San Antonio Public Library Director's Report

June 2023

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DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

The following is a summary of notable activities during the month of June related to the Library Director's professional involvement and his engagement with San Antonio Public Library stakeholders.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar virtually attended the Local Government Hispanic Network Board of Directors Monthly Meeting on June 2, 2023.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar attended the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library Board meeting on June 4, 2023. Director Salazar presented the results of the Future of SAPL/FoSAPL Partnership Assessment Study and addressed questions from the attendees.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar attended the Library's FY 2024 Capital Budget Development meetings on June 8, and June 13, 2023.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar met with Assistant City Manager David McCary, Library Board of Trustees Vice Chair Juspreet Kaur, and Bexar County staff to discuss the new Interlocal Agreement with Bexar County for Library Services on June 9, 2023.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar met with the Office of Management and Budget to discuss the Library's FY 2024 Budget on June 14, 2023.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar met with the City Manager and the Office of Management and Budget to discuss the Library's FY 2024 Budget Review on June 20, 2023.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar attended the CoSA Black and African American Employee Affinity Group Mentorship Graduation on June 20, 2023. The Library department had two graduates in the mentor program.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar virtually attended the National Museum and Library Science Board new member orientation on June 29, 2023.

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COMMUNICATIONS

The Summer with SAPL Kickoff, information about summer programming, information about cooling centers, and the ELLA Awards were the main subjects of media coverage and marketing initiatives for San Antonio Public Library in June. These stories garnered significant media attention and led to well-attended programs all month long. The Communications Team also began developing campaigns to announce the rollout of new read-along collection items in the collection and the July 4 holiday closure messaging.

- June 16 - KSAT 12 shared information on cooling centers open on Juneteenth and mentioned four San Antonio Public Library locations open.
- June 20 - KSAT 12 aired an interview featuring Summer with SAPL information yesterday. Children's Services Librarian Linda Lopez participated in the interview as a SAPL representative. This was originally filmed on Tuesday, June 13 but didn't air until Tuesday, June 20 due to a special report that took place on the day of filming.
- June 28 - KSAT 12 highlighted two Summer with SAPL programs happening on Wednesday, June 28.
- June 29 - TPR highlighted SAPL's Virtual Live Trivial in their community events calendar.

Graphics

The Graphics Team created publicity materials for a variety of programs and events during this reporting period, including Summer with SAPL, the ELLA Awards, Texana Interim Service and Pride Month, as well as social media and other promotions for branch events.

DIGITAL SERVICES

On June 6, Digital Services Coordinator Adam Spana and Library Services Administrator Adam Zaby met with ITSD Business Relationship Manager Cynthia Ramirez to draft a business services overview for two systems (online registration and renewal & digital asset management) in preparation for FY24 budget requests.

On June 29, Mr. Spana convened a meeting with Digital Library Services Supervisor Rolf Laun, Access Services Manager Sarah Linley, ITSD Business Relationship Manager Cynthia Ramirez to improve workflows associated with ILS records of laptops for public use and annual laptop replacements.

LATINO COLLECTION & RESOURCE CENTER

On June 1, historian, author, and ASU professor Eduardo Pagán virtually presented his book, *Murder at the Sleepy Lagoon*, to 11 of our library patrons. His book explores the social history of the Zoot Suit Riots, and the program took place on the 80th anniversary of these events.

June 3, the LCRC participated in community outreach at Potranco's, Concrete Canvas event. LCRC engaged with 98 people, passing out SAPL merch, while sharing SAPL & LCRC resources and services with the community.



LITTLE READ WAGON

Summer means play for the Little Read Wagon (LRW) team. During the month of June, staff hosted 12 play events enjoyed by 1,890 community members. Staff were busy with the planning, material preparation and clean up, along with planning for the upcoming school year.

LRW staff installed a large-scale, temporary play experience on the first Saturday of June outside the San Pedro Branch Library. Shaded by the huge Live Oak trees, families constructed with big blue blocks, engineered with ramps, tinkered with loose parts, experimented with channeling water, dug in the sand, and created art. San Pedro Branch was chosen because of the large trees that provide deep shade all day long, and for its central location with easy access from around the San Antonio area.

There are two weekly outdoor play events for the summer. On Wednesdays at Martin Luther King Park LRW staff set up a Play Lab near a pavilion closest to the splash pad. Materials are edited to provide immersive play experiences for children. In June, children have explored messy materials like coffee dirt, shaving cream, slime, kinetic sand, and paint, as well as cardboard, big blue blocks, obstacle courses, balls, hula hoops, and wobble bowls. The event begins at 10:00 am and ends at 12:00 pm, unless heat advisories indicate adverse effects of being outside at noon. Martin Luther King Park is well shaded and located on the east side of San Antonio, in a community where family play activities are not widely available.

On Thursdays, staff visit Pearsall Park for the Water Play Lab. Materials are set out for children to borrow and return. All the materials are for use in the splash pad. Items available include collapsible silicone buckets (so they do not break), stacking cups, jugs, spray bottles, sponges, colorful balls that absorb water, and umbrellas. A tuff tray filled with water and small silicone suction cup toys provide a different sort of water play. Pearsall Park is located in the southwest side of San Antonio and is heavily traveled by families looking to cool down and play in the water. LRW staff had planned two shifts so that families could access materials from about 10:00 am until 2:00 pm, but the record-breaking heat indexes have forced staff to end at 12:00 pm.

LRW staff are working with City of San Antonio Parks and Recreation staff to host a Tuesday evening, indoor play event. This is the first Let's Play held at an air-conditioned community center hosted with Parks staff. Each week, LRW staff arrive to train two new Parks staffers (who rotate through each week so that the entire staff group can experience the event) in free play and interacting with families with young children. Families play, each child chooses a book to take home, and the library provides a substantial snack pack since the event runs from 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm. The Palm Heights Recreation Center is located off Nogalitos Street, near the Collins Garden Branch Library. Let's Play! Family Nights will take place Tuesday evenings through August 1.



CHILDREN'S (SYSTEM-WIDE)

June was packed with Summer with SAPL activities. Library locations welcomed large crowds of children and accompanying adults to regular weekly offerings as well as featured guest events. Professor Universe kicked off the series with high-energy and informative shows at the Pruitt, Cody, Johnston, and Memorial libraries. Perennial guests Richard Blake, Happy Tails, and Opera San Antonio returned with multiple appearances. BK Bones made her San Antonio Public Library debut with her show about what makes a dinosaur a dinosaur.

Children across San Antonio have been adding their paleta cards, paper chains, dot stickers, and more to collaborative displays. The cards include delightful drawings and statements about how the children plan to spend their Summer with SAPL. Several locations also have been participating in letter exchanges, giving children opportunities to share their experiences and perspectives with peers who visit other library locations.

On June 20, two community members were recognized with Excellence in Library Leadership and Advocacy awards for their contributions to SAPL and particularly children's services. Lisa Kulka was recognized for her role in bringing the vision of Public Library Connect, a partnership between public libraries and schools via Overdrive, to fruition. San Antonio Philharmonic was recognized for several years of bringing professional musicians to SAPL locations.

Coordinator of Children's Services, Cresencia Huff, attended the annual conference of the American Library Association, June 23-27. Ms. Huff presented alongside Elsie Purcell (Hondo Public Library) and staff from the Space Science Institute. The session, "Procrastinator's Guide to the Solar Eclipse" was packed with librarians who arrived early for the 9:00AM program. Ms. Huff and Ms. Purcell also took turns fielding questions at the Space Science Institute booth on the exhibit floor and attended several informative education sessions.



TEENS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

Virtual Teen Programs and Activities – The 210teenlibrary Discord workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza (Teen Services Librarian II / Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and consisting of Teen Services Librarians and Liaisons from around the system collaborated with virtual teen volunteers ("Teen Mods") to host weekly virtual teen activities ("clubs") on Discord ("the server") and provide meaningful peer-to-peer connections. With the start of Teen Summer, clubs moved to earlier times as requested by teens and two clubs returned by popular demand – Bookworms (a book discussion club) and Tryday Friday (a tabletop gaming club). Additionally, a new writing club launched on the server as well as a design contest to recreate the server's mascot (a turtle named Mentions). Teens continued to request new channels that were relevant to their interests, attended clubs and additional activities, and made meaningful

connections with their peers through conversations throughout the day. Teens on the server also worked together to plan this year's Teen Summer Bash in July.

Virtual Teen Content and Resources – The 210teenlibrary Instagram workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza and consisting of Amisahari Sarabia (Teen Services Outreach Specialist, Teen Library @ Central), Ciana Flores (Teen Services Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central), and Regina Almanza (Teen Services Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central) shared information, resources, activities, and other content for teens on Instagram, created by teen volunteers and Teen Services staff. During the reporting period, teens and teen volunteers provided book reviews and book displays; showcased popular food demos including a hot Cheeto salad, iced strawberry milk, and cherry limeade; highlighted the Teen Pride Party held at the Teen Library; and shared informational content and daily celebrations through Stories.

Teen Summer – Teen Summer 2023 kicked off on June 1. Teens were invited to visit their nearest library location to pick up their official Teen Summer 2023 t-shirt, designed by teen artist Percy, and participate in weekly summer activities in-person and/or online on the Teen Services Discord server.

Pride Month – Teen Services hosted a Pride party on June 10 in the Teen Library at Central. Members of the Teen Pride workgroup facilitated the event for teens, including Shannan Prukop (Teen Services Librarian II / Assistant Manager, Forest Hills Branch), Dacari Lambert (Teen Services Librarian I, Schaefer Branch), Lisa Puchot (Teen Services Librarian I, Great Northwest Branch), Lauren Hime (Teen Services Librarian I, Pruitt Branch), and Michael Harle (Teen Services Librarian I, Encino Branch). Teen volunteers decorated the Teen Library to give it a Pride flair, and during the party teens made rainbow waffles and pancakes, made their own Pride stickers, and built their own Pride bookstacks to create a keychain, earrings or a necklace.

Professional Development – On June 14, Communications at the San Antonio Public Library asked Matthew Loaiza to represent Teen Services during a TVSA interview to provide details about Teen Summer 2023. On June 20, Loaiza attended the ELLA Awards to recognize Fiesta Youth's work in providing safe spaces for LGBTQ+ teens in San Antonio, as well as for their continued partnership with Teen Services at the San Antonio Public Library.

ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

On June 1, historian, author, and ASU professor Eduardo Pagán virtually presented his book, *Murder at the Sleepy Lagoon*, to 11 of our library patrons. His book explores the social history of the Zoot Suit Riots and the program took place on the 80th anniversary of these events.

Potranco Library hosted *Concrete Canvas: The Art and Rhythm of Street Culture* on the first Saturday evening in June. This event featured break dancers, street artists and DJ Nova Soul entertained the crowd. The evening ended with a performance by Los Angeles rapper Vel Nine. The program showcased the positive impact street culture can have on the community. Inviting a rapper, street artists and break dancers gave the community a new and refreshing view of library programs.

The Library celebrated throughout the month of June. Events that occurred during the month included two sessions of a program called *Fashion with Pride* at Cody, with attendees learning sewing machine basics and simple ways to upcycle clothes for personal expression with local fashion designer Lorena Auguste. UTSA Assistant Archivist and LGBTQIA+ historian Melissa Gohlke presented at Cody on San Antonio's *History of Gender Diversity in Trans Temporal* on June 22. Several locations (including Thousand Oaks, Forest Hills and Cody) hosted *Tabletop Gaymer Night*, which offers individuals who identify as LGBTQIA+ to play tabletop games and socialize in a safe space. Finally, the library hosted another session of *Gender Transitioning Know Your Rights*, which provides information about the resources available to individuals seeking to affirm their legal name and gender marker. This session, which occurred via Zoom and was presented by staff from St. Mary's School of Law Pro Bono Program and Texas Rio Grande Legal Aid, also provided individuals the opportunity to ask questions about the process of seeking a legal gender transition.

During the month of June, the Library celebrated Juneteenth through events at many library locations. Highlights include an event at Carver Branch Library on June 10th. The event included a panel discussion and the return of the popular Nias and Beverly Harris Africana Collection, featuring sculpture and carved images imported primarily from Ghana. Additionally, beginning June 15th and running through July 25th. Parman Branch Library is hosting an exhibit from renowned artist John Coleman. Coleman's art depicts daily African American life throughout history such as during the events of Juneteenth and in the time of the Harlem Renaissance. Finally, on June 17th, Guerra Branch Library hosted the musical group Cox Family Singers. This group performed songs of liberty in celebration of Juneteenth.

Summer with SAPL for Adults kicked off during the month of June. Coordinator of Services to Adults Morgan Yoshimura and Adult Services Librarian II Ann Laird (Encino) were present at the kickoff at Central Library on May 31st. These two staff members provided information about this year's program and demonstrated two craft opportunities – decoupage seashells and paper quilling – that would be available to adults at various locations throughout the summer. To participate in Summer with SAPL, adults can visit any library location. They will receive a San Antonio Public Library branded stylus pen OR Summer with SAPL limited edition button (both available while supplies last), as well as a paleta card to share their goal for the summer. Goals can include reading or listening to books participating in library activities, or participating in activities that the library has inspired them to learn more about. Adults are encouraged to give their paleta goal card to library staff so that it can be displayed for everyone to see, and to return to the library when they complete their goal so that Library staff can celebrate with them. Adults are also invited to participate in Flamingo Bingo again this year, which provides a number of tasks related to libraries and reading for individuals to complete. When they complete enough tasks to achieve a bingo, they can return to the library to receive a flamingo related prize.

OLDER ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

A Speed Friending for Older Adults program was held on Monday, June 26 at Great Northwest, facilitated by Library Assistant Donna Borel. Five library patrons attended the June event and enjoyed refreshments and asking and answering funny and interesting questions designed to help the group become acquainted quickly. What started out as one-on-one conversations turned into a friendly group discussion. The group expressed interest in more Speed Friending events in the future.

In June, the library hosted a workshop by AARP on their SmartDriverTEK program at three library locations (Bazan, Potranco and Igo). Individuals who attended these sessions learned about the latest vehicle safety technologies, and how to use them. These sessions also helped attendees recognize how these technologies might enhance their driving safety and extend their safe driving years.

CENTRAL LIBRARY

CHILDREN'S LIBRARY



The Mayor's Summer Reading Club kicked off at the Children's Library at Central with a press conference in the Story Room. Families and stakeholders listened to Mayor Ron Nirenberg give inspiring remarks about the reading program and the San Antonio Public Library, then enjoyed a sampling of the activities for adults, teens and children that the Library planned to offer this summer.

Throughout the month of June, families streamed into the Children's Library at Central, many for the first time since the space reopened after the transformative renovation. Several summer camp groups visited as well. All agreed the new space was a lot of fun and most families left with large armloads of books! Participation in the Mayor's Summer Reading Club was enthusiastic as well. By the end of June, nearly 1,000 children had received free books from the Children's Library. Children contributed their messages on hundreds of paletas cards that adorned the large wall in the Play Area.

The first two Saturdays of June brought exciting performers to the Children's Library. Over 100 people attended each event: Illusions by Blake and Once in a Wild.

Manager Kate Simpson appeared on KSAT TV promoting the newly renovated Children's Library at Central and the Mayor's Summer Reading Club. She shared some of the features of the new space and how they relate to the mission of supporting children's learning through play.

Assistant Manager Shannon Seglin and Librarians Ashley Stubbs and Melissa Fulmer presented weekly programs in a unique collaborative model in which each librarian took the lead over a program series, and the others took turns assisting in developing and presenting the events. This structure provided support and growth opportunities for all involved as they learned from each other and tried new ideas.

Ms. Seglin was the lead librarian for the weekly Family Story Time series. This program has developed a core group of regularly attending families, who have looked forward to participating in interactive songs,

readings and activities, as well as making new friends. Ms. Seglin also took the lead on the bi-weekly Let's Move! programs. These programs focused on dance, yoga poses, and obstacle course play.

Ms. Stubbs led weekly Tween Time programs, with assistance from the other librarians, in which kids engaged in activities with a different theme each week. The first week they explored robots, such as Botley and Ozobot, as well as circuit sets. The next week they got creative with yarn, pipe cleaners, and foil and decorated key chains with fabric paint. The third week was game-themed, with different board game available for kids to play. The last Tween Time of the month featured a special showing of The Super Mario Bros. movie, complete with popcorn!

Ms. Stubbs also pioneered a new feature at the Children's Library this summer – the Tween Zine! During Tween Time, children submitted their artwork or poems to the mini magazine, which she compiled, printed and distributed in the tween area of the Children's Library. She has given these older kids ownership of the library with this innovative approach. It has been very well received.

Ms. Fulmer led the Let's Create! program, along with assistance from Ms. Seglin and Ms. Stubbs. In each week's program, children got to sample a variety of artistic mediums, such as clay sculpture, painting, paper collage, chalk art, pencil drawing and salt painting. This program has maintained an impressive attendance throughout the month.

Ms. Seglin assisted librarians at other locations several times in June. She helped to set up and clean up and interacted with families during the Encino Branch Library's huge bubble-themed Summer Kick Off Party. She also led a Let's Move! program and the San Pedro Branch Library in the absence of the children's librarian.

Ms. Fulmer continued to contribute to virtual programming for children in June. She led children in an art activity for two sessions of Art Club Online. She also participated in Baby Time Online every week. Both she and Ms. Stubbs recorded a story each for the Library's Dial-A-Story service as well.

Children's Library staff continued to develop outreach connections with area childcare centers and schools. Ms. Stubbs visited Central Christian Day School twice and presented story times to children and brought books for the teachers. Ms. Seglin shared stories and songs with children at Madison Square Child Development Center and delivered library books in support of their curriculum. She also began visiting the CreativKids camp at Temple Beth-El, where she shared songs and stories twice in June. Ms. Simpson delivered books to two classrooms at the Discovery School in support of their summer program.

TEEN LIBRARY

Kathleen Fordyce (Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and Connie Hejl (Teen Services Librarian I, Tobin Branch) host the "Random Fandom" club Thursdays on Discord, in which teens engage in discussions about fandoms that interest them and stream their favorite anime or pop culture shows. Kathleen also leads the 2023 Teen Summer workgroup.

Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager) continues to lead the 210teenlibrary Discord and Instagram workgroups. He also joins Daniella Toll (Assistant Manager / Teen Services Librarian II, Collins Garden Branch) for "Teen Time" every Friday on the Discord server.

Rosalie Barrera (Librarian I) joins Cassie Garza (Teen Librarian II / Assistant Manager, Bazan Branch) on Tuesdays to help to facilitate the weekly "Gaming Club" on Discord, in which teens enthusiastically stream, play, and discuss video games. Rosalie continues to support and engage with teens as they explore and activate the Teen Library as their own space to serve their needs, such as studying, crafting, gaming, or gathering with friends.

At the beginning of the reporting period, Rosalie and Grace Holt (Teen Librarian II / Assistant Manager, Brook Hollow Branch) visited San Antonio Positive Solutions Charter School for an outreach opportunity. Rosalie provided two presentations to share information about Teen Summer and the Teen Library at Central. After each presentation, teens were invited to participate in a button-making activity. Many teens expressed great interest in learning more about teen volunteer opportunities at the library.

During the reporting period, the Teen Library at Central welcomed three teen interns from the Family Service Association (FSA) Summer Internship Program. The FSA summer internship program provides paid, part-time internships for local middle and high school students to build career opportunities and goals. Rosalie is the direct supervisor to the FSA teen interns who will be working their internships at the Teen Library from June 19-August 4. The interns will gain real-world work experience at the Teen Library by completing job tasks such as shelving, sharing their art for displays, planning and implementing weekly activities for their peers, and contributing to creating a safe and welcoming environment for other teens to experience the Teen Library.

Regina Almanza (Library Assistant): The first day of Teen Summer coincided with the last day of school, so teens received their official TS23 t-shirt before beginning the first official Teen Summer Tuesday activity: making a teen-created dish they called meatball sub toasts. On Tuesdays, teens participate in events they suggested, based on social media videos seen, something new to try, or past activities done here they would like to repeat. These activities allow them the chance to pick up a new skill, taste a new food, or show their peers tips and tricks. Activities have highlighted general teen interest and celebrations, such as celebrating Pride Month, summer, and new foods. Teens made rainbow pancakes, mini pizzas using a simple two-ingredient dough, rainbow frosting swirl cupcakes, cloud drinks, fresh strawberry lemonade, and various crafts. One teen, attending summer school, recently tasted broccoli cheddar soup for the first time on campus and wondered if it could be made here. Supplies were bought and while that particular teen arrived late, others also had a new experience making and tasting this dish. The verdict was mixed, but the teamwork displayed was fantastic. Summer interns, current and new teen volunteers have been finding ways to participate actively in Teen Tuesday occurrences. The results have been precious, and a Shark Party is in the works. An anecdote from Regina: As Teen Library staff member Regina Almanza was walking back into the Central Library from lunch, a teen waved to her as the teen and her mom were walking out of the building. Regina greeted the teen—Gabby, a “regular” in the Teen Library—and the mother stopped and asked, “Are you Regina?” Regina replied, “Yes,” and the mother shook her hand and proceeded to tell her that Gabby has mentioned her before when talking about the Library. The mom said, “Thank you for providing a place for them [teens] to go to.” Regina replied, “Of course, it’s what we are here for.” The mom also mentioned that she appreciated that with the teen space, they have other caring adults in their lives and how important that was. She said she was glad to be able to place the name with the face.

Ciana Flores (Library Assistant PT) continues to engage with teens both in the Teen Library and via the 210teenlibrary Instagram page. She is responsible for the 3D printing requests from teens on the Discord server. Ciana prints and sends the requested item out to the teens' preferred library branch for pick up.

Amisarahi Sarabia (SAPL's Teen Outreach Specialist / Library Assistant) assists in the Teen Library, in addition to the off-site delivery of library services she conducts in the community. Amisarahi hosts Music Mondays on the 210teenlibrary Discord server in which teens stream their favorite songs and artists while chatting with friends on the server.

INFORMATION SERVICES

For Juneteenth, Melissa Gomez and Stacey Martinez created a display highlighting works from the African American community to celebrate black culture. The display items consisted of works by prominent black authors, inspirational media and accounts of significant moments in history.



On June 16, 2023, Jordan Torres, Arland Schnacker, and Carver Staff Shauna Mendoza participated in an Audie L Murphy VA Medical Center outreach. Staff discussed San Antonio Public Library (SAPL), SAPL Cards, the Libby app, library programs, and the Central Library Art Walk. Staff were able to network with other organizations to find mental health, wellness, and community resources for our veteran patrons to better serve them. This program was a success and SAPL was asked to participate in their next event.



On June 17, Arland Schnacker hosted his "The Beat the Heat program" involving DIY Emergency AC Units. The program consisted of a PowerPoint presentation and a hands-on demonstration where patrons assisted the instructor in building the AC.

On June 20, Bettina Hernandez from Information Services and Jennifer Tristan from Great Northwest hosted an outreach table at Movies by Moonlight held at Travis Park. They spoke to roughly 25 patrons and informed them of library services and programs.

On June 29, Sally Bauer and Morgan Yoshimura hosted: Gender Transitioning: Know Your Rights. This Zoom session was an informational webinar letting the community know about the resources available to individuals seeking to affirm their legal name and gender marker. Staff explored where and how to obtain the documents needed to complete the process and services that are offered, as well as answering questions about the process.

On June 30th Librarian Patricia Perez participated at an outreach event at District 5 Senior Center. Information about ebooks and upcoming events was presented to twenty-seven seniors.

For the International Day of Yoga celebration, Pannaga Prasad arranged system-wide yoga programs on various aspects of yoga. Programs were hosted at Collins Garden on June 17, Cortez on June 20, Parman on June 20, Igo on June 21, Cody on June 21, San Pedro on June 23 and Johnston on June 24th. These programs were offered by Idoyogasa Organization yoga teachers.

On June 22, Sarah De La Rosa and Pannaga Prasad offered an in-person program entitled Yoga at Central Library: 9th International Day of Yoga celebration in conjunction with Idoyogasa organization of San Antonio, Texas. It was offered by Sarah De La Rosa, Registered Yoga Teacher. The attendees learned beginner friendly yoga. Mats were provided for class practice.

On June 24, a Chair Yoga virtual class was offered by Pannaga Prasad and Patricia Perez over the Library Zoom platform. It was presented by Ashley Ludwick, a professional Yoga Instructor. The instructor taught chair yoga in a fun-filled way, offering options for seated postures, standing with chair support,

connecting within, and find inner peace through breathing exercise techniques.

A yoga themed display provided patrons with DVD and book selections in both English and Spanish to accompany the International Yoga programming



LEARN AT CENTRAL

Learn at Central continues to build a welcoming community to adult learners. Our focus is to empower our patrons to build skills in computer training, job search/support and other digital literacy and community navigation topics that revolve around social services. During the month of June, Learn at Central reached out to the Rehabarama Program as well as Opportunity Home to gain insight in their application processes in order to assist with the influx of patron applications that are coming to Learn. Also, during the month of June, Daniel Gonzalez hosted Empowerhouse's digital inclusion team to sit in on one of the Learn Center's 'Intro to Computer' classes. The 'Intro to Computers' class happens every Wednesday evening at Central and is offered in both Spanish and English languages.

June wrapped up our iPad Tutorial class as well as our Civis Citizenship class.

Learn at Central's Librarian II and Supervisor of Learn, Angelina Cortes, is currently being trained in Trauma-Informed Librarianship and has taken trainings through nnlm.gov, and UTSA's School of Social Work Clinical Assistant Professor, Patrick Lloyd, whom she will meet with in July about hosting a future workshop on such topics system-wide.

TEXANA/ GENEALOGY

In celebration of Juneteenth, Librarian Sylvia Reyna was invited to present the family history class *Discovering Your African American Genealogy* at Memorial Library on June 13. Ms. Reyna reviewed resources and research techniques specific to patrons of African American descent.

Librarian Andy Crews presented a class June 21 on *Using Census Records in Genealogy Research* at the Lion's Field Senior and Adult Center. He also led an online *Beginning Genealogy* class on June 26. The presentation covered how to start researching in historical records and where to look for important clues to help on the journey to finding your family's history.

On June 27, Texana and Central Library staff celebrated with Librarian Matt De Waelsche, along with his family and friends, his retirement from the city after 27 years of service. In perhaps his most significant role, Mr. De Waelsche served as caretaker for the Library's *African American Funeral Programs of San Antonio* collection, seeking out donations as well as updating the department's records and coordinating the digitization of the programs with the University of North Texas's *Portal to Texas History*. He enjoyed making community connections, working with patrons, and was always eager to assist with the simplest or most difficult of projects. His enthusiasm and quirky sense of humor will be missed.



This month Texana staff completed packing the Library's Texana/Genealogy special collections to prepare items for off-site storage during the 6th floor renovations. Staff reached a milestone when the very last book from the vault was pulled from the shelf and packed mid-June. A total of 223 pallets of collections were packed, which included 20 pallets of materials that had been stored at the City's Municipal Archives and Records storage facility (MAR). In addition to packing, staff organized a curated and "limited" selection of special collections that will be available to researchers through a temporary interim space located on the first floor of Central Library.

The Bazan branch served as a COSA cooling center on the Juneteenth holiday. Ms. Garza volunteered to serve as the LIC and was assisted by Jessica Zurita and Mark Loiselle from Administration. The library saw many people come and cool off in the library's meeting room while watching movies and perusing periodicals.

The Bad Girls Book Club (BGBC), led by Library Assistant Enedina Prater, celebrated 5 years at SAPL! The romance book group had several new members who attended the meeting and were very active in the group. In celebration of Pride Month, the BGBC read *Delilah Green Doesn't Care* by Ashley Herring Blake. It is the first book of the Bright Falls series and the entire group loved the story. BGBC have several members who are part of the LGBTQ+, and felt this book resonated with them in many ways.

CARVER

Nearly 50 people gathered here on Saturday, June 10 to celebrate Juneteenth. The event included a panel discussion and the return of the popular Nias and Beverly Harris Africana Collection, featuring sculpture and carved images imported primarily from Ghana. The collection filled two brand new display cases gifted by the Friends of Carver Library. CODY

A whole new lineup of children's programming was introduced at the Cody Library this month, by Children's Librarian Kristin Yourdon. Twice per week the branch hosted new programs called Babies Explore and Littles Explore. These programs are child-led play-based programs designed to allow children to learn through self-discovery and play. A favorite program was our water play day. Children played with a water sensory bin with a teapot, cups, dishes, and jumbo droppers. In another water sensory bin children washed animals using sponges. At the art station kids dipped chalk in water and drew with them on black paper. There were a variety of other play materials and books to explore as well.

More than once, patrons expressed gratitude that the library held these programs for the community and asked that such programming continue beyond Pride Month. Tabletop Gaymer Night continues to be well attended.

Displays at Cody included a Texas Authors table, created by Library Aide Delina Yirgaalem, and a DVD display of Pride titles, maintained by Circulation staff member Savannah Barmore.

On June 20, Circulation Attendant Maria Treviño facilitated the second Art for Wellness event for Pride Month, called Be Artful, Be Mindful, Be Proud. The program promotes art as a therapeutic tool for mental wellness and provides a safe space for community engagement. Be Artful, Be Mindful will be transitioning into a monthly program beginning August 1, due to popular demand.

So far they have learned to make tie dye scrunchies, earrings, repurposed book art, and abstract watercolor with Sharpie designs. It has been fun to see the students learn as they explore these new projects.

Each Wednesday this summer we have featured either a special program or art project for elementary kids. Students really enjoyed learning about dinosaurs and fossils from BK Bones and seeing all sorts of live animals from Happy Tails. Our art projects so far have featured watercolor bookmarks, sock monsters and clay fossils.

Encino Branch's "Read to a Dog" program continues to be a success every second and fourth Tuesday. Dorothy the dog comes ready to listen to stories read by the children, and the children enjoy reading and bonding with Dorothy.

Catered to working parents, "Swing in for a Story" grows in success every Sunday morning at 11am. Children listen to a story, participate in a song with a dance, and then go outside to the playground. While outside, Librarian I Krystal Owen also provides outdoor-friendly toys and/or a craft to make if desired. This month the children participated in a celebration of summer months, a special Father's Day program, and played with chalk, jump rope, frisbees, and bubbles!

Teens

For the month of June, Teen Librarian Michael Harle observed that the teen patrons and volunteers of Encino continue their dedication to the space, but are lacking in direction. Michael spent the month surveying his Encino co-workers and gathering information from his teen service peers to develop a new orientation/re-orientation for teens, aiming to increase their confidence in shelving, asking questions, and understanding the expectations of the space. These trainings will go into effect in July, with all teen volunteers (current and new) expected to attend.

Teen Time at Encino continues to be well-attended, and one regular teen volunteer has expressed interest in adding a similar program on Monday evenings, which Michael will work with them to develop in August. Michael also continues to assist with teen events throughout the system, including the Pride Party at Central, Bookworms on Discord, and the upcoming SanJapan event in September.

Adult

Encino Adults have had three Summer crafting opportunities this month. On June 5 Librarian Ann Laird led a group in creating mini Pom Pom Cacti. On June 12 patrons enjoyed making colorful tassel keychains, and on June 26 we created Coastal Coasters with mason jar lids, pebbles, and seashells!

Encino has also hosted a Summer Movie Series, showing a different Summer themed movie each week. So far, there have been showings of *Hotel Transylvania 3*, *Sisterhood of the Traveling Pants*, and *Luca*. It has been a great opportunity for the patrons to beat the Summer heat, and enjoy a light snack.

Ann Laird has continued her outreach series with Franklin Park Assisted Living. Each month she has been going to Franklin Park to do an "author talk" featuring a different author each month. June's featured author was David Baldacci.

Ann has also been working with the "Getting Ahead" workgroup as part of SAPL's strategic planning work.

FOREST HILLS

Branch Manager Mary Naylor visited the Doris Griffin Senior Center to host the monthly book club. The group discussed *The Measure* by Nikki Erlick. One of the group members celebrated her birthday by bringing sweets for the group to share.

Teen Librarian Shannan Prukop started a weekly program in June for the summer called Family Movie Matinee to give families a way to beat the heat on Friday afternoons, with varied attendance week to week. Their weekly Teen Time program moved up to 4:00 for the summer to accommodate teens being out of school and reflect the children's program Lego Time; a regular group of teens has attended, hanging out and engaging in decision making and activities each week. Forest Hills was honored to host the monthly Teen Services meeting, giving Teen Services staff an opportunity to see the building and changes made in the renovations. The podcast project Mx. Prukop had been building along with Dacari

Lambert, Lisa Puchot, and Michael Dunbar-Rodney went live in June; the team is excited to continue recording and releasing episodes. In the virtual space, Mx. Prukop continued running their weekly Dungeons and Dragons club on the 210teenlibrary Discord server, with new teens joining and regular attendees helping them learn the ropes. They were also excited to help with the return of Tryday Friday, a club from the early days of the Discord server, this time teen-lead. It's still in its early days, but with teen investment, it's building interest and teaching teens critical thinking skills and cooperation.

Children's Librarian Ana Menchaca hosted weekly Story Time, Kids Time, Tween Book Club, and Lego Time throughout the month of June, as well as a bilingual Storytime with the theme of food. Kids and parents have enjoyed the activities so far. Some programs of particular note include Once in A Wild's visit; children and parents were thrilled to learn so many facts about the animals they brought coupled with the opportunity to see them up close, and families roared with laughter in the program "Minute to Win It." Ms. Menchaca set up several stations with different challenging games, including one table with plastic cups filled with various amounts of water; children had to look under the cups to find stickers without spilling any water. Another table had Pictionary, with various degrees of difficulty. She also continued to participate in virtual programming, helping with both Virtual Family Story Time and Virtual Baby Time. Library Assistant Shy Axelrod continued leading the Forest Hills Scrabble Club which met twice this month. They discovered the actual rules for how to win and had a good laugh about that, and are looking forward to the group continuing to grow as they like the competition and the conversations that come with more people involved. In addition, Ms. Axelrod, with support from the Pride Committee, acts as a new host of the Gaymer tabletop night, on the last Saturday of each month. A game of Scrabble as well as a game of Uno were played to great cheer. She also hosts a **BYOB** book club on the second Saturday of the month; June's theme was to read a book by an author you've never read before. A wonderful conversation about the different books ensued.

GREAT NORTHWEST

Great Northwest Library has begun their summer programs with the kids. Six programs have been provided for preschool through middle school age children each week. The afternoon programs have been much appreciated by the families who enjoy a fun reprieve from the heat. Irwin, a volunteer, built a cardboard pirate ship to ride above the aquarium this summer. The families appreciated the decoration.

Opera San Antonio came on Saturday, June 17 to entertain the community and show kids how fun the opera can be. Over 100 people were in attendance.

In celebration of Pride Month, teens systemwide planned and implemented Pride events all throughout San Antonio Public Library, including a Teen Pride party at Central Library, hosted by the Pride workgroup in Teen Services. This yearly event is spearheaded by the 210 Teen Library Discord server, an online forum, where teens can connect, join online clubs and activities, and help plan events such as the Pride party using an online survey. This year teens voted on food and activities, which included rainbow pancakes, jewelry making, creating a custom polymer clay library book, and they even made their own party playlist! Meanwhile at Great Northwest Library, teen volunteer Benjamin Rodriguez curated a Teen LGBTQ+ Booklist, which can be found online at SAPL Bibliocommons, once again made by a teen, for teens!

Teens also helped curate a book display for their branch and made bookmarks representing each LGBTQ+ flag for the teen space. Great Northwest teens and teen volunteers meet up every month to plan and implement all teen time events, including voting on four LGBTQ+ movies to watch every Tuesday in June. New teens have joined the group and worked with the regulars and teen librarian, Annie Calonico, to plan activities and get materials for future Teen Times. The teens assisted in programming for Teen Time such as making stickers and buttons, playing board games, sharing music, and creating their own artwork on small canvases and on butcher paper.

LEARN's Training Officer, Marcella McGowan, presented *Civics for Citizenship* on June 7th, 14th, 21st and 28th. She hosted Sunday's *Intro to Word* on June 4th, 11th, 18th, and 25th. The Learn area had 22 patrons accessing the Center this month.

LANDA

June children's programming at Landa was extremely successful and busy! Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas offered more than forty in-person programs for children with over 1,800 people in attendance all month long. By the end of June, 650 children participated in the Summer with SAPL program, and more than 680 books were given away to children under the age of 13.

Landa Library's most popular program in June brought in an attendance of 300 and was paid for by the Friends of Landa Library. The event was an animal meet and greet hosted by Once in a Wild. Outdoor Family Story Time drew in over 100 people multiple times, as kids sang, listened to a story, and played with various activities.

Several school groups came to Landa Library to play on the playground and tour the branch. Most of the students had never been to Landa and were amazed that such a place existed.

Tweens (aged nine to 12 years) continued to come every week in June to create art, play with robots, challenge themselves with games, and make new friends. One of the tweens was a foreign exchange student and really came out of her shell while participating in the program. She has joined up with several of the other regular Tween Time attendees.

June was the month for Teen Volunteers. They were an integral part of the teen space design and activities. They led events, created book displays, and helped around the library. Each young adult brought their own unique talents and interests. Teen Librarian Stephanie Thomas-Rosen provided them with a positive, interactive library experience. The teens kept coming! They started to attend Saturday Teen Time weekly. Teens celebrated Pride month with a special display and book selection that highlighted the diversity of our YA collection.

For adults at Landa Library, books and storytelling were the themes of the month! Adult Librarian Robin Alcorta participated in outreach with The Village at Incarnate Word. She curated another storytime on June 11 using the book "In the Small, Small Pond" by Denise Fleming, for the Tiny Tots website. In addition, Ms. Roberts attended an Ergonomic Safety Training during the reporting period.

Library Assistant Mary Lou Bleichwehl and Circulation Clerk Taylur Loera assisted Maverick's Teens plans by preparing equipment and supplies for their activities. Teen Time at Maverick was full of Pride in June. 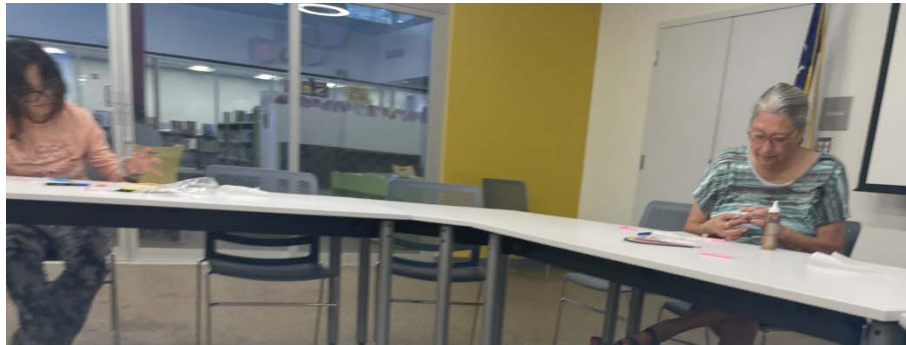

Patrons are invited to craft and display their creativity in a safe space while listening to stories with queer-centered storylines or queer characters. This month’s audio selection was Chef’s Kiss by TJ Alexander. On June 22, McCreless Branch hosted the San Antonio Storytellers for Storytelling for Adults, one of this year’s Summer With SAPL’s system-wide programs. Storytellers Mark Babino and Mary Grace Ketner delighted patrons with

their craft and shared their knowledge on the art of storytelling. Adult Services Librarian Vicky Villalobos joined Librarian Brook Mjolsness and Adult Services Coordinator Morgan Yoshimura for June's SAPL Live Trivia. The program was held on June 30 where nine teams competed for first place and bragging rights.

MEMORIAL

Memorial Branch Library staff seemed to be competing for the title of Best Employee Ever as they garnered multiple EnCORE recognition cards during the month of June. Leading the pack was Learn Officer Daniel Gómez with four cards. Close on his heels was Circulation Attendant Adam Capelo with three. Adult Services Librarian Freddy Hudson, Library Assistant Rene Leija, Circulation Attendants Michelangelo Sosa and Darlene Lopez, and Library Aide Lupe Pinales were each presented with EnCORE cards by patrons whose lives they touched.

The branch was thrilled to host Professor Universe (aka Dallas Akins) to kick off the branch's Summer with SAPL events. Because the meeting room was occupied by a Bexar County Elections team for the City Council election runoff, Professor Universe and about 70 of his newest friends were crammed into and overflowing the Children's Room. Even with the crowded conditions, an attendee wrote the following in an email to Branch Manager Christine Deffendall, "This was the best children's program of any kind I have ever seen...If there is any question about whether to bring Professor Universe back for summer or winter holiday programs, allow me to answer that with a resounding "yes, please". I would like to see every library in the SAPL system host at least one (maybe more) Professor Universe program."



Memorial Branch Library also hosted a mobile testing clinic from the City of San Antonio's (COSA) Metro Health Department.

In addition to her Branch Manager duties, Christine Deffendall continued functioning as the branch's Children's Librarian. She conducted Preschool Story Times, facilitated LEGO Club (alternating with Adult Services Librarian Freddy Hudson), and led the weekly Summer with SAPL Kids Time activities. A particular hit was "Squishy Circuits," a kit which allows even very young children to safely learn how electric/electronic circuits work with hands-on experimentation. Circulation Attendant Michelangelo Sosa was an invaluable assistant with the activity.



A smaller group enjoyed using “Cubelets,” a cube-based robotics activity. Library Assistant Rene Leija was instrumental in the success of the session, having previously learned how to use the devices when he assisted with a Tween Time at the Igo Branch Library.



Christine conducted two outreaches during June. Just before school ended for the summer, she visited the Southwest Preparatory Academy and spoke to several dozen students in First through Fourth grades. On June 29, she was invited to speak about library services to a group of families at Project Transformation.

During the month of June, Christine worked with Children's Services Coordinator Cresencia Huff and Pan American Branch Manager Barbaraella Frazier to interview and submit recommendations for new Children's Librarians at both Memorial and Pan American.

In addition to facilitating the branch's monthly Scrabble gathering, Adult Services Librarian Freddy Hudson coordinated two programs to commemorate Juneteenth. He arranged a showing of the film *Fruitvale Station* and arranged a visit from Sylvia Reyna of the Texana Department at the Central Library to discuss African American genealogy. Attendees at the latter learned of various resources for uncovering their lineage.

Teen Liaison (and Circulation Attendant) Michelangelo Sosa facilitated weekly programs for teens in the teen space with a focus on flexible seating arrangements for the summer. This month teens participated in Teen Time and invited friends to come to the activity and enjoy some relaxing moments on the couch while strengthening bonds. This month teens have been creating a Dungeons & Dragons scenario, creating perler bead art and jewelry, plushies. Teens' involvement in summer activities has fostered creativity and teamwork and has driven them to start feeling ownership over their local library and the spaces they can inhabit.

He also created a branch calendar for the Memorial Library Facebook group. Engagement with the group members has increased and has led to more group participation and turnout for Memorial Branch activities. In another effort to drive attendance and engagement, Michelangelo created a custom PowerPoint template for the SCALA advertisement player based on a SAPL Communications template for staff to create and publish event flyers that will fit the full resolution of the screen.

Michelangelo initiated a meeting with Learn Officer Daniel Gómez, Branch Manager Christine Deffendall, and Learn at SAPL Coordinator Michele Rickman to discuss the possibility of future collaborations between the Learn Center and Teen Services at Memorial.

Circulation Attendant Adam Capelo lent his services to help the Forest Hills Branch Library when they were short-staffed on two separate occasions during June. He also assisted Library Aide Lupe Pinales in her decorating efforts around the branch. Adam and Library Assistant Rene Leija had a memorable lunch with a patron who was thanking them for all their assistance to him in using the branch's computers. They helped him proofread letters, solve email issues, and taught him how to use Microsoft Word to make flyers.

The Basics of Loom Knitting and Jewelry Making for Beginners classes taught by Library Aide Lupe Pinales continue to grow. The classes have become so large that other staff members, particularly Michelangelo Sosa and Adam Capelo, have pitched in to assist. Some participants have become so enthusiastic that they have purchased their own tools and materials.



Circulation Attendant Darlene Lopez (on loan from the Las Palmas Branch Library during its renovation) created book bundles—and the signage to promote them—from the Juvenile Easy collection to celebrate Father's Day and Summer Fun. Darlene also worked with Library Aide Lupe Pinales on decorations for the branch.

Learn @ SAPL Training Officer Daniel Gómez continues to hold weekly classes in Spanish and English as a Second Language (ESL) for ten and nine students, respectively. Several of the ESL students have thanked Daniel specifically for his teaching of pronunciation, as other instructors they've had have not provided that guidance. He also conducts Welcome to Computers sessions three times a week. During June, two computer students completed the Basic Computers course and received Certificates of Completion. One of the students confided to Daniel that it was hard asking for help with the computer at work, but thanks to the classes, she no longer feels the need to ask at all.



The Learn Center also hosts weekly meetings of an Advanced ESL Book Club (led by volunteer Karen Wyatt) and a Language Exchange for ESL and Spanish students to learn from each other (the exchange is led by volunteers Emily Bain and Rose Marie Nazir).

MISSION

June started off with a Summer Kick-Off party for all ages. Children, teens, and adults had the opportunity to participate in fun activities and to cool off with a sweet treat! Paletas from El Paraiso paletas were provided to the public on the library's patio. The event had 68 people attending.

On June 12th, Illusions with Blake, part of the Summer with SAPL program series, presented at Mission. It was a hit and close to 300 people came to see the program. A weekly Kid's Time on Tuesday afternoons has also been happening at Mission with various games and activities for school-age children.

Every other Saturday, a Community Health Worker from Healthy Neighborhoods will be hosting Yoga for Kids at Mission Library as a way to encourage a unique form of health for children of the community.

Teens continued to claim their free summer t-shirts. Teens also participated in many gaming activities during the reporting period. Teens played on the Nintendo Switch and chose the WiiU for some retro gaming. Teens created sand art, painted rocks, and made buttons. Teens also made nachos and homemade brownie bites during the weekly Teen Club night.

Librarian, Cindy Cruz, also hosted several groups to the library and Teen Space for the month of June. The Boys and Girls Club, Seton Hall, and Greg Garcia Early College Intermediate school all worked with Cindy to facilitate visits and to find out about all the resources (and summer fun) the library has to offer.

Beginning in June, the office of U.S. Congressman Henry Cuellar has begun having monthly open office hours for the public in Mission's meeting room.

PAN AMERICAN

During June, Teen Librarian Gladys Nunez and Pan American teens enjoyed making perler bead crafts, playing online games, watching YouTube videos, listening to music, and getting to know new teens. Three book displays were created for the month of June including one for Pride Month, another centered on magic books, and the third one about YA crime books. All three proved to be popular with Pan American teen patrons as several items were checked out from each display. One new teen to the branch excitedly submitted a volunteer application and is awaiting approval to start volunteering with the Branch. Teens were grateful to receive a free summer t-shirt and button and are looking forward to next year's design.

June was a fun month for Children's Services. On June 22nd Pan American hosted Illusions By Blake. Children enjoyed the magic and also stayed to sign up for Summer Reading. Pan American gave out more than 100 books in one day. Mr. Blake did a presentation in the meeting room and went out into the Branch and demonstrated close-up magic to eager children.



In addition to Summer Reading, Library Assistant Kaylee Avila started up a Lego Club which is attended by school age children. Pan American had fun with creating Summer Reading Displays as well as displays celebrating June 19th and Father Day.



Pan American's Circulation Attendant Deborah Blancas and Library Assistant Kaylee Avila arranged a display in celebration of Pride Month. The display includes a selection of DVD's and Blu-rays while also highlighting a couple documentaries and Spanish films. It features titles such as *Call Me by Your Name*, *Portrait of a Lady on Fire*, *Loving Highsmith*, and *The Strong Ones (Los Fuertes)*.



Adult Services Librarian, Adrian Leal, organized two books displays supporting June Monthly Initiatives. The first display focused on Juneteenth and the second on Alzheimer's & Brain Awareness Month. Both displays were consistently browsed, and the books were checked out.

Librarian Leal held his bi-weekly Older Adults Program entitled "Game Time for Older Adults". The program is geared toward patrons 60 years and older. Allowing them the opportunity to stop by the branch, be in a comfortable environment and enjoy playing an assortment of games.

PARMAN



In honor of Juneteenth Parman Library's gallery featured works from artist John A. Coleman, an artist known for creating African American art with distinctive vibrant colors and very narrative styles. Mr. Coleman is the co-founder of the San Antonio Ethnic Art Society and his works have been featured in books, magazines, local newspapers and several famous museums in the United States. Coleman's art depicts daily African American life throughout history such as during the events of Juneteenth and in the time of the Harlem Renaissance. Coleman's art works featured at Parman include Barber Shop, Juneteenth, Slave Preacher, and Freedom of Joy. Parman library was truly honored and proud to have Mr. Coleman's art featured at Parman gallery especially during the week of Juneteenth this year.

The branch was jam-packed with paletas in June! Summer with SAPL greets Parman guests with giant paletas along the front windows of the library, and smaller paletas, decorated by children, adorn the bookshelves in the children's area. To date, over 2000 of these paper frozen treats have been made by Parman patrons! After making a paleta, children selected their free summer book! Young patrons have been excited to add a new book to their home library. To go along with our paleta theme, a paleta scavenger hunt was posted around the library and almost 500 participants searched for paletas to find out what a paleta said to his friend ("Have a Cool Summer!").

To celebrate the start of summer, Big Time Bubbles returned for a fantastic foam party where children and parents alike frolicked in the bubbles. Joe McDermott entertained patrons with his funny songs and delighted the children by squirting them with a water gun. Other special summer programming included a collaborative art activity where participants created beautiful flowers to add to a community vase. It's so fun to see kids working together to create a piece of art. Miss Lisa and Miss Teague also offered Let's Build, a time for children to stop by Parman and play with boxes, blocks and other building implements. Everyone had a great time building together!

Cuentos y Canciones with Veronica Yau continues to grow, and attendees love the story time and theme related crafts. Several of the English-speaking families that attend Cuentos y Canciones have learned the Spanish songs. Everybody loved singing “Muevo Mis Pánelos” while they played with scarves during the song. During Baby Story Time, participants sat in a giant circle so all the babies could see each other. It was a lot of fun to see what each baby did and how they reacted to the rhymes, bounces, and songs.

Miss Lisa's Family Story Time attendees really appreciated the open playtime after story time, especially since it was so hot.

The school-aged set has been very creative! Creator Club was packed with kids itching to make, create and play! The makerspace was a favorite event among attendees. Some kids made creatures, while other kids built rockets or made underwater scenes. Our makers loved using found materials to construct entirely new creations! Tweens loved making buttons on the button maker, melting beads and painting. There were some fierce games of air hockey and foosball.

The first month of summer has seen many teens apply to volunteer at the Parman Branch. Teen Librarian Zachary Woolston worked to process, schedule, and train dozens of teen applicants. Many of the new volunteers assisted with the children's “create a paleta” craft! Parman Teens also enjoyed a variety of Teen Time activities, with a return of the popular NERF Battle program kicking off the summer.

POTRANCO

Potranco Library hosted Concrete Canvas: The Art and Rhythm of Street Culture on the first Saturday evening in June. In honor of Juneteenth, Librarian Zeig showed the movie Summer of Soul on June 11. Librarian Zeig hosted the American Association of Retired People (AARP) workshop Smart DriverTek on

June 20 for older adults. The program focused on using the newest available vehicle safety features to improve driver safety. Librarian Zeig welcomed back Metro Health instructor Melissa Gonzales to begin a new seven-week series of the diabetes prevention program Viva Health. The new cycle began on June 8 and has 11 regular attendees.

Librarian Zeig held three book clubs this month. The morning and evening versions of Shelf Indulgence, on June 13 and 27 respectively, were both well-attended. This month's book was *Brazen* by Julia Haart. Librarian Zeig's Sunday cookbook club on June 18 had a nice turnout. Participants shared samples of African American culinary creations in recognition of Juneteenth. The collard greens and Charleston Chewies were a big hit. The July meeting will be picnic themed. Librarian Zeig and Circulation Attendant Laura Villalpano continue to host Dreaded Threads on Monday evenings and have been pleased to see many new faces.

Librarian Zeig attended the first Texas Library Association (TLA) Conference Planning Committee meeting virtually via Zoom on June 15 and will be heading to Austin next month to help finalize conference program offerings. Librarian Zeig is proud to be a member of the committee this year as the 2024 annual conference will be held in April in San Antonio. Librarian Zeig also virtually attended the TLA roundtable meeting for Programming for Adults to see what discussions are taking place in the world of adult program planning across Texas.

Children's programming was in full swing for Summer in June. Potranco kicked off Summer with Dino Day celebrating National Dinosaur Day and the 30th anniversary of the Jurassic Park film. Potranco hosted 2 STEM/Robot sessions with great success and attendance. PRUITT at ROOSEVELT HS

SAN PEDRO

The San Pedro Branch Library provided a variety of programs and services during the month of May. Programs for children, teen and adults were offered either weekly or once per month.

Children's Librarian Karen Braeuler continued outreach programming at Respite Children's Daycare. The children participated in a program of singing, reading and rhyme.

Summer Reading got off to a great start at San Pedro with the popular book giveaway and special programs for kids. Some of the special programs included: Let's Move, STEAM Robots, Tween Book

Chat, Let's Build: Construction, Happy Tails Animal program, and Let's Game: Minute to Win It. Baby Story Time became a weekly program which was well attended mostly by first time parents.

SCHAEFER

For Branch programs, Dacari worked alongside Adult Services Librarian, Daniel Garcia, to host Mercado por tu Corazon and Metro Health's STI/STD mobile clinic, both receiving outstanding feedback from the community. Additionally, Dacari worked with the SAPL Pride planning committee to host two movie screenings at Schaefer, to celebrate LGBTQ pride. For systemwide efforts, Dacari worked with colleagues Shannan Prukop, Lisa Puchot, Michael Dunbar-Rodney, Daniel Garcia, and Jason Futrell to launch InQUEERies: a queer themed SAPL podcast which centers creative folks and explorations in their work and how it intersects with our work as librarians.



On June 8, 2023, the Adult Services librarian, Dan Garcia, hosted the monthly "Cooking Around the World" program presented by the San Antonio Food Bank's Nutrition Education Coordinator, Brittany Hernandez; this month's recipe came from Jamaica. On June 11, 2023, the Adult Services Librarian hosted the inaugural session of the new monthly program: "Chess+Checkers+Dominoes", a drop-in, family-friendly program for gaming and socializing.

On June 15, 2023, the Schaefer branch library hosted a Chinese cultural program, titled: "Experience the Dragon: The History and Culture of China", hosted by Dr. Yaping Zhang; this program drew over 300 members of the Schaefer community.

On June 18, 2023, Dan hosted the monthly Board Game Social program for adults and older adults. On June 26, 2023, the Adult Services Librarian hosted the inaugural Schaefer Listener's Club program; a music club similar to a book club but utilizing the Schaefer branch library's vinyl LP collection.

Schaefer's children's librarian Leslie Elsasser scheduled nearly 30 programs for children of all ages in June. For the preschool children, Baby Time and Outdoor Family Story Time took place each week. School-age children attended Minute to Win it Games, Let's Build: Blocks & More, Let's Build: LEGO Time, Let's Create: Art Time, Let's Explore: Come & Go Playdough, Yard Games Inside, Children's Video Games, Read to a Dog, Let's Move: Yoga & More and Let's Create: Come & Go Art. The variety of programs appealed to the many interests of the children at Schaefer while some children attended all of them! Two special featured guest presenters had programs during the month: on June 8 Once in a Wild showcased five different animals, and more than 200 children and their families attended the program. Master naturalist Tom Kinsey visited Schaefer on June 22 and brought animals for enthusiastic children to see.

Schaefer's popular summer scavenger hunt started on June 1. Replicas of the Summer with SAPL paletas are hidden in a different spot each day for children to find! Children love looking for them each time they visit!

By the end of June, more than 600 children selected free summer books. When they select a book, they also receive a paleta made from colorful construction paper to decorate and then hang on a wall in the children's area. They also can draw or write about their summer vacations on the paleta card, which are then taped to the service desk.

Schaefer and Forest Hills paired up this year for a new Library Letters pen pal program. Children at Schaefer wrote letters for Leslie to send to Forest Hills. When she received the letters from the children at Forest Hills, she posted them on the wall in the children's area. Library Letters will continue through July.

Library Assistant Blanca Silvia Hernandez hosted Schaefer's coloring program where patrons relaxed while listening to LPs and colored in zentangle themed drawings and precut jigsaw puzzles.

Blanca assisted Branch Manager Maria Adams with her Sewing for Beginners Adult program, where patrons learned how to use a sewing machine. Everyone completed a fabric bookmark and got to take the pattern and some fabric home to get some more practice. She also assisted Children's Librarian Elsasser with the monthly children's programs and special summer programs where the children were excited to see all the animals, were eager to practice yoga, balance and calm and had fun creating beautiful artwork with all kinds of paint, including popsicle paints and shaving cream.

Library Assistant Isaai Ortega created a sci-fi themed book display for the month of June. The display featured a variety of media including books, movies, and graphic novels, to appeal to different interests and preferences.

SEMMEs

Semmes Adult Services continued to engage the public throughout the month of June, adding two Tai Ji classes every Sunday, in addition to the weekly yoga classes. Weekly Table Tennis, Chess, Mario Kart, and a family game time each Friday morning encourage public participation, and the monthly book club run by Library Assistant Markeico Deuser has grown steadily since its introduction.

The teens at Teen Time on Tuesdays are taking a more active planning role. In June, they have requested supplies like duct tape and felt to show each other how to make pouches, helped each other learn how to play video games like Minecraft and Super Smash Bros, or brought in hobbies and collections from home to show off and trade with the group. A Mario Karts Tournament for teens, led by Library Aide Anthony Islas, will run on Sundays throughout the summer, and teens have enjoyed the preliminary rounds of the tournament in June.

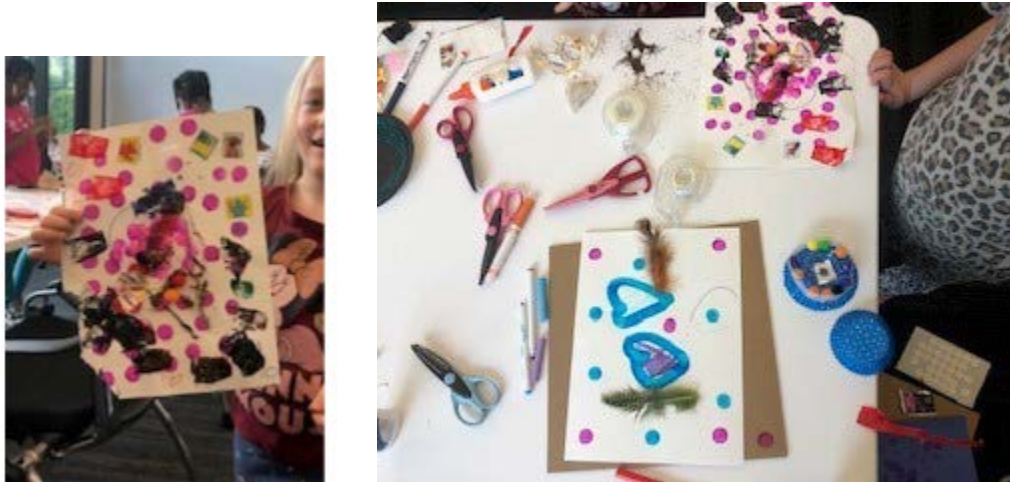
With school out, Tween Time on Wednesdays has seen an increase of tweens attending. They have enjoyed making friendship bracelets, crafting Perler Bead creations, interacting with Sphero robots, playing board games, and playing Ping Pong.

Semmes hosted Opera San Antonio on June 26th as part of the Summer with SAPL special programming. 48 children and 32 adults attended. Representatives from Opera San Antonio performed

selections from Hansel and Gretel and Pirates of Penzance and taught the crowd about different ways that composers can be inspired to write operas.

Attendees watched *The Night of the Hunter* and participated in a discussion. On June 30, she served as Master of Ceremonies for the virtual SAPL Live Trivia program.

Children's Librarian Cheryl Penick served as co-host for virtual Baby Time programs on June 2, 9, 16, 23 and 30. She held in-person programs for Let's Create!: Arts & Crafts Friday, and hosted Read to a Dog programs on June 2, 9, 16, 23 and 30. She held in-person Let's Move!: Music & Movement programs on June 3, 10, 17 and 24. Ms. Penick served as co-host for a virtual Toddler Time program on June 9. On June 24, she hosted the program Summer with SAPL: Explore Opera for Kids! She represented SAPL at an outreach event at Project Rio's Family Engagement Night on June 29. She created a book display in celebration of Juneteenth National Independence Day and assembled themed book bundles for families to check-out.



Librarian Kimberly King held in-person Teen Time programs on June 5, 12 and 26. She held an in-person Thursday Book Club program on June 8. Participants discussed *Wrong Place, Wrong Time* by Gilliam McAllister. She facilitated an outreach book group at the Northeast Senior Center on June 28. Teen Librarian, Connie Hejl, attended Northwood Presbyterian Day Care on Saturday June 10 to offer information about Summer Reading and special programs at Tobin. In addition, Ms. Hejl impressively hosts an on-line Random Fan Club for teens weekly on Thursdays with loyal attendance each program.

On June 12, Circulation Attendant, Sabrina Longoria, hosted a special Pride Craft. Attendees created some unique Pride bracelets.

Tobin welcomed Children's Librarian, Lisa Ramirez, from Carver Branch in June. Ms. Ramirez was in time to help host Tobin's Summer Fun Day on June 17. Nearly 200 folks enjoyed balloon art, bubbles, crafts, face painting and drumming with Tambo Rhythms. Friends of the Tobin Library at Oakwell funded these activities and performers while they also hosted a small Flash Sale of books, DVDs and a few vinyl records.



WESTFALL

Westfall Library is collaborating with NEISD for a program that provides free meals to children ages 18 and under in the months of June and July. In the month of June, over 400 meals were served.

Machaia McClenny, Branch Manager at Westfall, showed the movie *Deep in the Heart* in celebration of World Environment Day on June 5. This movie is narrated by Matthew McConaughey and shows beautiful footage of wildlife all over Texas to inspire viewers to preserve and protect endangered and threatened species in Texas. Machaia is also participating in the Summer with SAPL programs for adults. She created a movie series called "Summer Movies: See the Prequel Before the Sequel," which helps patrons catch-up with the previous movie before they watch new summer blockbusters. Machaia also spent the \$200 provided for wellness to buy snacks for the staff that will be shared every Wednesday.

In June of 2023, Children's Librarian Imelda Merino planned and presented four Preschool Story Times, four Family Story Times, and five school-age programs, that included both art and building activities. Ms. Merino also participated in two Art Club Online programs, sharing an alphabet drawing game and an easy puppet making activity. On Tuesday, June 13, Westfall hosted "Happy Tails Entertainment". A crowd of over 70 people enjoyed seeing a variety of animals up close. Animals included were an African porcupine, a wallaby, a kinkajou, a hedgehog, a coatimundi, a tortoise, and a macaw. Kids were also offered a free book as part of Kids Summer with SAPL. In June, a total of 208 books were given away. The transitioning of the Award books into the general collection was largely completed, and the weeding of all read-alongs was also accomplished.



Heather, the Teen Librarian at Westfall, partnered with the branch's teen volunteers to offer more activities at the branch for Teen Summer. The teen-designed summer t-shirt has been very popular. New teens have been coming to the branch for the free summer meals services provided by NEISD and stayed to ask about summer activities and receive their summer t-shirts. Teen volunteers have led Teen Time, an asynchronous Teen Writers Circle/Writing Club on Discord, and a bi-weekly Teen Movie Matinee program, where they suggest movies to watch and then voted on the list of titles to determine what movie is shown. Some new teens have started becoming regulars at Teen Time, due in no small part to an outgoing and friendly teen volunteer leading the program who makes sure to include new teens

by striking up conversations. This has resulted in a welcoming environment for shy teens to get to know each other and begin building new friendships in Teen Space, and creative opportunities to invent new games with existing supplies.

For the month of June, the Westfall Learn Center continued to gain new patrons seeking assistance with computer training, job searching, resume building, and other tasks whether on the computer or tablet. Many of the returning patrons continued to seek assistance with daily practice on their typing skills and internet navigation. With programming, the Learn center continued to provide the weekly iPad instructional classes and offered Smart Device training on Fridays. Overall, the learn center at Westfall averaged about 5 patrons per day in the month of June.

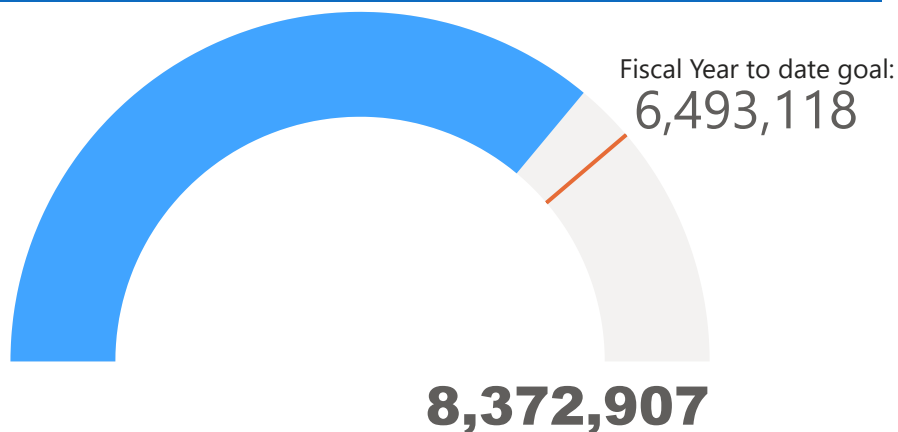

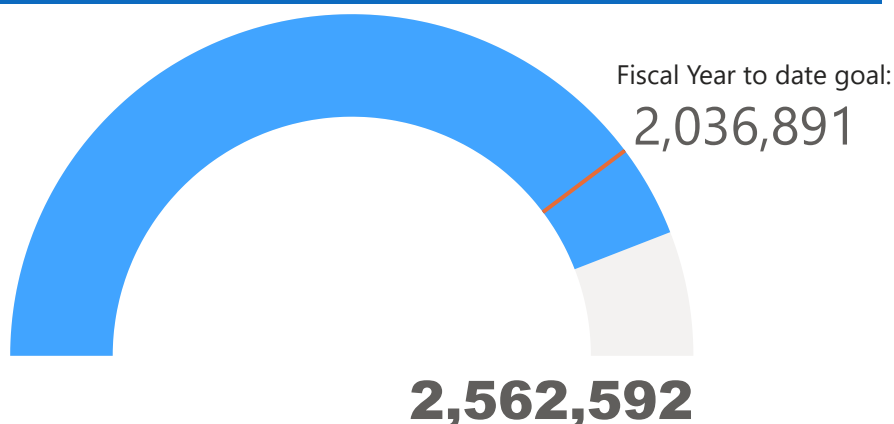


FY 2023 to date Items Borrowed

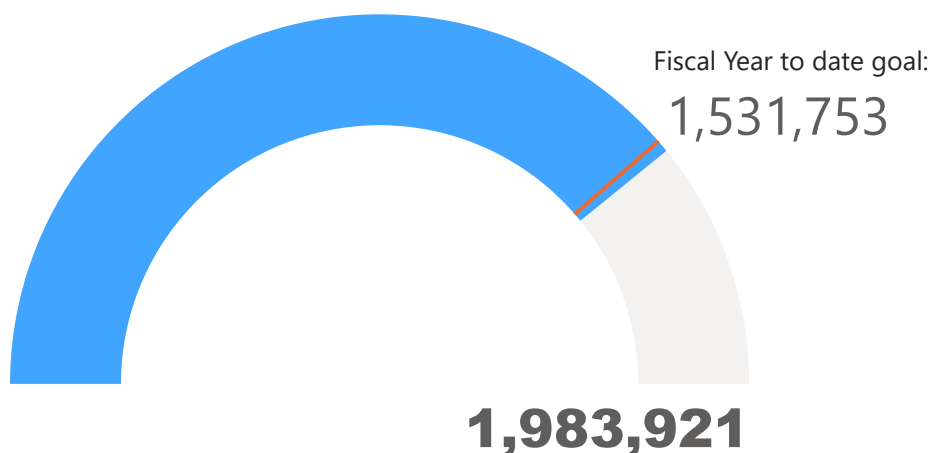


FY 2023 to date Library Visits

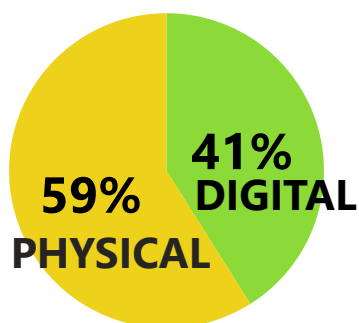

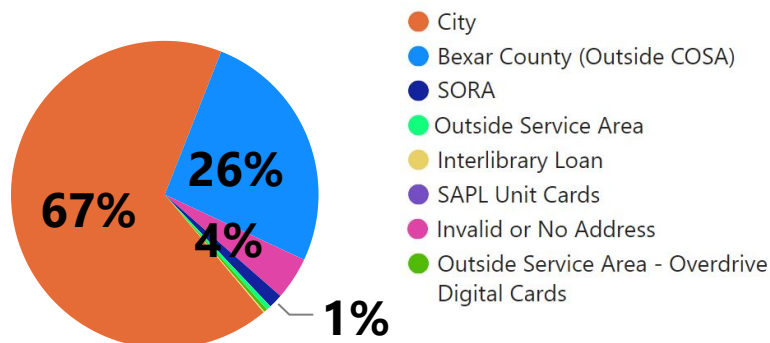

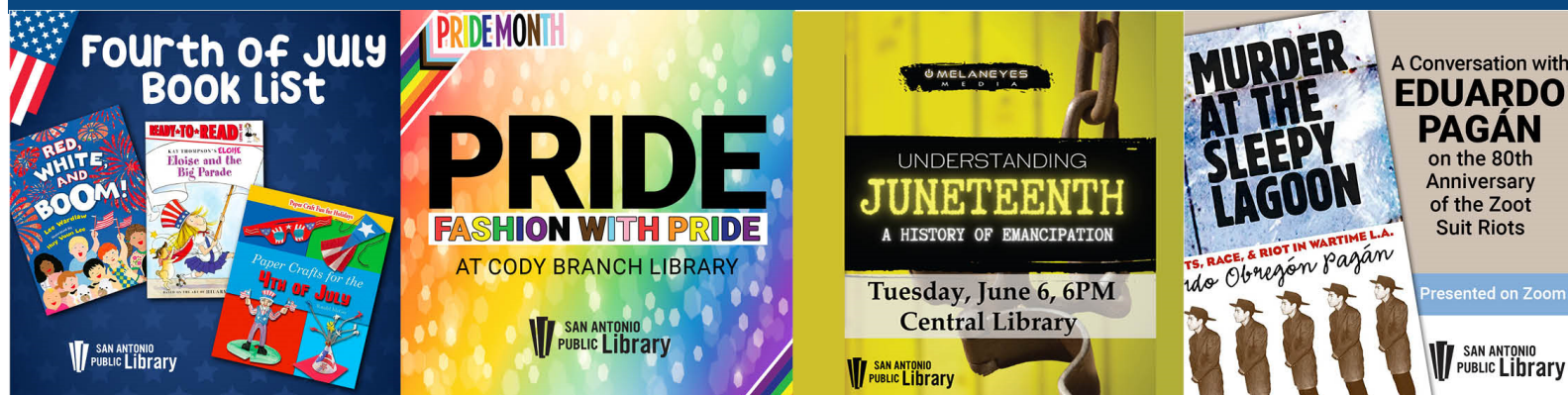

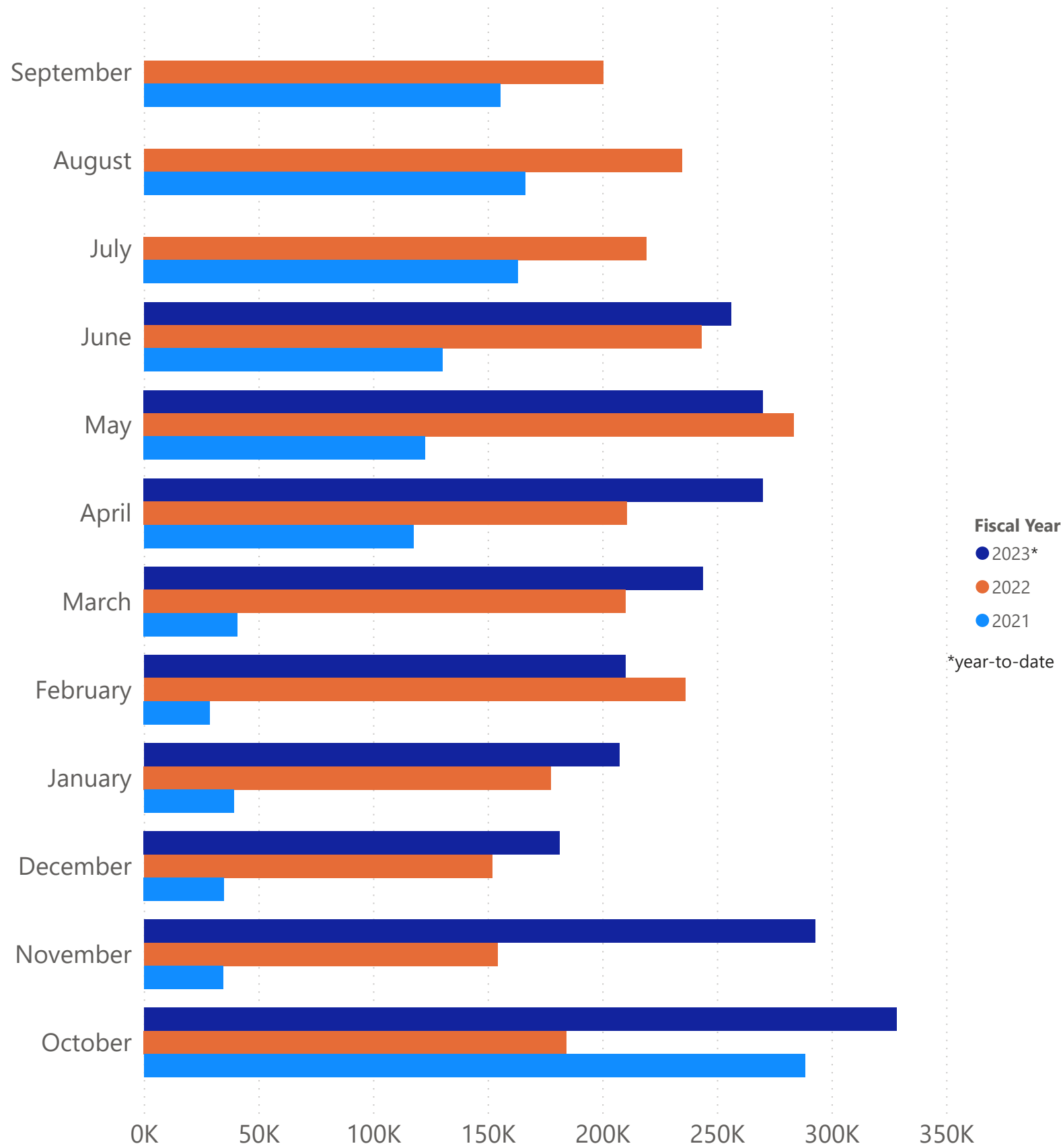
Circulation - Fiscal Year to Date - June 2023

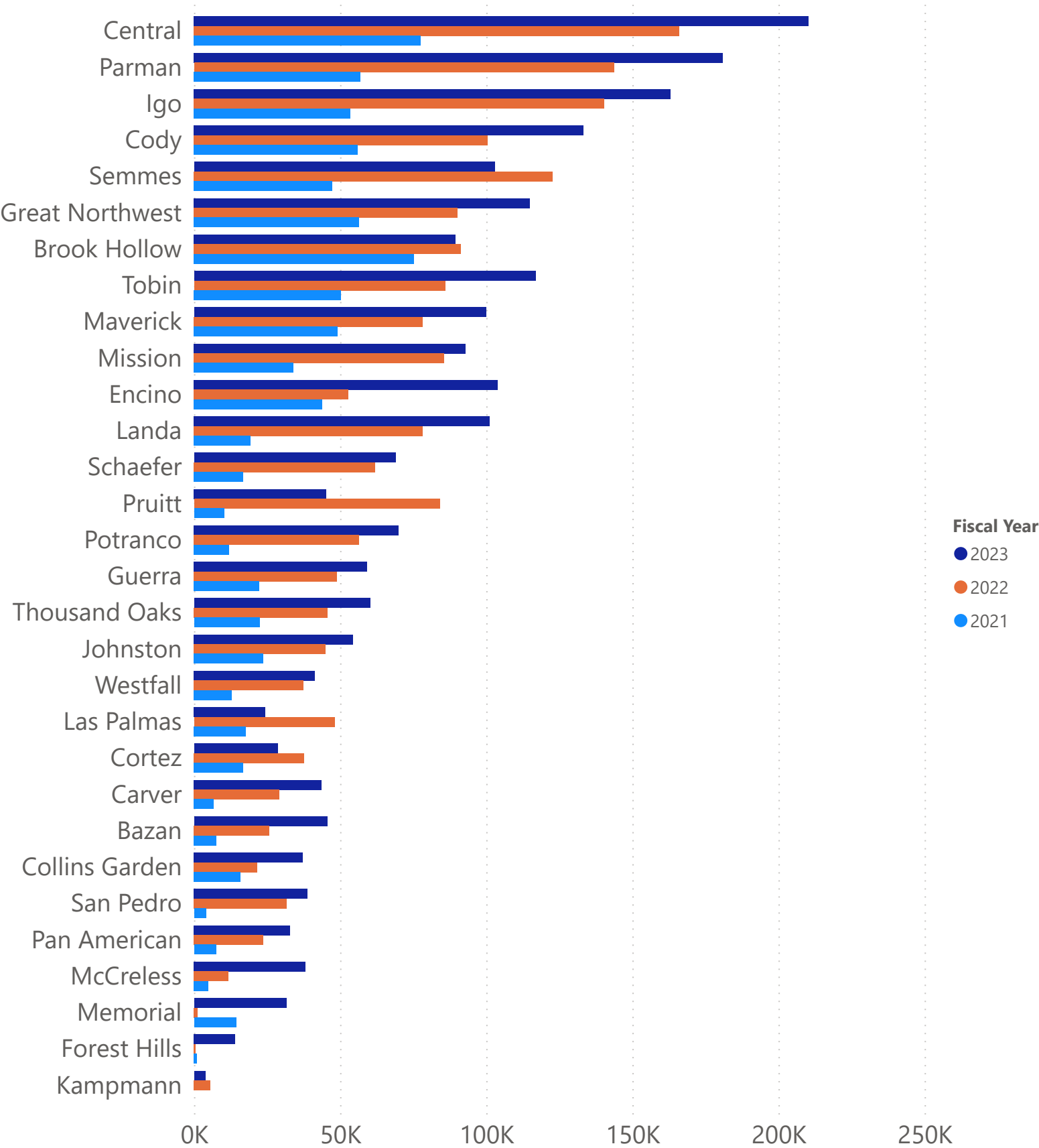

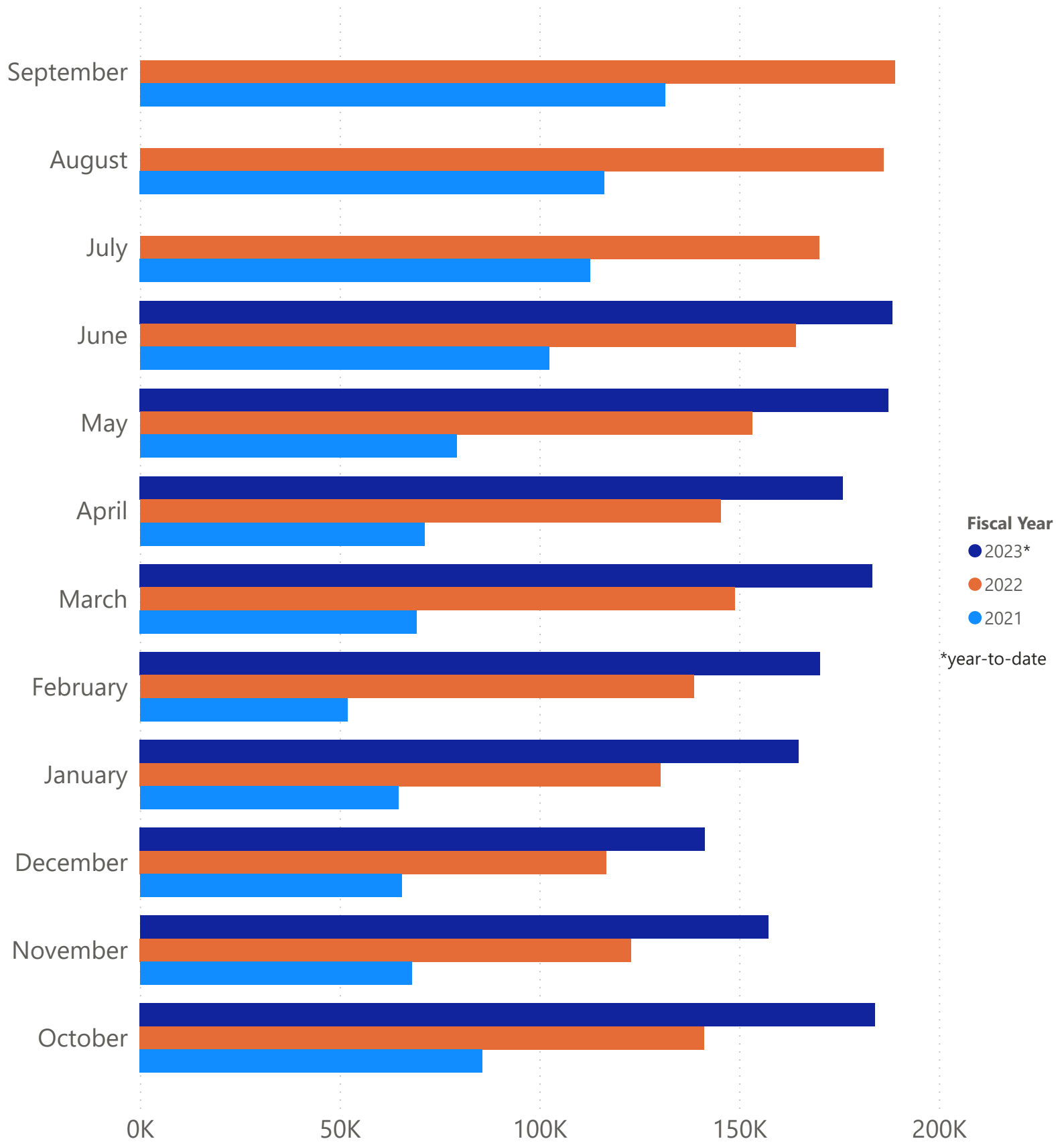
