SUBJECT:

Interlocal Agreement between the City of San Antonio and the Alamo Colleges District funded by CPS Energy Settlement proceeds.

SUMMARY:

This item provides a briefing on an Interlocal Agreement (ILA) between the City of San Antonio and the Alamo Colleges District (ACD) for a two-year term, effective September 1, 2023 through August 31, 2025. The agreement facilitates the administration of CPS Energy proceeds encumbered under a settlement agreement relating to City of San Antonio vs. Alamo Community College District. The ILA includes a 12-month budget of an estimated \$1,065,000 for each of ACD's 2024 and 2025 fiscal years based on projected future CPS Energy revenues and existing carryover funds to support current programming and an annual audit.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

In March 2001, City Council authorized the 15-year Settlement Agreement pursuant to City of San Antonio vs. Alamo Community College District, which was renewed in April 2016 for an additional 15 years. The settlement agreement utilizes funds deposited in an Education and Training Fund escrow from the City's 14% share of CPS Energy revenue collected from ACD's monthly natural gas and electrical billings. The settlement requires that the City and ACD update an ILA regularly to approve the budget. The current ILA was approved by City Council on September 30, 2021 (Ordinance number 2021-09-30-0737) and terminates on August 31, 2023. . Funding will support current programming for the City and ACD which includes Alamo Academies, training for City Employees, Small Business Mentor-Protégé Program, and an annual audit.

ISSUE:

Staff seeks to enter into a new ILA to allow for continued administration of proceeds encumbered pursuant to the renewed 15-year Settlement Agreement executed in 2016 with ACD. A breakdown of the funding costs per program are below:

- **Annual Audit (\$25,000 budgeted)**
- **Alamo Academies (\$505,627)** – An innovative training and educational partnership providing education, experience, and job opportunities for high school students seeking to jump-start their careers and make a seamless transition from high school to college and/or the workplace. The Alamo Academies include the Alamo Area Aerospace Academy (AAAA), the Information Technology & Security Academy (ITSA), the Advanced Technology & Manufacturing Academy (ATMA), the Health Professions Academy (HPA), and the Diesel Technology Academy (DTA). In FY 2023, Alamo Academies trained 89 completers.
- **Training for City Employees (\$421,000)** – The Human Resources Department coordinates and develops employee education and development initiatives including specialized training. This request includes funding for the Workplace Education Programs (G.E.D. Exam Preparation and CDL Exam Training), project management and process improvement training, and City Leadership Programs. In FY 2023 ACD trained 1,804 employees in 110 classes.
- **Small Business Mentor-Protégé Program (\$113,373)** – The Economic Development Department utilizes funding to operate this program. It provides capacity-building educational courses, referred to as the Small Business Boot Camp, specific to the needs of small business (courses include How to Write a Business Plan, Managing Your Financials, Access to Credit, and Marketing). The program also provides individualized business counseling and facilitates mentor-protégé partnerships, which allow small businesses to learn successful business practices from experienced industry leaders. In FY 2022 and FY 2023, 53 companies participated as protégés, and 11 companies provided mentors. Nine protégé companies will graduate in FY 2023. Additionally, small, minority and women owned businesses that participated in the Mentor-Protégé Program increased annual revenue on average by 70%.

On September 19, 2023, the ACD Board will consider authorization for the Chancellor to execute

the ILA with the City. The ILA is scheduled for full City Council consideration in September 2023.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact to the City.

Funding in the amount of \$1,065,000 in ACD's FY 2024 and 2025 budgets will support this ILA. This amount represents the City's 14% of ACD's estimated CPS Energy natural gas and electrical billings. CPS Energy revenues are placed in an Education and Training Fund escrow account maintained by ACD.

ALTERNATIVES:

Should the Economic and Workforce Development Committee not approve item, the education and training for high school students, City employees, and small businesses would be negatively impacted.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the committee approve the ILA for full City Council consideration. Additionally, staff recommends approval of administrative authority to adjust the budget and programs funded through the ILA for ACD's 2025 fiscal year in consultation with the Economic and Workforce Development Committee (EWDC).
