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DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

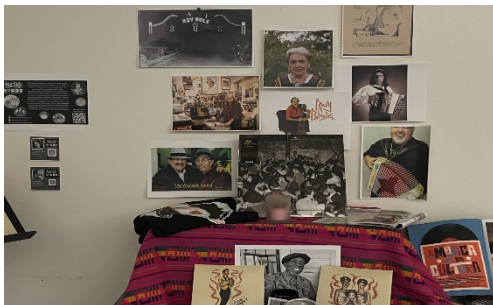
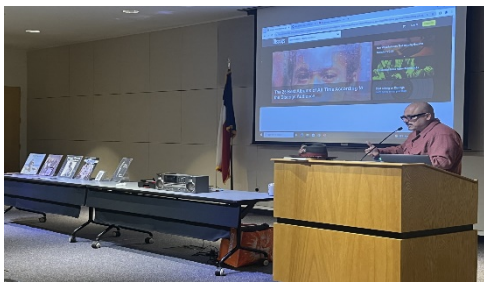
DIGITAL SERVICES

During the months of November and December, Digital Library Services Analyst Tricia Masterson and Digital Library Services Assistant Christina Hess, working with ITSD, Library Facilities, and Bibliotheca, assisted in the installation and set up of new RFID equipment at 16 library locations.

On November 20, the new version of the Facilities ticket system went live. Digital Library Services Specialist Brian Douglass and Digital Library Services Assistant Elise Garcia worked with the Facilities team to enable the new system, and continue to refine the set up after the launch.

LATINO COLLECTION & RESOURCE CENTER

On November 4, in collaboration with the West Side Sound Oral History Project, the LCRC held a community workshop led by independent filmmaker Chuco Garcia, DJ Rambo Salinas and UTSA Mexican American Studies professors Dr. Gloria V. Gonzales and Sylvia Mendoza. The collective shared information and resources for conducting oral history interviews at home and in the community, including recording equipment and tips for writing interview questions. The independent film “You’ve Succeeded”, which documents local West Side Chicano Soul recording artist, Dimas Garza, was screened and followed by a Q&A with filmmaker Chuco Garcia.



On November 9, LCRC program coordinator Sarah De La Rosa & Central Library Information Services librarian Patricia Perez, tabled at Trinity University's First Annual Fine Arts Festival. Sarah & Patricia shared LCRC & SAPL resources and information with students and professors, such as zines and LCRC merchandise, while also promoting upcoming LCRC sponsored programming.



On November 18, the LCRC hosted the opening reception of the In Lak Ech 'I Am One Like You' art exhibit in honor of Indigenous Heritage month, in Central Library's gallery. The exhibit is a tribute to the enduring legacies, wisdom, strength, and stories of indigenous communities in the United States and Latin America. The exhibit features work by Charles Ingram, Laura Delmis, and Mario Alvarado. This exhibition aims to connect heritage and creativity in a unified celebration to honor these extraordinary cultures and will be on display until December 30.



San Anto Zine Fest (SAZF) partnered with the San Antonio Public Library and was sponsored by the LCRC, to present the 2023 Zine Festival on Saturday, December 9 at Central Library. SAZF is dedicated to independently published media, zines, comics, and alternative press. The LCRC programming space housed a zine presentation, zine panel, zine workshop, as well as the SAPL *Big Read Zine* release, contributor readings.



On December 14, an insightful art talk within the In Lak Ech exhibit took place at the Central Library gallery. Artist Laura Delmis shared her inspiration and perspectives, and discussed issues experienced by minority women, including gender violence. The discussion was led by Patricia Castillo of the P.E.A.C.E. Initiative of San Antonio. A community circle conversation led by Empower House concluded the program.



LITTLE READ WAGON

The months of November and December proved to be two busy months full of fun and community connection for the Little Read Wagon (LRW) Team. Monthly Saturday events continued to be held on the lawn outside Cortez Library in November and December. Additionally, (LRW) hosted weekly Let's Play! events throughout November and December at Denman Estate Park. These events were highly attended and several of the participants expressed how much they appreciated the program, and how lovely the park was.



Megan Cruz, Library Service Specialist, presented follow up visit programs to school age parents in Harlandale Independent School District (ISD), Northeast ISD and San Antonio ISD. During these programs, teen parents continued to learn about early literacy practices to use at home with their children. Teen parents worked on personalized board books for their babies and young children. The teens expressed how much they enjoyed the activity and some teens asked for permission to stay longer after the session to keep working on their books. Eva Banda, Library Service Specialist, presented early literacy workshops to the school age parents of Southwest High School in Southwest ISD, Cooper

Academy at Navarro in SAISD and Legacy of Educational Excellence (LEE) High School in NEISD. Ms. Banda also presented bilingual story time to the children at Navarro Childcare Center and Southwest ISD PCI.

Ms. Cruz and Julia Lazarin presented a workshop for the early childhood professionals of Sprouts Nature Preschool on the topic of early literacy and the importance of play in early childhood. The group was also able to tour the 3rd floor. Ms. Banda welcomed the parents of children at Pre-K West Avenue (Northeast Independent School District) to the Central Library and provided them a workshop on best early literacy practices. The parents were able to make a bedtime routine chart for their children and tour Central Library.

Ms. Lazarin and Melisa Hill led an in-person and virtual early literacy workshop for parents and other primary caregivers at Gardendale Early Learning Center. Ms. Lazarin and Ms. Hill also presented an early literacy workshop for the families at SAMMinistries. They also provided a reading tent experience and bubbles for families to enjoy together. Similar workshops and Family Reading Tents were offered for families across several school districts which include, Northside ISD, SAISD, and Southwest ISD.

Ms. Lazarin and Ms. Hill represented San Antonio Public Library at Family Learn and Play Day, which was presented by Help Me Grow Bexar County. They provided early literacy resources and a bubble station for families to enjoy.

CHILDREN'S (SYSTEM-WIDE)

November 4, 2023 was the annual Arbor Day celebration. This year it was held at Mission Library and included a tree giveaway and Story Walk® featuring Nell Plants a Tree. The Library booth was staffed by Mission Branch Library manager, Oscar Gonzalez and Coordinator of Children's Services, Cresencia Huff. Visitors to the booth were invited to make chalk rubbings of leaves from native trees. Later on the same day, the Library was represented at the University of Texas at San Antonio Family Engagement Summit. Held at the Downtown campus, current and prospective students attended information sessions and visited tables with their families.

Planning for Children's Summer with SAPL 2024 began in earnest in November, with work groups meeting to develop activity ideas and contact featured guests. November 30 was the deadline for Young Pegasus Poetry Competition entries, and staff worked to sort the entries into packets for the judges to begin reviewing.

Teen Library Services Coordinator, Jennifer Velasquez, joined the Children's Services Team at their December 13 meeting. Ms. Velasquez presented on the needs of older children (ages 9-12) and the continuum of library services and activities as children mature into teens.

TEENS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

Virtual Teen Programs and Activities – The Virtual Teen Services workgroup—led by Matthew Loaiza (Teen Services Librarian II / Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and consisting of Teen Services Librarians and Liaisons from around the system—continued to collaborate with virtual teen volunteers (“Teen Mods” and “Club Assistants”) to offer weekly virtual activities (“clubs”) on the 210teenlibrary Discord Server (“the server”). Teens made meaningful peer-to-peer connections during clubs while they

chatted about topics including traveling the world, holiday plans, college, video games, Dungeons & Dragons, driver's ed, Spotify Wrapped, movies, writing, and more. Teens also engaged with each other through their own conversations on the server in a variety of channels, discussing topics within their communities of interests such as dreams, politics, fashion, memes, and art. Teens and teen volunteers on the server worked together to plan two in-person parties—a Winter Party in November and a Holiday Party in December—to celebrate the upcoming holiday season. After discussing ideas for party activities, teens developed and implemented several options for each party and ultimately led the activities during each party. For the Winter Party, teens made hot cocoa, S'mores, and S'moreos; created and decorated plastic ornaments, watched a holiday movie; and listened to music. For the Holiday Party, teens built gingerbread houses and participated in a friendly competition to vote for their favorite build; decorated holiday stockings and wooden ornaments; and made hot cocoa and S'mores.

Virtual Teen Content and Resources – The 210teenlibrary Instagram workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza and consisting of Ami Sarabia (Teen Services Outreach Specialist, Teen Library @ Central), Ciana Flores (Teen Services Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central), and Regina Almanza (Teen Services Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central), shared information, resources, activities, and other content for teens on Instagram, created by teen volunteers and Teen Services staff. During the reporting period, teen volunteers and Teen Services staff posted content that celebrated Dia de los Muertos, reviewed books, demoed recipes, showcased art, and highlighted daily celebrations and informative facts.

Professional Development – On November 1, Matthew Loaiza led the 210teenlibrary Discord workgroup through its first Fiscal Year 2024 Strategic Planning meeting to establish a mission and vision statement for the workgroup, as well as goals to accomplish throughout the fiscal year. During this meeting, Loaiza also announced that the workgroup would now be known as the Virtual Teen Services workgroup to better reflect the workgroup's efforts in establishing best practices for providing virtual library services for teens, regardless of platform. On November 2, Loaiza assisted with an interview panel for a Teen

Services Librarian I position. On December 18, Loaiza began serving as the Interim Manager of Little Read Wagon.

ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

On November 4, in collaboration with the West Side Sound Oral History Project, the LCRC held a community workshop led by independent filmmaker Chuco Garcia, DJ Rambo Salinas and UTSA Mexican American Studies professors Dr. Gloria V. Gonzales and Sylvia Mendoza. The collective shared information and resources for conducting oral history interviews at home and in the community, including recording equipment and tips for writing interview questions. On November 12, Children's Services and Adult Services collaborated to offer an all ages program at Great Northwest for Native American Heritage Month. Participants in this session, Archaeology and the San Antonio Missions, learned about the archaeological work at the San Antonio Missions and what it means to us today with a presentation from archaeologist Kelton Sheridan, and Diana Moreno-Reyes and Margot Moreno of San Antonio Mission Indian Descendants. Hands-on activities followed the presentation.

On November 20, Kaylee Avila - Library Assistant in Texana - hosted Transgender Day of Remembrance in collaboration with the library's Queer Committee, the San Antonio Gender Association, and the Pride Center of San Antonio. The event began with a resource fair in the foyer that included the following organizations: The San Antonio Gender Association, the Pride Center of San Antonio, San Antonio Human Rights Campaign, Women in Transition, Trans Masc Folks y Mas, Binders for Brothers, Fiesta Youth, PFLAG, American Veterans for Equal Rights, Thrive Youth Center, The Kind Clinic, Living Positive San Antonio, Equality Texas, and the Alamo Area Resource Center. UTSA Special Collections curated a display showcasing local transgender history through photos, articles, and artifacts. Following the resource fair there was a program in the auditorium. Ms. Avila gave an introduction and then Gideon from the San Antonio Gender Association spoke about the importance and value of community for building resilience. Three representatives from community organizations spoke briefly. Community members volunteered to help read the 62 names of trans/gender non-conforming individuals lost to violence over the past year. The event concluded with an outside candlelight vigil. About 10 library staff members helped with this event that brought together an estimated 150 people from the community.

In November, four San Antonio Public Library locations hosted a series of programs for NaNoWriMo (National Novel Writing Month). Since 1999, NaNoWriMo has existed as a national initiative that challenges individuals to write 50,000 words of a novel in thirty days. Participating Library locations – Mission, Bazan, McCreless and Westfall – offered participants a weekly opportunity to gather with other writers in a shared space as they worked on their NaNoWriMo goal.

San Anto Zine Fest (SAZF) partnered with the San Antonio Public Library and was sponsored by the LCRC, to present the 2023 Zine Festival on Saturday, December 9 at Central Library. SAZF is dedicated to independently published media, zines, comics, and alternative press. From November through December 15, the Library continued to host a fall/winter version of the gardening series Dig It! This series was organized in collaboration with Bexar County Master Gardeners and was the second series that has come from this series. Presentations included in the fall/winter series included Basic Tree Care, Vegetable Gardening, and selecting low maintenance plants that will thrive year round in South Texas. Nineteen San Antonio Public Library locations hosted a session as part of this series.

Learn at SAPL received over 1300 patron visits across six operational service centers for the months of November and December. Learn staff hosted 90 programs, nearly half of those focused on technology.

A cohort of Learn at Central staff members and administrators completed Program One, the Assisting Process, during the half-day Staff In-service. The training was taught by local risk management educator Satori Learning, and provided a step-by-step script and philosophy for de-escalation. Staff combined this training with recent Ryan Dowd trainings to think critically about how we approach others in service.

The end of the year also marked the end of the 2023 iPad Lending Program. Learn locations have played a critical role in checking out the devices, as well as providing training on usage, communicating, troubleshooting, and generally supporting the program's success.

Finally, Learn welcomed it's first post-Covid volunteer. The new volunteer started assisting once a week at Westfall Branch Library, helping computer patrons on a drop-in basis.

OLDER ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

Special events included three offerings of "Love Where You Live, for Life" presented by partners from Successfully Aging and Living in San Antonio, an initiative of the San Antonio Area Foundation. Sessions were held at Central Library, and Memorial and McCreless Branch Libraries. Patrons were introduced to the idea of aging-in-place, and given resources to start planning for the future in their home and chosen community.

CENTRAL LIBRARY

CHILDREN'S LIBRARY

Librarian Ashley Palacios created popular Tween Time programs for her devoted group of regulars. She partnered with Librarian Madeline Nezat to promote the Young Pegasus Poetry Competition to the tweens. At other Tween Time events, she provided opportunities for the tweens to create bracelets from wooden beads they painted, "snow" from kitchen ingredients, snowflake collages, and play games like "snowball toss" and "roll a turkey," as well as traditional board games. She also presented the *Scooby-Doo* feature film, which the tweens enjoyed along with popcorn! Ms. Palacios designed a special Staff Edition Tween Zine to be featured at the SAPL Zine Fest with book reviews submitted by Children's Library staff members of titles that appeal to the tween community.

Librarian Madeline Nezat continued to expand and tinker with the Sensory Friendly Playtime set up. With the cold weather came different varieties of winter themed sensory bins including fake snow and frozen wonderlands of frozen shaving cream and gelatin icebergs. Ms. Nezat expanded her DIY sensory toys by making new sensory boards, sensory sticks, and changing up the shadow puppet station by wrapping colored paper around the flashlights, letting the children play with color as well as light. The winter break season brought in an influx of visitors to the program and demonstrated the variety of children that benefit from sensory play.

Family Story Time continued to be a joint effort organized by Assistant Manager Shannon Seglin in collaboration with Ms. Palacios and Ms. Nezat. Each one took turns presenting different elements of the story time - reading books, singing songs and leading movement activities. The librarians highlighted books based on the indigenous experience during Native American Heritage Month. After each program, different sensory elements and play invitations were shared with the families. These included everything from a sensory bin with gourds and pumpkins in water to white homemade playdough with silver glitter and cookie cutters. The young children enjoyed playing in sand, with musical instruments and a host of other engaging play items.

Children's Library tours were given by staff to students from Legacy Christian School and the SW Keys organization. Also, two tours were given to different groups of parents whose children attend PreK4SA.

Ms. Palacios and Ms. Seglin each presented a Story Time program at the Brook Hollow Branch Library in the absence of the Children's Librarian there. Ms. Nezat participated in an outdoor Little Read Wagon Let's Play! Program day at Denman Estate Park. She assisted with the set up and take down of all the materials, observed and encouraged play with the visiting children, and helped pass out free reading materials to the parents and children.

Library Assistant Mary Elizabeth Fernandez cohosted the *Escape the Earth* podcast with Tim Johnson (Igo) and Elissa Vura (Brook Hollow) and JD Elizondo (Information Services @ Central). In November, they discussed Fonda Lee's mafia-esque world *Jade City* with glamorous cars and magic instead of tommy guns and in December, the mind-bending universe of Paul Cornell's *Rosebud*. The *Escape the Earth* podcast can be found on Soundcloud on SAPL's Podcast TunedIn Channel.

Ms. Palacios recorded 3 books for the Dial A Story service. She also created a fall-themed I Spy passive program, as well as a letter-writing station for Veteran's Day in partnership with the Information Services department at Central.

Children's Library staff continued to develop outreach connections with area childcare centers and schools. Ms. Palacios visited Central Christian Day School twice each month, where she presented story times to children and brought books for the teachers to use in class. Ms. Seglin shared stories and songs with two classes at Madison Square Child Development Center and delivered library books in support of their curriculum. The children there remember many of the songs she sings and sometimes request them! Manager Kate Simpson delivered books each month for all 5 grades of children at Discovery School as well.

TEEN LIBRARY

Kathleen Fordyce (Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and Connie Hejl (Teen Services Librarian I, Tobin Branch) host the "Random Fandom" club Thursdays on Discord, in which teens engage in discussions about fandoms that interest them and stream their favorite anime or pop culture shows.

Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager) continues to lead the 210teenlibrary Discord and Instagram workgroups. He also joins Daniella Toll (Assistant Manager / Teen Services Librarian II, Collins Garden Branch) for "Teen Time" every Friday on the Discord server.

Rosalie Barrera (Librarian I) joins Shannan Prukop (Teen Services Librarian II / Assistant Manager, Forest Hills) on Wednesdays on the 210teenlibrary Discord server during the weekly Dungeons & Dragons club, in which teens are encouraged and challenged to work collaboratively and practice creative problem-solving skills through gameplay. Rosalie continues to support and engage with teens as they explore and activate the Teen Library as their own space to serve their needs, such as studying, crafting, gaming, or gathering with friends.

Ciana Flores (Library Assistant PT) continues to engage with teens both in the Teen Library and via the 210teenlibrary Instagram page. She is responsible for the 3D printing requests from teens on the Discord server. Ciana prints and sends the requested item out to the teens' preferred library branch for pick up.

Regina Almanza (Library Assistant): Teen Tuesday after-school activities in November and December continued to highlight general teen interest and celebrations, such as celebrating Fall and the festive season, learning new cooking techniques, and satisfying curiosities. Suggesting, participating, and leading these activities allow them the chance to pick up a new skill, or show their peers tips and tricks. To celebrate *Día de los Muertos*, teens created mini-charcuterie boards using paper coffins as a tray and created roses out of pepperoni. Teens made ramen, apple pie cookies, and popcorn snacks. To celebrate the upcoming holiday season before their school break, teens made pretzel wreaths, peppermint milk, peanut butter cracker ornaments and adorable puff pastry trees. They also set up a cocoa station for a hot cocoa night. Crafts continue to be a popular after-school craft activity. Teens used the perler beads, pony beads, rainbow loom, and sewing machines to get creative. One teen requested the use of a glue gun and ribbon to create ribbon roses. Using Borax and pipe cleaners (and science!), they also created crystal ornaments for the holiday tree.

Teen volunteers also produced short demos and posts for Instagram, including Jade making pancake strawberries, Angelina and Melody teaming up to make banana snowmen, and Emma's book review. Pictures and videos from activity times can be found on the @210teenlibrary Instagram page.

INFORMATION SERVICES

Information Services hosted several Information Tables to provide vital resources for our patrons. On November 1, Christina Montero hosted CPS Energy's Casa Verde information table where they shared weatherization information and financial benefits. Standup For Kids, an organization which provides resources to homeless and at-risk youth, was hosted on November 4, 18, and December 2. Information Services also hosted The Center- Pride Center San Antonio, which provides resources and a safe space for LGBTQIA+, on November 4 and 18.



Pannaga Prasad coordinated a system-wide Diwali Classical Dance Performance with library staff hosts. The vibrant dance program was held at San Pedro on November 5 with Diana Starrett; at Semmes on November 12 with Mark Hall; at Collins Garden on November 18 with Rosa Villa; at Central Library on November 18 with Jordan Torres, at Westfall on November 19 with Monty Holcomb; at Thousand Oaks on November 25 with Brooke Mjolsness; and at Igo on November 25 with Gamini Haluwana. The dance performance offered a Diwali theme in the form of music, dance and storytelling by the Kaveri Natya Yoga dance group. The attendees enjoyed the performances and stated they like to attend any cultural and entertaining event.



On November 2, Arland Schnacker and Jordan Torres worked an outreach table for the GI Forum's StandDown Day and talked with roughly 65 patrons. They shared information about SAPL's learn centers, Libby, Kanopy, and more.



For November, Raquel Reyes and Arland Schnacker created a Veteran's display for SAPL employees and patrons to recognize friends and loved ones who have served their country in the Armed Forces.



On November 17, Jordan Torres invited the San Antonio Food Bank to Central Library to assist adult patrons in filling out applications for SNAP (formally known as Food Stamps), TSAP (60 years+, or Disabled), TANF, CHIP/Children's Medicaid, Adult Medicaid, Women's Health Care, Medicare Cost Sharing, WIC, and other Food Bank programs. The representative assisted several households applying for benefits and helped with additional resources and questions. Information Services greatly appreciates the San Antonio Food Bank's presence and looks forward to their continuing partnership.

On November 17, a virtual Chair Yoga Class session was offered by Pannaga Prasad and Patricia Perez over the Library Zoom platform. The class was presented by Ashley Ludwick, a professional Yoga instructor from IdoYogasa organization. The instructor taught chair yoga and demonstrated how to modify various Yoga exercises using the chair.

On November 18, Christina Montero hosted the program Brain Health - Living with Dementia in which Dr. Neela K. Patel from UT Health did a presentation focusing on older adults with Alzheimer's Dementia and how their caregivers can assist persons with dementia.



On November 28, Librarian Valerie Saucedo and LCRC Program Manager Sarah De La Rosa hosted a Tarot and Astrology program at Memorial Branch. After a brief overview on tarot, astrology, and numerology, patrons were able to do their own tarot readings and received zines created by the hosts.



Patricia Perez and Josh Yurcheshen hosted Bexar County Master Gardner Nancy Mills presentation Dig It! Texas Superstar® Vegetables on December 2, 2023. The presentation focused on fall and early spring vegetable planting.



On December 11, Arland Schnacker and Christina Montero (SAPL) attended a Blue Santa outreach to not only support the San Antonio Police Department (SAPD) but also to provide SAPL Resources to patrons and their families.



On Dec 12, Arland Schnacker assisted with the River City Ringers program in Central's Auditorium. This Winter Holiday program had beautiful handbell choir music which was greatly enjoyed by the audience.



On Dec 13, Arland Schnacker attended a Train-the-trainer Federal Resume program at the Good Samaritan Veteran Outreach & Transition Center, which provided staff resources on assisting patrons who are seeking federal employment.

Arland Schnacker completed his Winter Prep program on December 16 and December 30th. The program gave resources on preparing homes for winter weather, tips on staying warm, and provided a list of items that one should have in their home in case of hard freezes and power outages. The program also allowed patrons hands-on training for building a safe Do It Yourself (DIY) space heater using terracotta pots.

LEARN AT CENTRAL

Insert response here. Learn at Central had a couple of success stories with patrons who were able to receive first and second interviews as a result of working on their resumes and applying for jobs with the Learn staff's assistance.

Training Officer Daniel González and Library Assistant Brianna Glass taught five Creative Learning and Computers classes for the month of November. The program takes place Wednesdays at 11 am.

Brianna and SAPL Zine Committee members successfully printed and assembled 250 copies of this year's Big Read Zine, where it will debut for free at San Anto Zine Fest 2023. Brianna is very proud to be part of the Zine Committee and community.

There were a few success stories in Learn at Central in December. At the beginning of the month, Learn had a woman working on her resume for a few days. It was the first time she had revamped her resume in years. While she was working on her resume she also applied for a few jobs and was able to secure interviews. A patron came in to work on his resume for USAA and used the space to interview. He now has two potential job offers. Learn had another patron come in that wanted help with interview preparation. Training Officer Denise sat down with him about an hour before his interview and shared some strategies for answering interview questions with him.

Training Officer Daniel González and Library Assistant Brianna Glass taught four Creative Learning and Computers classes for the month of December, assisting about 10 folks during these patron-curated classes.

In the month of December Learn hosted three social media classes covering Facebook, Instagram, and TikTok during Fun Friday Tech Time at 10 am.

On December 7, staff shared information about the services, programs, and resources Learn provides with a group of parents that toured Central.

On December 13, 2023, Library Assistant Francisco Rodriguez went to the Federal Resume Workshop at the Good Samaritan Veterans Outreach and Transition Center. The workshop dealt with helping military veterans and library patrons learn how to apply for jobs on the website USAJobs.gov.

TEXANA/ GENEALOGY



During the Staff In-service on November 3, Texana/Genealogy staff viewed two training webinars hosted by the Texas Historical Commission. The first webinar, *Organizational Practices: A Digital Repository's Perspective*, examined collection organization and preservation from the perspective of The Portal to Texas History, a digital repository for cultural heritage and historic materials from across the state of Texas. For the second webinar, *Translation in Museums: Tips and Tricks to Get it Right*, a professional translator discussed how the translation process works, the different services offered by translation providers, and the most common timing and pricing for translation projects. After the training, staff were provided a

tour of the newly renovated third-floor Children's Department, including behind-the-scenes locations in their staff workroom area. Special Collections Manager Heather Ferguson was recognized by Public Services Administrator Haley Holmes for her 5-years of service to the City of San Antonio. The Staff In-service concluded with a wellness craft activity and group lunch.

As part of their "Lunch and Learn" series, Librarian Sylvia Reyna conducted a beginning genealogy class at the Commander's House Senior Center on November 8. Classes in this series are in a less formal atmosphere which lends itself to more participant engagement.

Librarian Deborah Countess led the virtual class *Searching Bexar County Records Online* on November 13. The Bexar County Clerk's website maintains current and historical land and marriage records available through the GovOS, Inc. software platform. Ms. Countess went over how to navigate the site and find information that can help further local genealogical research. On December 11, she held the virtual class, *Using Vital Records for Genealogy Research*, focusing on finding and understanding, within a genealogical context, both civil and religious birth, marriage and death records.



Ms. Reyna invited Andrea "Vocab" Sanderson, San Antonio Poet Laureate (2020-2023), to present her workshop *Writing Family Memoirs for the Non-Writer, or "What Did Grandma Say?"* on November 18. Participants were instructed on how to gather information for their family memoir and begin the writing process. Ms. Sanderson went over conducting an oral interview, gathering genealogical information and visiting the library to gather resources. Within the writing process, she noted how language, tone, and imagery, are just a few of the many writer's tools available that can help breathe life into a family memoir.

On November 20, Library Assistant Kaylee Avila hosted Transgender Day of Remembrance in collaboration with the library's Queer Committee, the San Antonio Gender Association, and the Pride Center of San Antonio. The event began with a resource fair in the foyer that included the following organizations: The San Antonio Gender Association, the Pride Center of San Antonio, San Antonio Human Rights Campaign, Women in Transition, Trans Masc Folks y Mas, Binders for Brothers, Fiesta Youth, PFLAG, American Veterans for Equal Rights, Thrive Youth Center, The Kind Clinic, Living Positive San Antonio, Equality Texas, and the Alamo Area Resource Center.



UTSA Special Collections curated a display showcasing local transgender history through photos, articles, and artifacts. Following the resource fair there was a program in the auditorium. Ms. Avila gave an introduction and then Gideon from the San Antonio Gender Association spoke about the importance and value of community for building resilience. Three representatives from community organizations spoke briefly. Community members volunteered to help read the 62 names of trans/gender non-conforming individuals lost to violence over the past year. The event concluded with an outside candlelight vigil. About 10 library staff members helped with this event that brought together an estimated 150 people from the community.

Librarian Andy Crews presented an online class on the Fold3 library subscription database on November 27, demonstrating the types of military and other records available to researchers and providing tips for accessing and utilizing them. Mr. Crews also presented a "Beginning Genealogy" class on November 28 at McCreless Library that provided guidance on getting started in family history research. As part of the Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week Adult Initiative, November 11-18, Mr. Crews partnered with Librarian Cristiane Yamada-Lokensgard in coordinating and promoting the staff food drive. He visited Tobin Library on December 15 and presented a class on using the subscription database (*Access*) *Newspaper Archive*. Mr. Crews demonstrated how to research the digitized newspapers to find relevant historical information and how to access the database from home.



The San Antonio Public Library partnered with San Anto Zine Fest (SAZF) to present the 2023 Zine Festival on Saturday, December 9 at Central Library. The event showcased 100+ artists who create and self-publish works including comics, poetry, nonfiction, personal stories, anthologies, photography, art, and more! The event also featured a series of panels and workshops in the Latino Collection & Resource Center (LCRC), the Library's Big Read Zine'23 Release, a zine-making activity by Spare Parts, and four food trucks stationed outside of Central. Ms. Ferguson, along with LCRC Program Manager Sarah De La Rosa, served on the planning committee to coordinate the event logistics and run-of-show. The door count for the day's event surpassed 2,450.

On December 13, Ms. Reyna presented the class *Methods in Conducting Cemetery Research* at Walker Ranch Senior Center. She went over the various types of cemeteries that exist and discussed the symbolism, inscriptions, and information that can be gleaned from visiting a cemetery. She then compared it to documentation that can be found using library databases. Ms. Reyna returned to the Walker Ranch Senior Center on December 15 to lead the program *Tips and Techniques in Scrapbooking*. She presented a slideshow that provided examples of thematic scrapbooking, intertwining genealogy documents with colorful and illustrative backgrounds. She also stressed the importance of using archival quality, acid and lignin free materials when producing the physical book.

BRANCH LOCATIONS

BAZAN

The Bazan branch library partnered with the Area Agency on Aging and the WellMed Charitable Foundation in November to host two programs for caregivers, one for English speakers and one for Spanish speakers. The programs provided valuable information and resources for both family caregivers and professionals to support their work.

Bazan library spread some cheer during the holidays with help from the Bazan Friends of the library. The friends group donated books, which were festively wrapped, as a gift to customers who checked out five or more library items. With this initiative, Bazan's circulation jumped 60% from 2022 circulation totals.

Assistant Manager and Teen librarian Cassie Garza hosted the BTS Craft Club at Bazan library. For the month of November the group made shrinky dink BTS themed keychains and magnets. December's craft was sharing BTS themed 2024 calendars and DIY glitter ornaments.



Ms. Garza continued to facilitate the 210 Teen Library Discord Gaming club. Every Saturday afternoon at 4pm teens met up on the 210 Teen library Discord server and discussed and streamed video games. For the month of November and December the teen group played Roblox games, streamed Lego Minecraft and a new game called Duskers.

Ms. Garza also hosted Teen Time on Saturday afternoons along with help from teen volunteers. Teens had a great time making quesadillas, playing video games, and designing and creating their own pinback buttons.

The Bazan Ink Slayers Writers Group, facilitated by Bazan Library Assistant Enedina Prater, had three meet-ups in December, with new writers attending every session. The group consisted of new writers along with more seasoned writers, each learning from the other.

The 210 Swifties held another Taylor Swift meet-up and event to celebrate her album *Evermore*. The event entitled, *Tis' the Damn Season: Evermore Three-Year Anniversary Listening Party* referenced a song from her *Evermore* album. Nearly three dozen super fans of all ages gathered to listen to the entire album, sing along to the lyrics which were projected on a screen, make shrinky dinks craft and bracelets and color Taylor Swift themed coloring sheets. The group had a great time.



The Learn Center at Bazan, staffed by Training Officer Carlos Loera, continued to assist adult customers with sessions covering computer skills, resume building, job search, job applications and help with personal devices. ESL (English as a Second Language) classes were offered every Tuesday evening where students continued to develop their English language skills. Mr. Loera also led painting classes for senior adults twice a month and hosted *Coffee and a Movie for Senior* adults on the first Friday of the month. *Coloring for Adults*, a place and time to enjoy creativity and make new friends, was offered every third Friday.

The manager attended the Walker Ranch Senior Center's Holiday Party, judged the ugly sweater contest, and shared baked wreaths with nearly 200 seniors. The Friends of Brook Hollow Library (FOBHL) had a book sale in December @ BHL featuring holidays wreaths made by the BHL Staff and donated to the BHL Friends.

In November and December 2023, Guest SAPL Children's Librarians Shannon Seglin; Karen Braeuler, Ashely Stubbs, along with the BHL manager, covered Thursday morning story times at BHL. BHL's new children's librarian joins the BHL Team at the end of January 2024.

BHL hosted Bexar County Election Department's Early Voting October 23-November 3 and Election Day, November 7, 2023. Nearly 5,000 Bexar County Residents voted at BHL during the voting cycle. The Manager and BHL Team received ENCORE cards from voters and the onsite Bexar County Election Judge Marilyn Jowdy. "Excellent support to Elections team! Doors opened timely, Wonderful to work with Jeannette and her Team!" Voter Janie Jones wrote that "you were graciously available as we needed information and assistance in securing an application for a mail-in ballot for my sister who is unable to go to the poll and urgently wanted to participate in the voting process. Our Thanks!"

Adult Services Librarian Marco De Leon coordinated BHL's December book clubs including, The Mystery Book Club 12/7 with eight attendees; Tuesday Evening Book Club 12/12 with six attendees; and the Walker Ranch Book Club at Walker Ranch Senior Center 12/21 with 18 attendees.

In November & December 2023, BHL Assistant Elissa Vura along with Librarian Tim Johnson (Potranco), Library Assistant Mary Elizabeth Fernandez (Central - Childrens), and J.D. Elizondo (Central - Information

Services), hosted the Escape the Earth podcast—a monthly sci-fi and fantasy book discussion. The November episode, featuring Fonda Lee's *Jade City*, has received 67 plays to date. The December episode, in which the Escape the Earth crew discussed the novella *Rosebud* by Paul Cornell, has 60 plays and counting. The Escape the Earth podcast is available on Soundcloud under the San Antonio Public Library Podcast TunedIn Channel.

Vura coordinates BHL's Teen Gaming program, a new weekly program for teens ages 13-18, launched November 16. Teens led the way in the selection and planning of gaming activities such video gaming on the Nintendo Switch and playing various tabletop games. The program provides teens the opportunity for positive social interaction with their peers and exploration of interests and hobbies.

The Teen Area at BHL continues to make space available for teens to express themselves. Holt met with local Girl Scout Troop 66 on December 3rd to resume collaboration on a Free Little Library project. Holt also worked with the Teen Summer Workgroup to create the submission form for this year's Teen Summer Shirt Art Contest, to update the Teen Summer LibGuide with 2024 information, and to let teens in the 210teenlibrary Discord server that the contest is open for submissions.

CARVER

On Sunday, November 12, the Prudence Curry Writers' Series welcomed poets John Espinoza Olivares and Yvette DeChavez. Olivares, who has been long associated with the non-profit Macondo Writers Foundation, read from his collection, *The Date Fruit Elegies*. DeChavez who holds a doctorate from the University of Texas at Austin, has also been associated with the Macondo Writers, shared her work as well. She has published in the *LA Times* and *The Mujerista* as well as in *Fierce* by Mitu. A collection of verse is forthcoming. Founded in 1923, NSPDK, is devoted to promoting the highest ideals of the teaching profession and encouraging the development of the potential of youths.



The November meeting of the Carver of the Coliseum-Willow Park Neighborhood Association marked the retirement of Kevin Whisenhunt, the community's San Antonio Fear Free Environment (SAFFE) officer. The residents and Carver Branch thanked him for his many years of service and presented him with a going away gift as well as a citation award presented by neighborhood association president Armand Hathaway.

Kwanzaa at Carver attracted 20 celebrants here on Wednesday, December 27, 2023. The observance was led by Aundar Maat, a member of the Friends of Carver Branch. The celebration was marked by singing and drumming and included a display of Kwanza traditional Kwanza emblems, such as dried corn, fresh fruit, a cup symbolizing unity and seven candles representing African ancestors. On December 9, the branch hosted Our *Lady of the Lake University's Mariachi de los Santos*. Attendees listened to festive and traditional mariachi music. For many of the students, this was their first public performance.

Ms. Villa also hosted a Gift-Wrapping Swap event on December 16. Attendees had the opportunity to listen to holiday music and socialize.

For the month of December, Adult Librarian Rosa Villa mounted Holiday and Gingerbread display.



Teen Services Librarian Daniella Toll facilitated 4 teen events at Collins Garden Library in November, with 15 teens in attendance, and 2 events in December, with 8 teens. Under Ms. Toll's supervision, teen volunteers led events for ages 13-18. They selected the activities, prepared the supplies, and identified items for future events. They learned graphic design skills by creating fliers for events and developed confidence and social skills by welcoming new teens and starting conversations with them. Ms. Toll coached teens in job readiness and gave tips on job applications and follow-up. Under Ms. Toll's guidance, teen volunteers used their creative skills to assist with promoting library programs. facilitated an off-site teen volunteers discussion on November 18 where teens brainstormed about clubs they lead on the 210teenlibrary Discord server. They also engaged in some platform troubleshooting to best fit the needs of the virtual meetings they host. Discord teens hosted a digital gift exchange and a creative writing contest for each other Ms. Toll assisting with the logistics. She also facilitated conversation encouraging teens to consider positive aspects of change.



In November, Children's Librarian Gina Brudi hosted four Lego Clubs, four Preschool Story Times, two Let's Create: Art Time and two Let's Build: Blocks and More. She continued her monthly story time visits to Little Wonderland, Knox Early Education Center, and the Preschool classrooms at Collins Garden Elementary. On November 16th, Ms. Brudi attended the Revving Up Reading Car Show event at Graebner Elementary and spoke with families about library services. At the event, children used tempera paint sticks and created art on butcher paper. On November 17, she attended Career Day at Harris Middle School where she presented to the 6th grade classrooms about Librarian careers. She then shared funny picture books and scary stories. The Friends invited patrons to get holiday or family pictures taken on a green screen with a background of their choosing to be added and e-mailed later in the week. The event was free to anyone, with a suggested donation of \$3 to support the Friends. The event happened over two days with much excitement and gratitude from patrons for offering an easy and affordable avenue towards celebrating the holiday with friends or family. In December, community members from Wells Fargo volunteered their time and resources to gift wrap presents for the patrons of Cortez Library at no charge. Adult Services Librarian Melissa Carroll hosted her Cortez Library *Nothing Fancy Book Club* meet up for its third meeting. Club members are excited to watch the movie based on *Devolution* that is presently under development. In December, Adult patrons enjoyed an afternoon before the holiday relaxing at a "Drop-In Crafternoon", making easy, stress-free Luminarias and ornaments using upcycled old books. Librarian Melissa Carroll began a partnership with Senior Planet and Older Adults Technology Services (OATS) from AARP. "Getting to Know your smartphone" was the first of many workshops that focus on helping older adults with technology. *Getting Crafty*, Library Assistant Jo Ann Paredes's crafting class celebrated 10 years strong. The two notable events this month were a partnership with San Antonio Parks and Recreation at the Medina River Natural Area and a *Bread and Butter* event at the library. The Medina River Natural Area and the Cortez branch held a joint Nature Smart event where children were able to make hats and bird feeders, inspect bugs up close, and learn about birds which are native to the area. *Bread and Butter* was held during the week of Thanksgiving. In preparation for the holiday, over 20 children and their adults were able to start making bread that they could then take home to bake, as well as make butter for their fresh baked bread! Encino teens have been led by our teen library aide Kelli Pyles while we await our next Teen Librarian. Each week the kids come up with different activities and they always have a nice big group hanging out together. They have also continued their weekly Monday Art program led by volunteer Aubry Warmke where the students enjoy hanging out and working on different projects together.

Encino Adults had a busy holiday season including informational programming and many craft opportunities! On November 12, Encino hosted the Bexar County Master Gardeners for a program about rainwater harvesting. The program was well attended, and the audience was very engaged.

In November, Memorial Branch Library continued to serve as a polling place for Early Voting and Election Day. Additionally, the branch welcomed members of the local Geocaching community for a Geocaching Film Festival and discussion. Near the end of the month, Sara de la Rosa of the Latino Collection and Resource Center came to the branch and conducted a program introducing tarot card reading to a fascinated audience.

December saw a flurry of activities and opportunities for the Memorial community to learn and explore and contribute. The Dig It! program showed attendees how to care for trees and how much benefit is derived from having them in their landscapes. 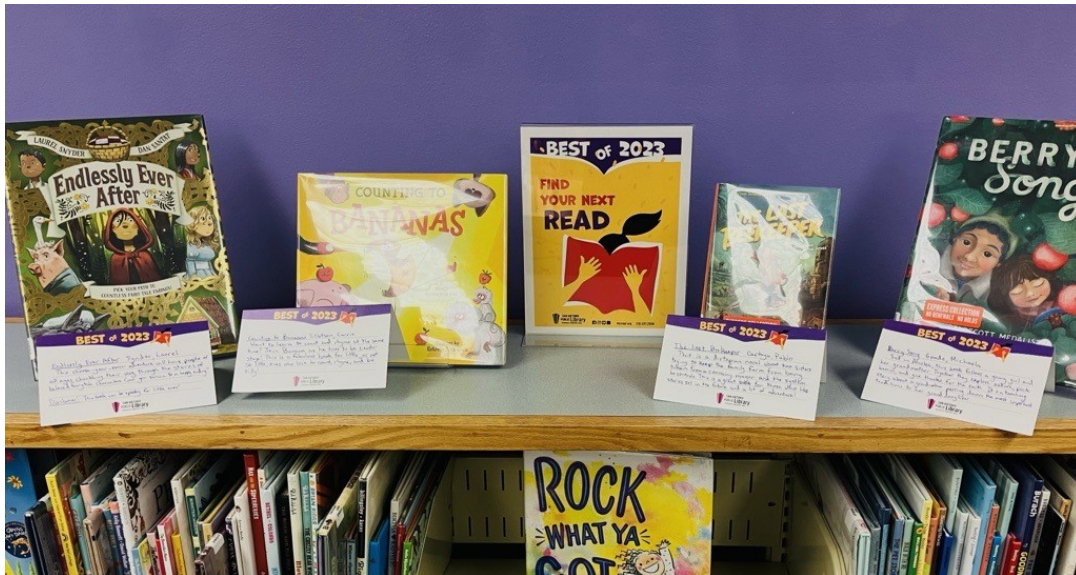

In December the Children's Display "Best of 2023" had books and reviews from library staff.

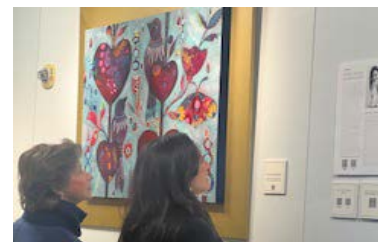
PARMAN

Many patrons remarked on how they appreciate being able to vote at a central location for the neighborhood that is both safe and familiar at the same time. There was a good



turnout this year and as always staff took the opportunity to tell newcomers about library services as they entered the library to cast their votes. Teens also provided information and insight about their chosen country. While people enjoyed stories and beautiful costumes from 16 different countries, they were treated to holiday music from local pianists and even had the opportunity to get their face painted by elves. It was so much fun even Santa dropped by. As always, the event celebrated Parman's diverse community and with over 350 people in attendance it continues to be the library's most popular winter event.

Teen Time attendees enjoyed a variety of activities during their November and December Programs. Librarian Zachary W. helped the teens set up a variety of games and provided them with the needed materials to continue their Dungeons and Dragons Campaign. Zach also organized a Teen Time Thanksgiving Party, where teens enjoyed pies, games, and a friendly foosball competition. Teens also enjoyed watching a series of holiday themed movies during December programming, with Elf in particular being a crowd favorite!

Dinosaurs took over Parman Library in November with dinosaur display created by Teague Shosh and a dinosaur scavenger hunt. To go along with the Dinovember theme, Teague's Creator Club kids drew elaborate cities and decorated dinosaurs to stomp through their pictures. Creators also had a great time making robots out of recycled materials, coloring with chalk and building with Legos.

"Reading is Snow Much Fun!" was the theme for December. During winter holidays break, children were encouraged to take an in-house craft kit to create a snow creation holding their favorite book! 20 children have created snowmen and placed them on our winter scene in the back window. In December kids participated in two wintry crafts during Creator Clubs. One week they used salt to add extra texture to watercolor snowflakes and another week they made forest scenes and then used a cotton swab and white paint to cover their artwork in snow.

Tweens enjoyed a multi-day project using air dry clay to make various masterpieces. After the clay dried, they painted and then sealed their creations. Miss Teague checked out Meeper Bots and Artie drawing robots from the Children's Services Department and the tweens had a great time using both. One group of kids made elaborate tracks for the Meeper Bots to race through. The *Toddler Story Times* and *Sensory Play Times* were both themed around the fall season. *Story Time* featured books on cooking, turkeys, and leaves, while *Sensory Play Time* helped attendees strengthen their fine motor and pre-writing skills through Thanksgiving-themed playdough mats, sensory bins, and stickers. Participants had a great time exploring their imaginations with the branch's play kitchen center.

Children's Yoga and *Tween Yoga* classes both focused on practicing gratitude meditations. Additionally, children had the opportunity to participate in a turkey-themed scavenger hunt in the Kids' Zone, which helped them exercise their reading and writing skills, and encouraged them to "Gobble up a good book." Overall, Pruitt's Children's Services hosted eight programs in November for early childhood and school-age children, with a total of 102 members of the Pruitt community in attendance.

December was a time of joy and excitement for Pruitt's Children's Services as the branch organized a series of entertaining events for children. The *Toddler Story Times* and *Sensory Play Times* were both winter-themed, featuring books on snow and arctic animals to ignite the children's imagination. *Sensory Play Time* offered attendees the chance to enhance their fine motor and pre-writing skills with winter-themed playdough mats, arctic animal habitats, as well as an icy penguin sensory bin.

To add to the fun, children were invited to participate in a winter holiday-themed scavenger hunt in the Kids' Zone, which not only helped them exercise their reading and writing skills, but also encouraged them to "Get wrapped up in a good book." In total, Pruitt's Children's Services hosted seven programs in December for early childhood and school-age children, with 125 members of the Pruitt community in attendance.



Pruitt's Adult Services featured guest speaker Master Gardener Kathy Breniman who chatted with participants about south-central Texas plants during the *Dig It! Master Gardener – Texas Superstars: Plants for Fall* program. *Adult Virtual Coloring* sessions continued on Friday afternoons, including a participant-led virtual Christmas party featuring seasonal outfits and themed snacks and drinks. *Adult Craft Time* featured Christmas / Holiday Bunting made from greeting cards in November and Luminarias in December courtesy of the Adult Services Winter Committee. *Special Needs Adult Program (SNAP)* participants read *Memoirs of an Elf* by Devin Scillian and *The Very Last Castle* by Travis Jonker, and made Christmas / Holiday bunting from greeting cards and scenes of castles with a background of salt and watercolor firework explosions. Pruitt branch also hosted a *Community Chess Tournament*, overseen by Chess Master Alex Weinberg, which attracted 24 competitors of all ages and a crowd of 27 onlookers silently cheering them on.



SAN PEDRO

The San Pedro Branch Library provided a variety of programs and services during the months of November and December. Programs for children, teen and adults were offered either weekly or once per month. As the holiday season approached, branch staff decorated and offered programs and service to match.

In November, senior adults at the Chandler Senior Living Community enjoyed discussing *The Reading List* by Sara Nisha Adams, facilitated by librarian Karen Braeuler. In December, the group enjoyed *Forget the Alamo: The Rise and Fall of An American Myth*, by Ryan Burrough with 14 people anxious to give an opinion on the different take on the traditional historical narrative. The group chimed in singing the "Davy Crockett" song from the show of their youth and one member wore a coonskin cap! Each month the seniors are supplied with copies of the book for discussion the following month.

To increase children's awareness of nature, staff created a display of books about trees that was embellished with touchable tree parts. Children could pick up bark, acorns and all kinds of leaves that live in San Pedro Springs Park.

An instructor from San Antonio College brought some of her English as a Second Language students to San Pedro Library to get library cards, familiarize them with American libraries and check out English language books. Librarians Diana Starrett and Karen Braeuler assisted them.

Manager Nathan Laubner and librarians Karen Braeuler and Diana Starrett met with San Antonio College students interested in advancing science and engineering programming at the San Pedro branch. Some ideas were discussed and the students will contact the group in the new year, when the new semester starts.

San Pedro Branch Library represented SAPL with an information table at the Beacon Hill Academy Community Resource Fair. In addition to talking with families, connections were made with other groups who participated in the event.

In addition to regular Children's programming in November and December, STEAM robotics programs were offered for school age children, as well as extra activities for families during the Thanksgiving break.

In November, the branch hosted a classical Bharatanatyam performance to celebrate Diwali in the form of music, dance and storytelling, offered by the Kaveri Natya Yoga Dance group.

In December, District 1 presented a Holiday Lights Fair for the public on the front grounds of the San Pedro Branch Library. Approximately 100 attended and were treated to food, music from a DJ and mariachis, vendor booths, a snow globe inflatable and beautiful holiday lighting which adorned the branch during the season.

SCHAEFER

During November and December, children of all ages had the opportunity to attend many different programs at Schaefer. For children younger than five, Outdoor Family Story Time was every Wednesday morning. The kids and families met on the playground for the program. In the case of inclement weather, the group moved inside. Babies and caregivers attended Baby Story Time on Tuesdays. An exciting new opportunity started in December with Story Time: Sing and Stroll with Us. Schaefer's children's librarian Leslie Elsasser worked with Pan American's children's librarian Rachel Forbes to create a story time program that took place along the Schaefer trail. This program will take place once a month.

Programs for school-age children and tweens were offered to suit a variety of interests. Construction programs Let's Build: LEGO Time and Let's Build: Blocks & More were offered every other week. Let's Create: Come & Go Art was offered on select weekends to let kids develop their creativity. Read to a Dog took place twice a month for kids to practice their reading skills by reading to Molly, a therapy dog. Robot Roundup, Tween Tech Time and Video Games for Kids were offered monthly for kids to explore the world of technology available at Schaefer.

Library Assistant BlancaSilvia Hernandez hosted: a Family Crafting Program where patrons made Winter Holiday Art by tracing cookie cutter shapes on cardstock and using glue to fill it in with various color of sand. A Family Coloring Program where patrons were given the opportunity to color winter themed sheets and bookmarks. An Adult Craft program, where patrons made ornaments. They used an engraver tool to burn stenciled winter scenes on raw wooden discs. And a Winter: Come and Go Craft Program offered over the course of two days, where patrons were provided materials and infographics to make clothespin snowmen, shredded book ornaments and luminaries. She published two catalog list of popular titles for Schaefer's I ♥ Vinyl (Digital Edition) program. She assisted Librarian Dacari Lambert with the Native American Heritage Display. She also created a Winter Display highlighting all the activities, holidays, and foods of the season.

In November and December, Dacari Lambert, Teen Services Librarian at Schaefer Branch Library facilitated weekly Teen Time alongside three teen volunteers. During Teen Time, teens engaged in peer led programming. Dacari worked alongside Adult Services Librarian, Daniel Garcia, to host Mercado por tu Corazon and a variety of other adult and family-based programs throughout the month, including a puzzle swap, which was successful. Dacari continued to work in partnership with the Vocational 18 program at East Central High School to host two groups of student volunteers on a weekly basis, to learn real world work experience.

For systemwide efforts, Dacari worked with colleagues Shannan Prukop, Lisa Puchot, Michael Dunbar-Rodney, Daniel Garcia, and Jason Futrell to continue InQUEERies: a queer themed SAPL podcast.

Dacari continues with her efforts in the system-wide Queer committee; In November helping to organize and host, for the first time ever, Trans Day of Remembrance with community partners. Dacari continues work with Teen Services committees: Discord, Teen Pride, and Professional Development.

During the month of November, the Adult Services Librarian coordinated a weekly health and fitness program at Schaefer: "Cardio-Dance Class", which features a moderate dance workout led by a Schaefer community member. On Saturday, November 10, 2023, the Adult Services Librarian hosted a community volunteer who provided a Medicare information session for older adults. On Saturday, November 18, 2023, the Adult Services Librarian hosted a member of the Bexar County Master Gardeners for a fall session of the Dig It! Gardening series focused on basic tree care. On Sunday, November 19, 2023, the Adult Services Librarian hosted the monthly gaming program, Board Game Social, which provides adults an opportunity to play games and socialize with other adults.

During the month of December, the Adult Services Librarian again coordinated the weekly "Cardio-Dance Class" before the program took a break for the holidays. On Saturday, December 9, 2023, the Adult Services Librarian hosted a second session of the Medicare Information for Older Adults program. On Sunday, December 10, 2023, the Adult Services Librarian hosted another session of "Board Game Social" to finish out the year's programming.

SEMMEs

Tween Time at Semmes continued weekly on Wednesday evenings in November and December. Participants played board games with peers, organized a live Among Us style game, and explored their creative sides with a process art night.

The teens attending weekly Teen Time on Tuesday evenings continue to favor Perler beads, though they also appreciate having paper and drawing supplies on hand to be able to draw, sketch, and write while connecting with new friends.

On December 29th, Semmes hosted a Dungeons and Dragons event for teens. One of our teen volunteers wrote a campaign to run for other teens while on break from school. This campaign wasn't well attended, but the one teen who did show up had lots of fun with the story details in the campaign.

Adult services at Semmes continued with a large number of regular programs; Tai Ji, twice-weekly Table Tennis, and both general interest and an adult special needs book program. Library Assistant Markeico Deuser also presented, in addition to her book club, two separate Cricut crafting events, one in November and another in December.

School-age children's programming in November included one session of Read to a Dog (attendance—9 children, 7 grownups) and 2 sessions of Let's Build: Legos & More (attendance—42 children, 19 grownups). Wednesdays' Preschool Story Time sessions were attended by 103 children and 75 grownups. Thursdays' Toddler Story Time sessions were attended by 110 children and 89 grownups. Thursdays' Baby Story Time sessions were attended by 56 babies and 54 grownups. Ms. Randi recorded a story on the Dial-a-Story line on November 3 and 17.

School-age children's programming in December included 2 sessions of Read to a Dog. (attended by 10 children and 8 grownups) and 1 session of Let's Build: Legos and More attended by 4 children and 2 grownups. Wednesdays' Preschool Story Time was attended by 76 children and 60 grownups. Thursdays' Toddler Story Time was attended by 67 children and 59 grownups. Thursdays' Baby Story Time was attended by 45 babies and 54 grownups. Ms. Randi recorded a story on the Dial-a-Story line on December 1 and 15.

THOUSAND OAKS

Ms. Penick assembled holiday Take-and-Make craft kits for distribution to patrons beginning on December 22. She assembled themed book bundles highlighting the juvenile collection.

Librarian Kimberly King held Teen Time programs on November 6, 13, 20 and 27, and December 4, 11 and 18. She held the in-person All Booked Up Book Club programs on November 12 and December 10. Participants discussed *This Time Tomorrow* by Emma Straub, and *Our Missing Hearts* by Celeste Ng respectively. She facilitated the outreach Senior Book Club programs at the Northeast Senior Center on November 15 and December 20. Participants discussed *Never Have I Ever* by Joshilyn Jackson, and *The Clockmaker's Daughter* by Kate Morton respectively. For November, Ms. King created a "Books to be Thankful For" book display. For December, she created a winter holidays display highlighting Christmas, Hannukah, Kwanza and New Year's titles in the young adult collection.

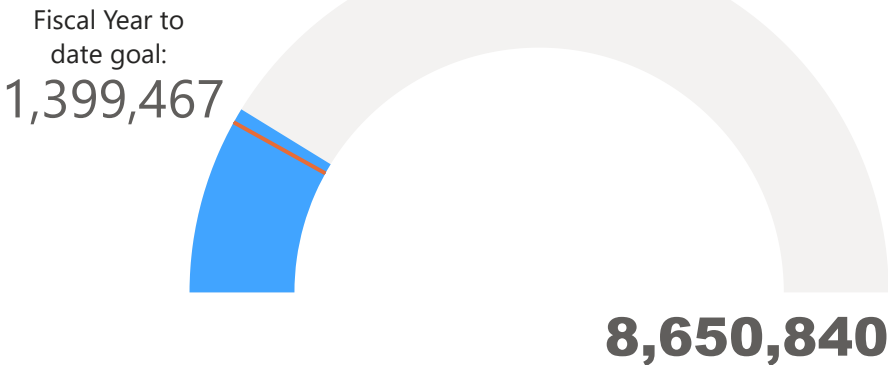

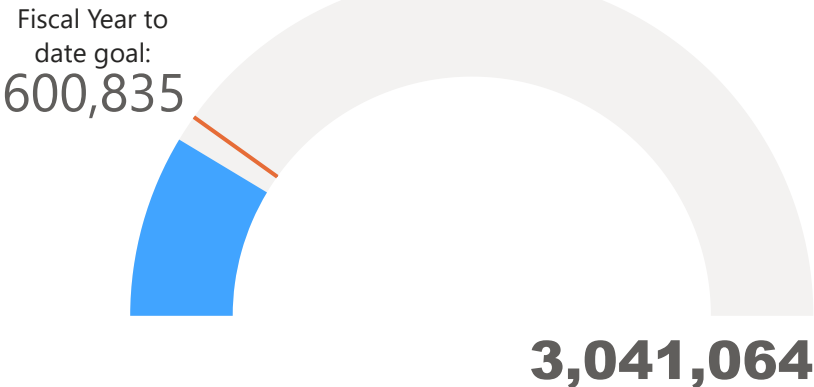

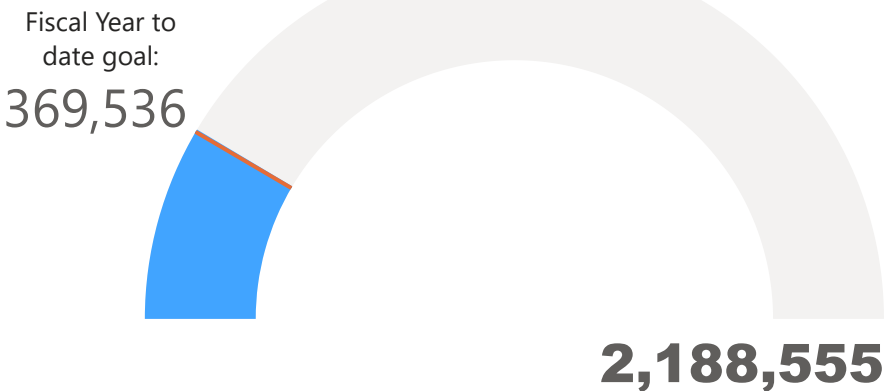

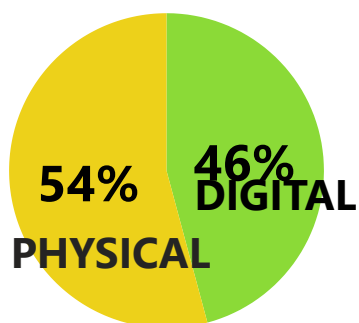

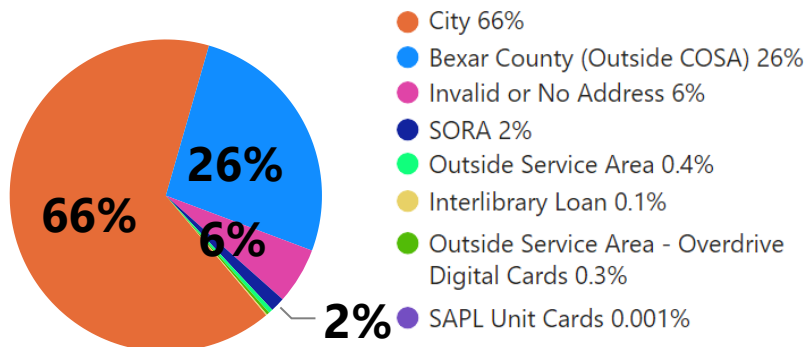

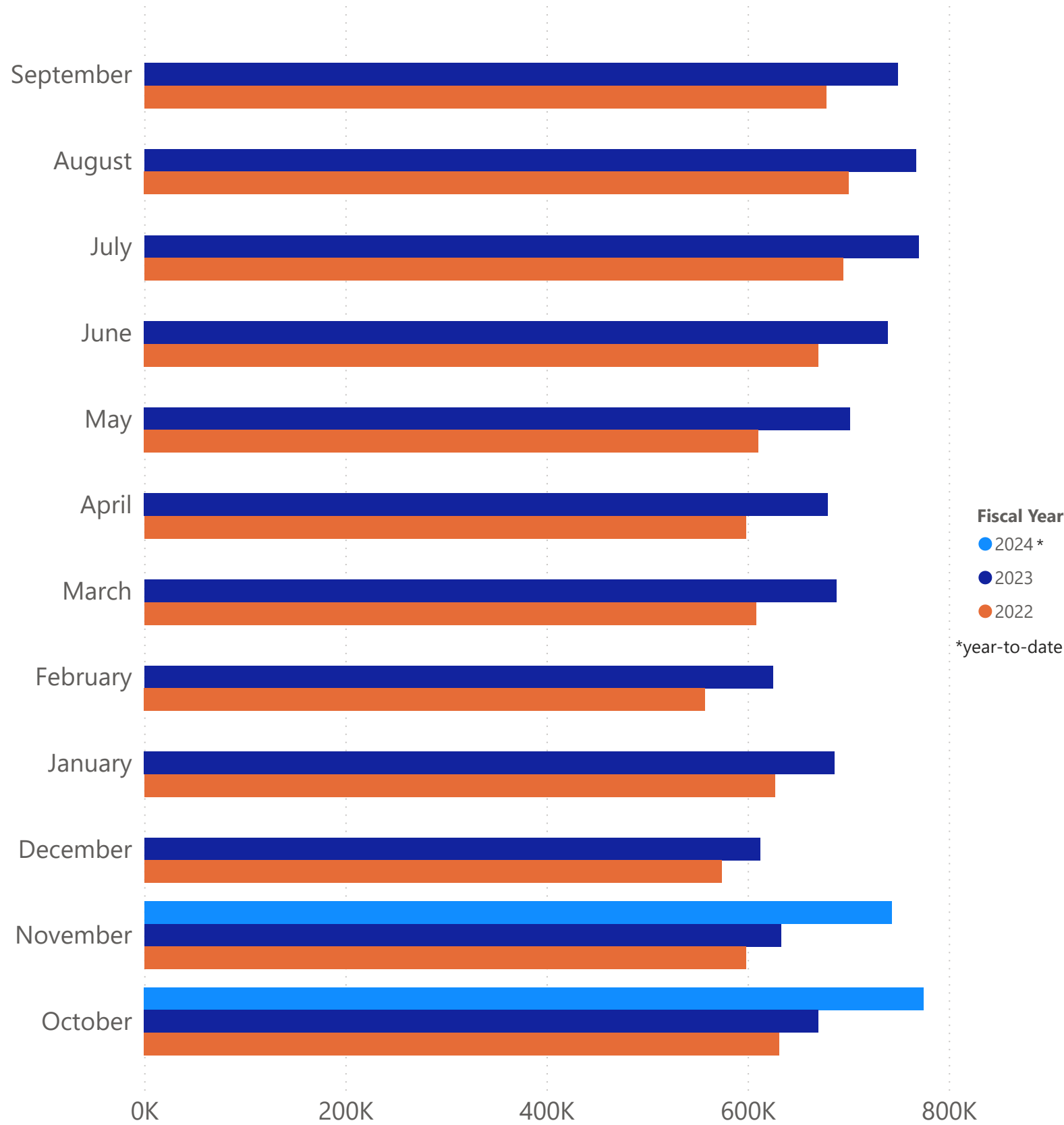

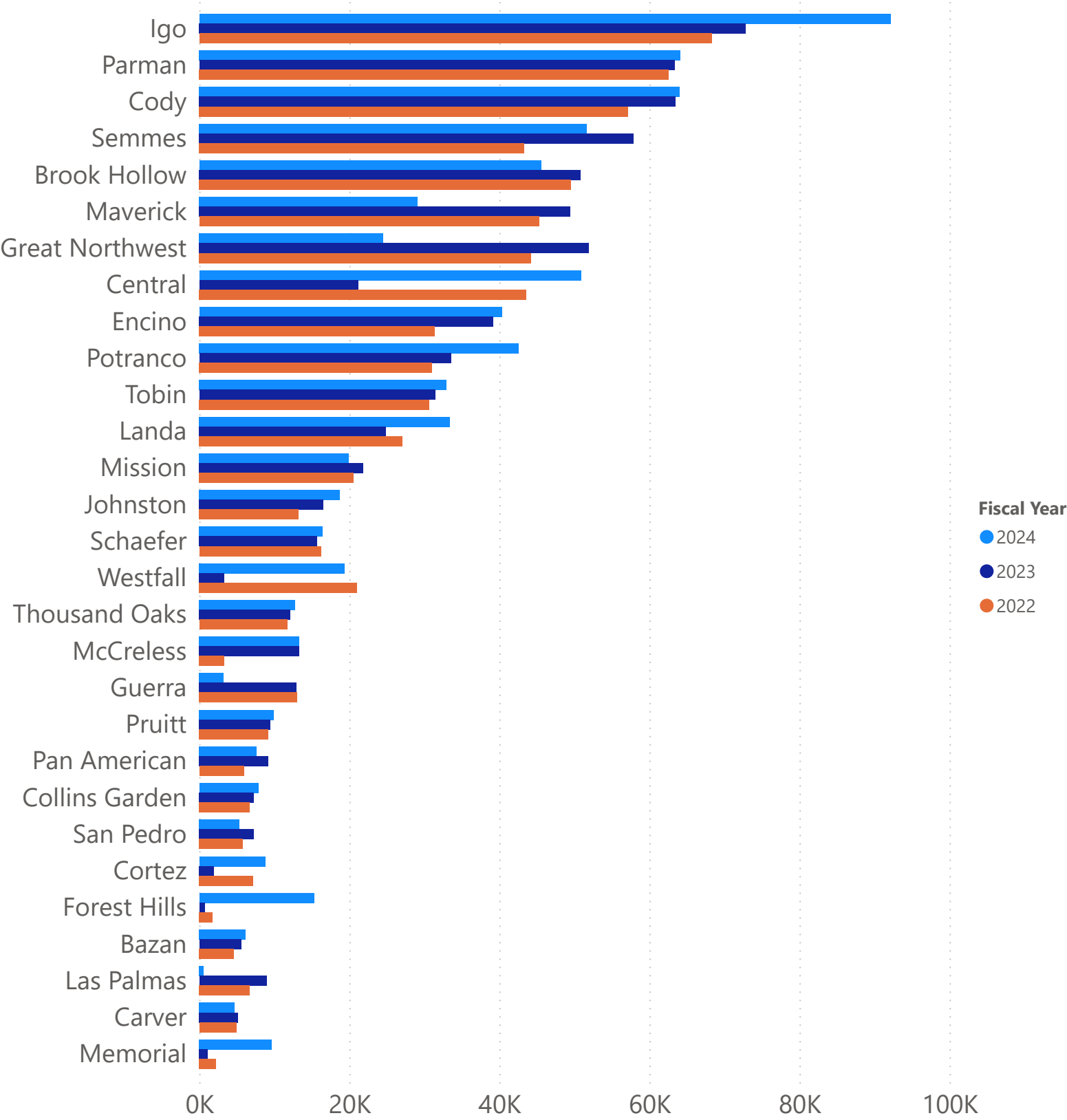

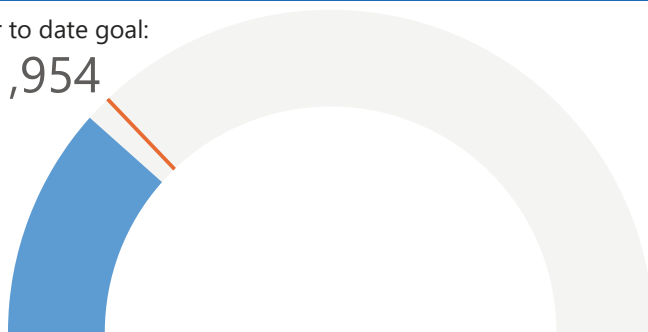

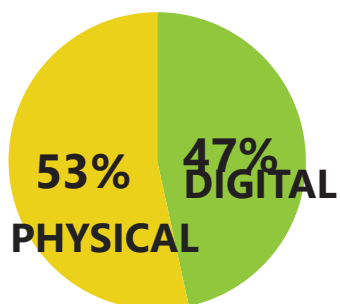

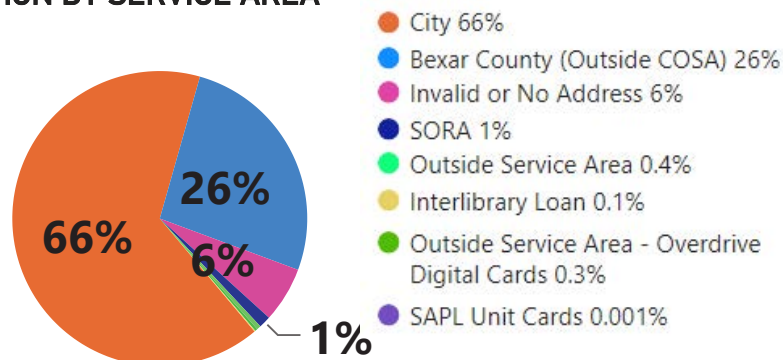

Circulation - Fiscal Year to Date - December 2023

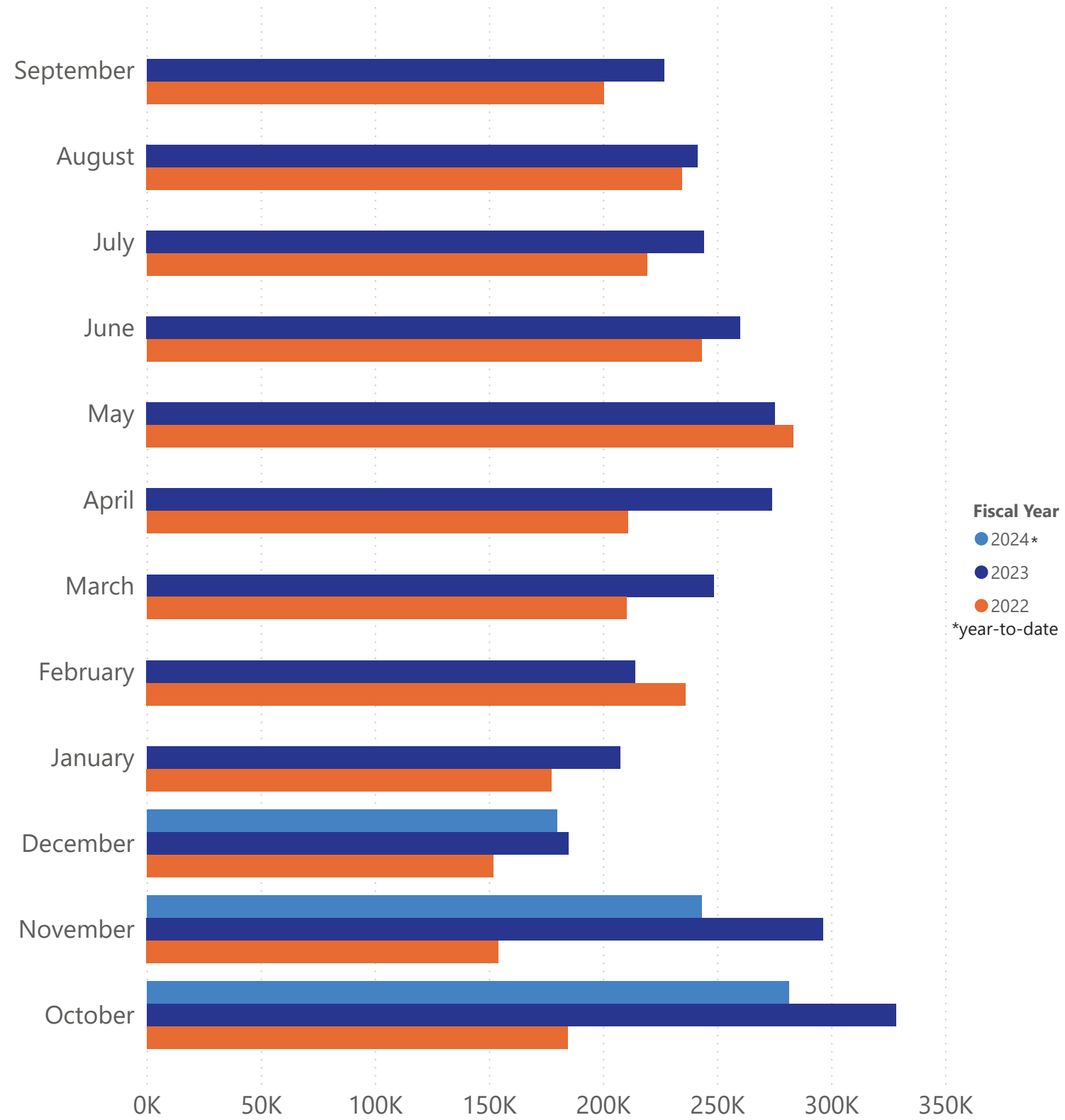

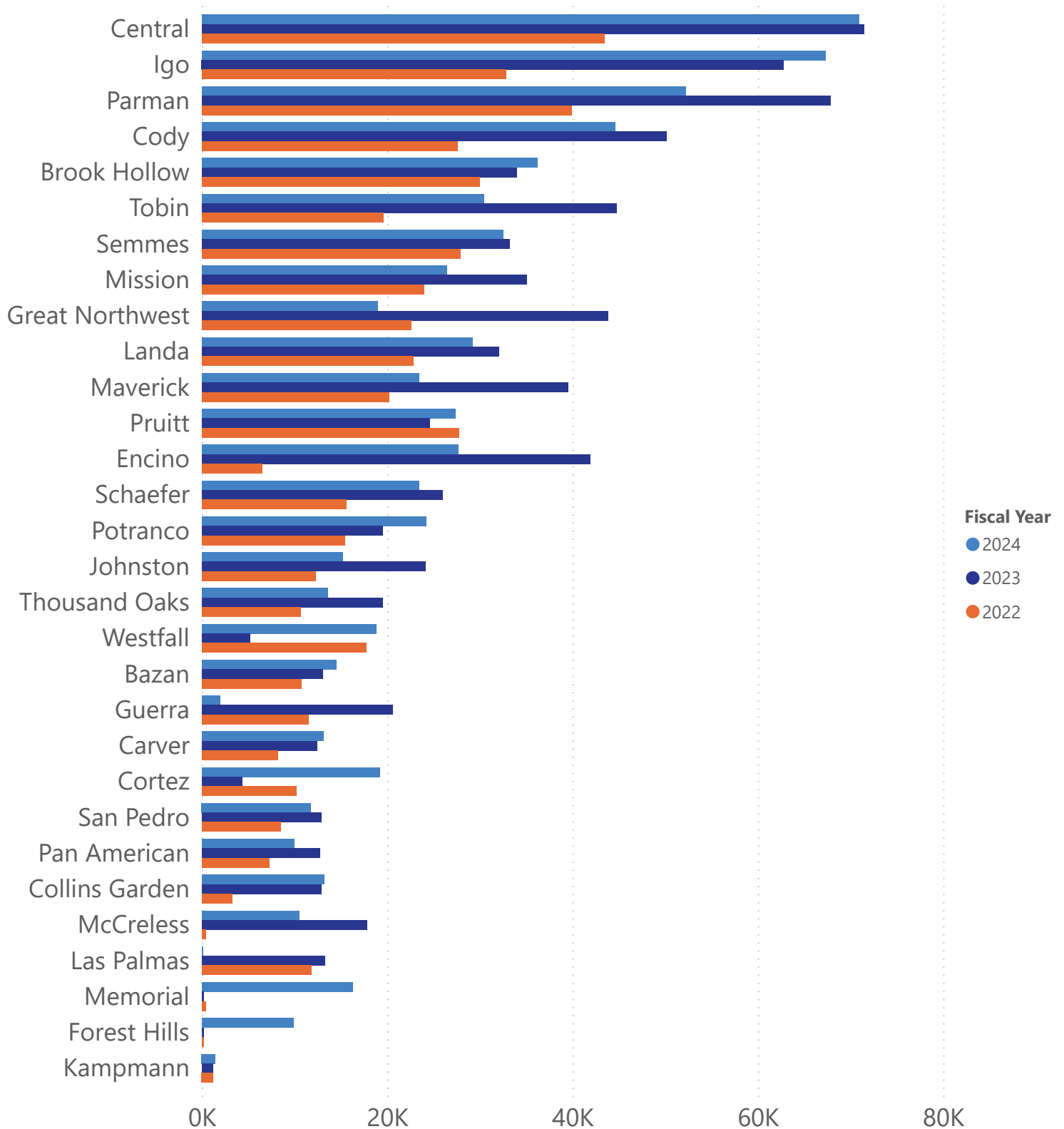

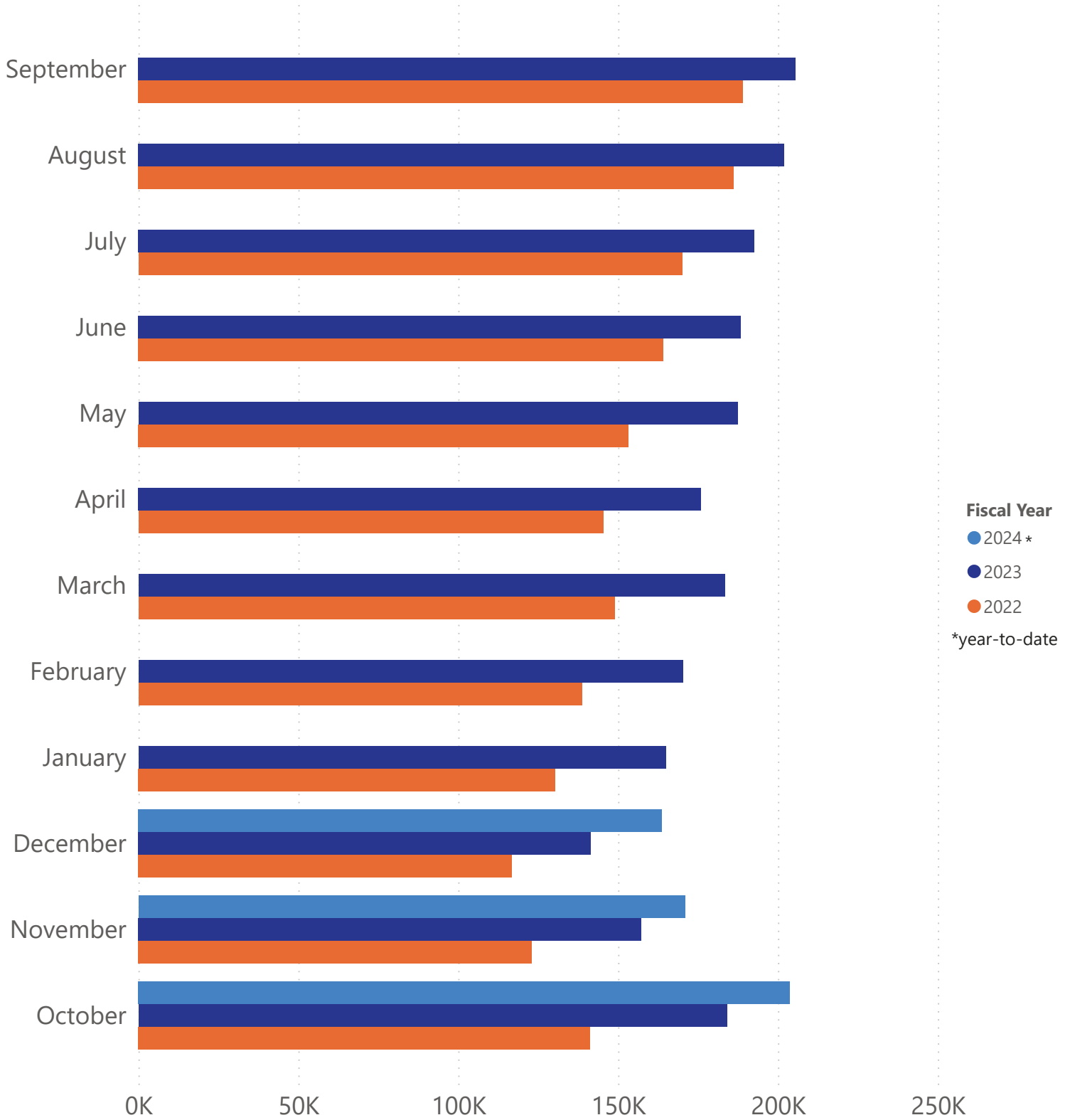
