annexation and rescind any service agreements entered into through development agreements, according to Basurto. She indicated that HB 377 was referred to the House Committee on Land and Resource Management. Basurto noted that additionally, HB 2345 (Cortez) and companion bill SB 2962 (Campbell) would prohibit municipalities from removing territory from an Emergency Services District (ESD) and being the sole provider for emergency services. She stated that staff opposed the bill because it created a situation where there could be duplicative services in newly annexed territory. Basurto added that HB 377 was referred to the House Committee on Land and Resource Management.

Basurto stated that HB 2736, filed by Cain, proposed three main rules for local elections involving bonds or tax increases. First, it would require approval from at least 2/3 of voters to move forward, according to Basurto. She indicated that elections must take place on the November uniform election date and local governments would not issue bonds without voter approval. Basurto noted that HB 2736 had been referred to the Committee on Pensions, Investments & Financial Services.

Basurto reported that SB 33, (Campbell) / H.B. 1806, (Noble), would prohibit government entities from using taxpayer resources to support abortion assistance entities or provide logistical support for obtaining an abortion. She indicated that the lieutenant governor had prioritized the bill, and it was scheduled for a hearing today.

Basurto stated that HB 727, filed by Cortez, would increase the penalty for the crime of burglary of a vehicle in certain cases. She noted that HB 548, filed by Tepper, would increase the penalties for the crime of burglary of a vehicle. She commented that both bills were pending in the Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence and the City of San Antonio had registered in support of them.

Basurto noted that HB 1866, filed by Lujan, would provide additional State law enforcement authority to National Park Service Officers and was pending at the Committee on Homeland, Public Safety, Veterans. She stated that Councilmember Viagran and Colleen Swain, World Heritage Office Director, were submitting written testimony in support of the bill.

Basurto reported that HB 3345, filed by Lopez, would increase the optional county fee for vehicle registration up to \$20. She indicated that passage of the item would require voter approval and HB 3345 was referred to the Committee on House Transportation Funding.

According to Basurto, SB 15, filed by Bettencourt, would cap minimum lot size for unplatted property of five acres or more and create zoning restrictions for small lots (4000 sq feet and under). She reported that SB 15 had passed the Senate, and the City was opposing the bill.

Basurto stated that SB 19, filed by Middleton, would prohibit a city from spending public funds to hire a lobbyist or pay to a nonprofit State association that contracts with a lobbyist, but would allow city officials and employees to engage in the legislative process in certain defined ways. She noted that SB 19 had passed the Senate, and the City was opposing the bill.

Basurto concluded her presentation by noting that it was for briefing only and no action was required, however, feedback was appreciated.

DISCUSSION:

Mayor Nirenberg thanked the team for its work and recognized Councilmember Pelaez who was the Chair of the Intergovernmental Relations Committee (IGR) to speak.

Councilmember Pelaez explained that the City's job was to advocate for the rights of our City and our residents. He requested clarification on how the ESD related bills would make people safer. Basurto explained that ESDs had requested the bills to be filed. Assistant City Manager Jeff Coyle stated that ESD's claimed they could become insolvent if cities annexed areas that they served because they would lose their tax base. City Manager Walsh explained that the bills were more about financing of ESDs than public safety. Councilmember Pelaez noted that the vaping restrictions were good, but it was poison being marketed to our children and should really be banned altogether.

Councilmember Courage stated that it was ridiculous to expect cities to represent their residents by not showing up or having organizational support and asked Basurto to list bills opposing the hiring of advocates by municipalities. Basurto indicated that the bill she listed was the priority bill.

Councilmember Cabello Havrda asked if City Ordinances were in alignment with the proposed dangerous dogs bills. Basurto stated that they were in alignment with ACS policies. Councilmember Cabello Havrda requested an update on bills related to SB170, and bills that affected foster children or mental health services to children. She noted that while the Texas Cyber Command was an exciting opportunity for San Antonio, she asked how the military might be involved. Ayala explained that his testimony requested the sharing of information with the U.S. Military and National Guard. Councilmember Cabello Havrda noted that the 16th Air Force was elevated to Cyber Command last year.

Councilmember Cabello Havrda noted that HB 727 and HB 548 would elevate the penalty for burglary of a vehicle to a State jail felony. Assistant Chief of Police Jesse Salame stated that any burglary of a vehicle was currently a Class A Misdemeanor and to increase it to a State jail felony would make it punishable for up to two years with a minimum of 180 days in jail and a \$10,000 fine.

Councilmember Cabello Havrda asked how the National Park Service (NPS) Officers role would change under HB 1866. Colleen Swain, Director of World Heritage, stated that this was advocated

by local NPS. Basurto explained that it only increased their authority on their property. Councilmember Cabello Havrda asked about Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) staffing reductions. Basurto stated that SAPD had an agreement with NPS to assist them and go into the park when they called but they were seeking authority to make their own arrests.

Councilmember Viagran supported the progress being made regarding the East-West Corridor and was pleased with the work to protect residents from dangerous dogs. She wanted to continue to track the ESD bills and noted that sometimes these organizations spent their money in ways they did not need; She was also confused about how this made anyone safer. Councilmember Viagran offered to testify in support of the NPS request and requested clarification if she could testify as a Councilmember or testify as a resident.

Councilmember Viagran stated that HB 15 was an opportunity work with regional cities including Castroville, Von Ormy, Floresville, and Fredericksburg. She noted that there were many historic and culturally significant neighborhoods in the southern sector and if the City could not control the development, the history could be lost which was the same concern of those other cities.

Councilmember Castillo noted that vacant lots often became nuisance properties and during the Planning and Community Development Committee (PCDC) meeting State Representative Garcia stated that she had introduced HB 5642 regarding death deeds that could transfer properties to families and clear titles. She noted that HB 32 was a concern of community advocates and casted a wide net that could harm renters and was not narrowly focused on squatters as it purported to. Chief Housing Officer, Mark Carmona stated that his office was concerned with HB 32 but supported HB 5642.

Councilmember Castillo noted that HB 544 would waive the minimum distance where LYTEC projects could be installed. Carmona noted that Transit Oriented Development was a good example of the need to concentrate housing in certain areas.

Councilmember Rocha Garcia requested an update on efforts related to water and requested an update on SB 7 and HB 16. Basurto noted that there were bills related to aging water and sewer infrastructure that were being tracked by SAWS. Councilmember Rocha Garcia requested clarification on when she could testify as a Councilmember versus a resident only. City Attorney, Andy Segovia stated that the City could not prohibit what Councilmembers did on their own, but they should support the City Council's official legislative agenda if they were speaking as a Councilmember, otherwise, they should present themselves only as private citizens.

Councilmember Kaur requested more updates on the affordable housing bills SB 208 to create more workforce housing, SB 234 to provide more funding for Department of Housing and Community Affairs (DHCA), and infrastructure bills SB 148 and HB 542. She also requested an update on SB 175 regarding full day pre-k.

Councilmember Courage asked Ayala if this new Texas Cyber Command Center could try to take over the Federal cybersecurity in Texas. Ayala did not think that the State could take over control of what the military was doing and suggested that this was more related to protecting businesses and the economy. Councilmember Courage observed that raising the penalty for

automobile break-ins meant that many of the folks found guilty of a State jail felony would remain housed in the Bexar County Jail as there were hundreds of State jail felons waiting for the State to take them to the Texas Department of Corrections.

Mayor Nirenberg expressed concern with the sales tax issue regarding changing from sales at origin of sale versus destination of goods which could impact our revenues. He requested more information on how we collected sales tax. Deputy Chief Financial Officer, Troy Elliott, indicated that the State collected the sales tax, and we received our portion from the State, however, it was difficult to analyze the potential impact of the change.

Mayor Nirenberg noted that the Item was for briefing only so no action was taken.
