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# DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

On June 1, 2022 The San Antonio Public Library held a successful launch of the Mayor's Summer Reading Library Club at the McCreless Branch Library. Mayor Nirenberg, Councilwoman Cabello-Harvda and Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar participated in the speaking program. Demonstrations of the different activities the library will offer during the Summer were included in this launch.

On June 1, 2022, The Library Department hosted the Federal Communication Commission Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel to discuss the Affordable Connectivity Program. The Leadership teams from the Library, the Office of Innovation and the Department of Government Affairs were in attendance. The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC program that helps connect families and households struggling to afford internet service.

The San Antonio Public Library had a successful media event at the Bazan Branch Library on Wednesday June 29, 2022, celebrating the City of San Antonio's united opposition to book bans and the City Council's adoption of the Freedom to Read Resolution. Mayor Nirenberg and Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar participated in the media event.

**Graphics**

The Graphics Team created publicity materials for a variety of programs and events during this reporting period, including materials for the Freedom to Read campaign, a Digital Library cling for the new Walker Ranch Senior Center, and developing materials for Back to School, as well as social media and other promotion for branch events.

## DIGITAL SERVICES

On June 16, Digital Services Coordinator Adam Spana, along with Assistant Directors Kathy Donellan and Dale McNeill, met with colleagues from the City's Office of Innovation to discuss a proposal for a digital navigator program and other opportunities afforded by the federal Emergency Connectivity Fund.

On June 21, Mr. Spana attended a meeting of the ITSD Customer Advisory Council and learned of upcoming improvements to client-facing intake tools for reporting IT problems.

On June 22, Mr. Spana, Ms. Donellan and Library Services Administrator Haley Holmes attended the kickoff meeting for becoming a beta tester of in-app RFID checkout functionality in the BiblioApp from BiblioCommons.

On June 23, Mr. Spana was on an interview panel, along with Executive Assistant Edward Mayberry and Assistant to the Director Jessica Zurita, interviewing candidates for the Executive Secretary position.

On June 30, Mr. Spana conducted a site visit at the Bazan branch to diagnose an issue with their digital signage.

## LITTLE READ WAGON

June was filled with opportunities for children and families to play. Altogether, Little Read Wagon (LRW) staffers provided 17 unique, immersive play experiences for the greater San Antonio community. Braving record-setting temperatures, staff set up play invitations outside at parks and community locations for 1,114 children and adults. Over 500 children were able to pick a book of their choice to add to their home libraries thanks to funding from the San Antonio Public Library Foundation. The summer months require endurance and stamina. The entire LRW team was grateful to welcome two new part-time staff who helped lighten the load, particularly given the extreme temperatures.

In coordination with the Parks and Recreation Department, LRW visited McAllister Park every Tuesday, Concepcion Park every Friday, and San Pedro Springs Park on the second Saturday of the month for Let's Play. The events are two hours long to allow children the chance to have enough time and space to choose what to play with and how to play. It takes seven or eight staffers about an hour to unload vans after arriving at the park and set up for play. Clean-up can take an hour or a bit longer depending on how the play unfolded that particular day. Staff do not guide the play; their role is to observe and document so they can plan for the next session or provide tools to enhance the play experience. Staff will engage with children if invited to by that child. During the events, staff also are able to speak with the adults about the benefits of free play and the services that the San Antonio Public Library (SAPL) provides.

Children (and their grownups) explored sensory materials and particularly enjoyed the water area during the very, very hot June weather. They scooped, poured, experimented, used tubes, chutes, and funnels to learn about volume, gravity, and water flow. Children discovered differences in states of water with large ice blocks that staff periodically added to the sensory bins. Gathered together around the water wall, children practiced their social skills and conflict negotiation depending on how much they wanted a tool another child was using. Children used spray bottles to build their fine motor skills and cooled themselves off. They scrubbed and painted rocks with chalk, water and brushes. Children had the opportunity to play with chia seeds and water, experimenting with how much water to add to the seeds and what that would do to their consistency. Using pipettes, bowls and small scoops they delighted in developing "recipes" for their playmates and adults. And this water play was only a small portion of the entire Let's Play event.

Water play was also the focus of the outdoor play offered monthly at the Mennonite Church. LRW staff provided a number of water tools for children to explore. Sixteen children participated and staff were able to provide services to families who do not usually visit a library location.



LRW staff took reading tents on tour throughout the ever-expanding Alamo Ranch area in conjunction with Northside Independent School District. Families were delighted to enjoy the tents and spent time reading each book, playing with flashlights and small toys. The parents were eager to learn about library services and hopeful that SAPL will offer even more services in their community in the near future.



LRW staff are working to create a robust fall, winter and spring schedule of events. From early childhood professional development to caregiver workshops to reading tents to play events, staffers are working to create unique opportunities to further early literacy throughout San Antonio.

# CHILDREN'S (SYSTEM-WIDE)

After months of preparation, Summer with SAPL 2022 unfolded this month with library staff welcoming children to indoor programs, featured guest appearances, and offers of a free new book at sign-up. The support of the San Antonio Public Library Foundation made it possible for children to have the delightful opportunity to choose their own new book to start off a summer of reading and enjoying the library. Many children have chosen to share their summer adventures by leaving their Summer with SAPL story sheet to be displayed at the library.



Children's services team members offered at least two programs for children 5 years of age and older. Children were invited to move, build, create, and explore simple coding with robots. Families were thrilled to enjoy featured guests such as Opera San Antonio, Lucas Miller the Singing Zoologist, Illusions by Blake, Learn Nature with Tom Kinsey, readers theatre with Miss Anastasia, Astonishing Mr. Pitts, storytelling with Sue Kuentz, animal encounters with Happy Tails and Once in a Wild, and a series of online classes with Dinosaur George. Cresencia Huff appeared on Great Day SA with Opera San Antonio apprentice artist Tiffany Collazo to talk about summer library activities. Two more children's services team members are scheduled to appear on local TV in July.

# TEENS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

**Teen Summer 2022** – Teen Summer kicked off during the “Summer with SAPL” press event at McCreless Library. Teen Services Librarians from around the library system were onsite to provide information about this year's in-person and virtual summer programs for teens. Percy, a 210teenlibrary Discord teen, designed this year's t-shirt for Teen Summer, and they attended the event and enjoyed the opportunity to meet Mayor Ron Nirenberg.

**Pride San Antonio Festival / Parade** – On Saturday, June 25, Teen Services represented the San Antonio Public Library at the Pride San Antonio Festival and Parade at Crockett Park. At the festival, teens were able to spin a “prize wheel” for the chance to win Pride-themed keychains, books, stickers,

pencils, and more. Teens also participated in a DIY “glitter glam” and learned about the Teen Summer 2022 program as well as the 210teenlibrary Discord Server. After the festival, the Teen Services VROOM! Van drove through the parade along with a group of library staff, and the San Antonio Public Library’s presence was well-received by parade attendees. The San Antonio Public Library’s participation in this year’s Pride San Antonio Festival and Parade was coordinated by Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and involved several staff throughout the system.

**Virtual Teen Programs and Activities** – The 210teenlibrary Discord workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza and consisting of Teen Services Librarians and Liaisons from around the system, worked with off-site teen volunteers (“Teen Mods”) to host weekly virtual teen programs (“clubs”) on Discord (“the server”) along with additional activities and events. Prior to the reporting period, teens on the server voiced their thoughts about additional clubs and activities they’d like to participate in on the server during the summer, which included an art club, a writing club, friendly creative competitions, and an additional Dungeons & Dragon campaign. During the reporting period, 106 teens requested to join the server, with 75 teens ultimately joining; teens attended a variety of regular and new clubs while also interacting with their peers on the server through their own activities, such as gaming together, sharing art, listening to music, and having conversations about their interests. Teens also regularly discussed their excitement about this year’s t-shirt artwork, which was created by a teen volunteer on the server.

Rosalie Barrera (Librarian I, Teen Library @ Central) joins Chris Castillo (Teen Services Librarian II, Brook Hollow) on Tuesdays to help facilitate “Create Club” on Discord, in which teens share their current creations, completed projects, and new and favorite hobbies. Rosalie assisted in other weekly clubs on the 210teenlibrary Discord server such as “Teen Time” and “Bookworms,” to further her understanding of how teens activate and participate in their own virtual space.

Regina Almanza (Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central) creates graphics and videos for posts and stories. These items include teen interest content, such as polls and quizzes, and highlight celebratory events, such as Pride Month. Regina also evaluates teen-created content for posting as well, including providing tools and supplies or editing needs for Instagram videos, such as Instagram Live demonstrations.

Ciana Flores (Library Assistant PT, Teen Library @ Central) continues to engage with teens via the 210teenlibrary Instagram page. Ciana takes both teen and staff content and presents it as posts and stories, as well as creating indirect programming. She continues to participate in Instagram Live videos with Teen Library staff. Ciana has continued to respond to the 3D printing requests from teens on the Discord server. She prints and sends the requested item out to the teens’ preferred library branch for pick up. Ciana also records and submits all monthly statistics associated with the 210teenlibrary Instagram account.

Amisarahi Sarabia (SAPL’s Teen Outreach Specialist) shares teen-created Spotify playlists on the 210teenlibrary Instagram account weekly and creates weekly Instagram Spotify questions with which teens interact. Amisarahi and Bek Corley (Teen Services Librarian II Guerra) host Music Mondays on the 210teenlibrary Discord server in which teens stream their favorite songs and artists while chatting with friends on the server.

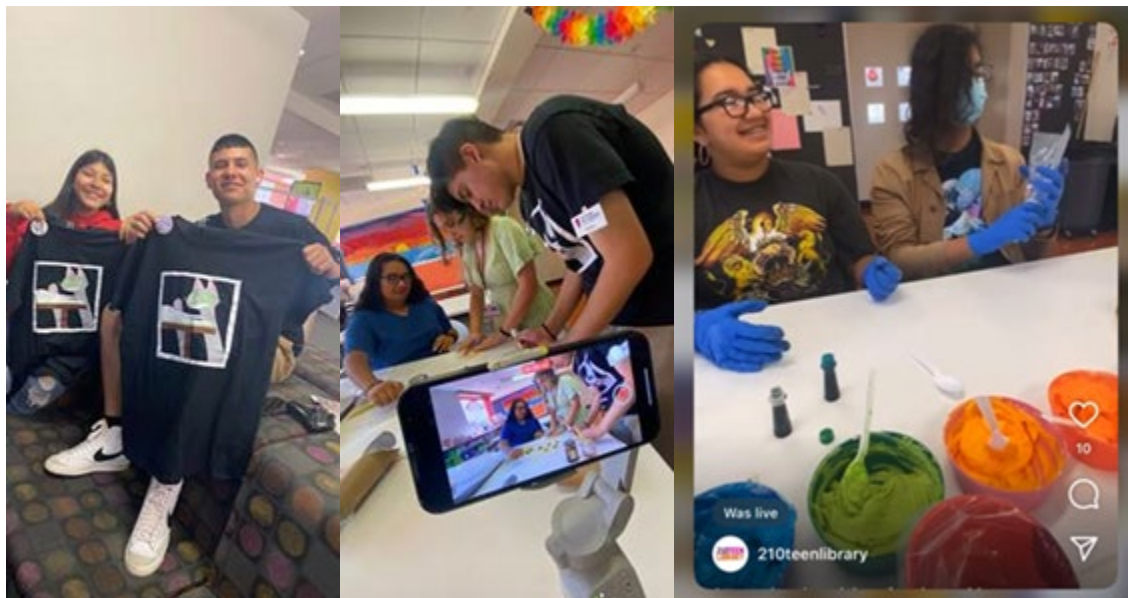
Kathleen Fordyce (Manager, Teen Library @ Central) serves as the Library’s liaison to the Family Service Association and helped to coordinate the hiring of teen summer interns at SAPL. Bazan, Central, Collins Garden, Parman, and Schaefer are participating in the program this year. Kathleen continues to join Connie Hejl (Teen Services Librarian, Las Palmas) Thursdays on Discord to host the “Random Fandom”



club, where teens engage in discussions about different fandoms that interest them and stream their favorite anime or pop culture shows. Kathleen also continues to serve as a member of the Teen Services Discord team.

**Virtual Teen Content and Resources** – The 210teenlibrary Instagram workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza and consisting of Amisarahi Sarabia, Ciana Flores, and Regina Almanza, shared information, resources, activities, and other content for teens on Instagram, created by teen volunteers and Teen Services staff. During the reporting period, teen volunteers and teens shared food recipes and demos for boorsok, rice cake peanut butter cups, mangonadas, strawberry shaved ice, and Japanese fruit sandwiches. Teens and teen volunteers also celebrated Pride Month with a rainbow frosting swirl demo, rainbow grilled cheese sandwiches, and homemade watercolor bookmarks. Teen Services staff congratulated teen volunteers who graduated at the end of the school year, and also promoted the Teen Summer 2022 program with the help of teens who picked up this year's t-shirt.

## ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

In June, Summer with SAPL for Adults was launched. As with the last several summers, this program is structured so that adults can participate in a way that is meaningful for them. Adults are invited to visit their local library branch to pick up a goal tracker postcard. This postcard provides a space for adults to record the goal that they have set for the summer. Goals could include reading or listening to books (including books that folks read or listen to with others), participating in library activities, or participating in an activity the library has inspired folks to learn more about. Once individuals have completed their goal, they are invited to return to the library to claim a pair of limited edition SAPL earbuds with a library card holder. In addition to this, the Library is offering several other opportunities throughout the summer. This includes Flamingo Bingo, where adults are invited to complete challenges such as “read a library book



published the year you were born”, “share a library social media post” and “watch a movie based on a book”. When individuals complete enough challenges to get a bingo, they are invited to come back to their local library branch to receive a flamingo-themed prize. The library also hosted two summer-themed program series, including once presented by the San Antonio Storytellers Association and a series of summer movies. Summer with SAPL concludes at the end of July.

In June, the Library recognized Pride Month to celebrate the LGBTQIA+ community. Activities during the month included a virtual Pride Trivia Night. This program was MC'd by drag performer Aysia Rawse and featured questions about topics such as when was the first Pride parade in the US. Approximately 25 individuals enjoyed the opportunity to learn more about the LGBTQIA+ community in a casual, entertaining atmosphere. A second highlight of the Library's Pride Month efforts was a call for submissions throughout the month for the Big Pride Zine. The theme of this year's Big Pride Zine was Be Proud, and community members were invited to answer the question “what about yourself and your journey are you proud of?”. The library received approximately 20 submissions that will then be reviewed by library staff and formatted into a zine that will be released later in the summer.

In celebration of Juneteenth, Texana Librarian Matt De Waelsche arranged for Mr. Allee Wallace, the official photographer of the San Antonio Juneteenth Coalition, to share his experiences of documenting San Antonio's Juneteenth and Martin Luther King Jr. parades. The events took place at three branch locations, which included the Pan American Library on June 11, the Molly Pruitt Library at Roosevelt High School on June 12 and the Carver Library on June 14. Participants enjoyed the opportunity to learn the history of San Antonio's Juneteenth celebrations from Mr. Wallace's experiences and photographs.

On June 4, Librarian Vicky Villalobos from Cortez Branch held SAPL BTS Festa at Mochinut Coffee Shop. The cup sleeve event celebrated the anniversary date of BTS (a well-known Korean pop - or K-Pop - music group) with vendors, photo opportunities, games, a special menu, and freebies for BTS fans. Patrons were given a custom cup sleeve when they showed their library card or registered for one. Over 300 fans of the K-pop group BTS came out to celebrate and participate in the event, resulting in a line out the door of the coffee shop for most of the event.

## **OLDER ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)**

The library offers a variety of fitness opportunities that are inclusive of older adults. Specifically, chair yoga is offered both online and in person. Carver Branch Library offers in-person chair yoga every Wednesday from 10:30-11:30 am. Additionally, chair yoga is offered online once per month on the last Friday of the month from 10-11 am. Chair yoga is inclusive of older adults in that it uses various postures, stretching, meditation, and/or breathing techniques with the aid of a chair. It is also a great form of exercise for older adults who want to focus on wellness in a more gentle, relaxing way.

Older adults also have several opportunities at various San Antonio Public Library Locations to connect with others who enjoy black and white or film noir films. In June, Encino Branch Library offered three opportunities for individuals to view classic black and white films. Selections included Psycho, Casablanca, and Sunset Boulevard. Older adults also have the opportunity to view a film noir film once per month which is followed by an online discussion a few weeks later. In June, individuals watched the 1949 film White Heat, featuring James Cagney and Virginia Mayo.

# CENTRAL LIBRARY

## CHILDREN @ CENTRAL



*Summer with SAPL* has kept the Central Children's department very busy! Staff enjoyed signing up children for the Summer Reading Program, presenting a slew of outdoor programs at multiple locations, and hosting exciting programs at the Central Library.

Manager Kate Simpson co-chaired the committee that developed the 2022 *Summer with SAPL* program for children. Her leadership role, in partnership with Leslie Elsasser, Children's Librarian II at the Schaefer Branch Library, drove the program towards the open-ended, celebratory model that was rolled out this year. Development of the program started in September of last year, with weekly meetings of the *Summer with SAPL* team continuing all year long! Ms. Simpson felt a great sense of accomplishment seeing all the hard work come to fruition in June.

Librarian Ashley Stubbs coordinated the special event in the Central Library Auditorium: *Once in a Wild!* She introduced the performer who brought in live animals for the large crowd that packed the auditorium to view. Library Assistants Ana Sandoval and Judith Slaughter assisted in guiding the families to the interim service space on the other end of the building, making for a more pleasant visit.

Assistant Manager Shannon Seglin was extremely active in the community this month. In the absence of a Children's Librarian at the Encino Branch Library, Ms. Seglin filled in to present two outdoor Story Times there, much to the delight of the large crowds of families who attended. She facilitated outdoor activities afterwards like washing rocks for the rock-themed Story Time.



Ms. Seglin also played a major role in developing and presenting the innovative movement program for children, *Let's Get Moving!* She was instrumental in crafting the program model that incorporates yoga poses, dance, and exercise, all through a fun lens that kids would relate to, like copying animals with yoga poses, etc. Ms. Seglin then partnered with Children's Librarians at two locations to help present the *Let's Get Moving!* program there: the Landa Branch Library and the Schaefer Branch Library. Finally, she teamed up with Librarian Melissa Fulmer to present *Let's Get Moving!* at the Central Library in the auditorium space. Due to road construction issues, families had a difficult time reaching the library. Only one family attended, who had arrived on the bus. Ms. Seglin and Ms. Fulmer conducted a personal movement program all for the one boy in attendance, who happened to have developmental disabilities and spoke only Spanish. Despite the language barrier, the three of them had a blast for the whole hour, dancing and connecting through the universal language of movement.

Ms. Fulmer also assisted with outdoor programs at other locations this month. She partnered with Librarian Jasmin Salinas at the Landa Branch Library to present Toddler Time programs every Thursday in June. The crowd size grew each week, at one point reaching almost 70 people total!

Ms. Seglin, Ms. Stubbs, and Ms. Fulmer each contributed to virtual programming for children in June. Ms. Seglin presented two Toddler Time programs, one Story Time and one LEGO Club program. She also participated in a virtual version of the innovative *Let's Get Moving!* yoga and movement program. Ms. Stubbs presented two online Story Time Live programs and supported the Tiny Tots and Story Time weekly programs by maintaining their "Books We Love" section of the LibGuide and made several curated programs. Ms. Fulmer participated in two Baby Time Online programs and one Art Club Online event.

Library Assistant Mary Elizabeth Fernandez cohosted the *Escape the Earth* podcast with Tim Johnson (Igo) and Elissa Vura (Brook Hollow). This month they dove into a fun discussion about Rebecca Roanhorse's book, *Black Sun*. So far, at 176 listens, it is the Podcast's highest listened-to episode. *Escape the Earth* podcast can be found on Soundcloud on SAPL's Podcast TunedIn Channel.

Central Children's staff continued to develop outreach connections with area child care centers. Ms. Seglin delivered books in support of the curriculum at Madison Square Child Development Center. Ms. Stubbs made similar book deliveries to Central Christian Day School and presented an outdoor Story Time for the children there. Ms. Seglin also presented two outdoor programs for children at CreativKids Day Camp at Temple Beth El.

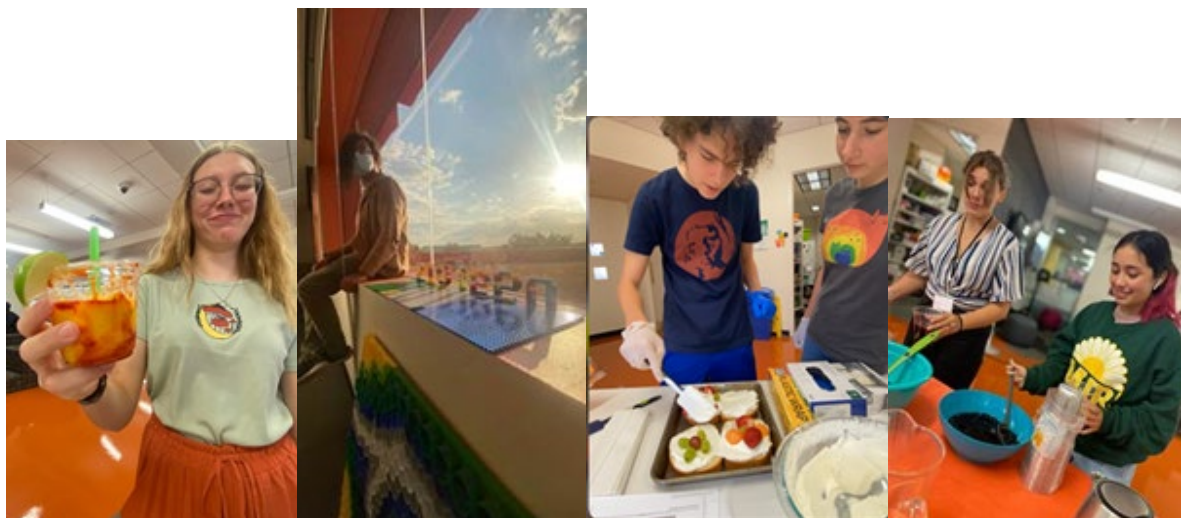
# TEEN LIBRARY

Regina Almanza (Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central): Teen Summer 2022 programming got off to a fun start with teens making a quick healthy snack using rice cakes, watching movies and having popcorn and a drink, making Japanese fruit sandwiches, and participating in craft times. Teens also requested a fancy ramen night as they had this past spring, and a new favorite, making *mangonadas*, provided a refreshing summer treat. Teens also have use of the Teen Library studio, gaming systems, and lab equipment after cooking and crafting times. Rosalie Barrera (Librarian I, Teen Library @ Central): During the reporting period, the Teen Library at Central welcomed summer teen intern, Stormy, from the Family Service Association (FSA) Summer Internship Program. The FSA summer internship program provides paid, part-time internships for local middle and high school students to build career opportunities and goals. Rosalie is the direct supervisor to Stormy who will be working her internship at the Teen Library from June 27-August 5. Stormy will provide support and opportunities for teens to engage in activities such as cooking demonstrations and craft activities. Stormy will also be given the opportunity to plan and lead a program of her choice during her internship. Rosalie continues to interact and engage with teens as they visit and explore the Teen Library.

**Teen Pride** – The Teen Library @ Central hosted a Teen Pride Party on Saturday, June 18 to celebrate teens of all identities during Pride Month. Teens made crowns using a variety of materials; watched short films and music videos featuring LGBTQ+ characters, artists, and directors; learned how to make rainbow grilled cheese sandwiches; and listened to music by LGBTQ+ artists. Throughout the event, teens engaged in meaningful conversations with their peers about Pride Month, identities, Pride flags, and other relevant topics. The event was facilitated by the Teen Pride workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and consisting of Chris Castillo (Assistant Manager / Teen Services Librarian, Brook Hollow), Dacari Lambert (Teen Services Librarian, Schaefer), and Shannan Prukop (Assistant Manager / Teen Services Librarian, Carver).

# REFERENCE

Julia Selwyn, David Gallin-Parisi, Melissa Gomez and Jordan Torres completed their systemwide training in June for the LibAnswers and Libchat rollout. The virtual reference system allows the San Antonio Public Library to expand this vital customer service to all locations. Staff that were unable to attend the May and June classes have access to the training videos and supplemental materials via LibGuides.

On June 2nd, Librarians Sara De La Rosa, Patricia Perez and Library Assistant Marcel Alvarez presented classes in both English and Spanish titled Chromebook Overview. Participants learned the basics about using a Chromebook.

On June 9th, Pannaga Prasad and Brooke Mjolsness offered a virtual session entitled OptimizeU: Yoga and Lifestyle Medicine. The session was presented by Maggie Grueskin, Ayurvedic Yoga Specialist, Chopra Center Perfect Health Certified Instructor and expert panelist Dr. Ajeya Joshi and Dr. Hetal Nayak.

On June 16th, Central Reference hosted Sarah Donaldson, an attorney from Texas Rio Grande Legal Aid (TLRA) for an hour and a half in Central's Lobby. Patrons asked questions and were given TRLA information, worker, and eviction resources.

On Friday June 17th, Central and Branch staff participated in the Baptist Child and Family Services Pride Resource fair in celebration of Gay Pride Month and aimed at clients ages 18-24. Staff members connected with new patrons, spoke about the Library's resources in front of the group and participated in Resource Fair activities such as Pride Bingo and a Poetry workshop led by local poet and singer Chibbi Orduña.

On June 21st, Stacey Martinez and Melissa Gomez partnered with San Antonio Pride to present and discuss resources available to the Trans and Non-Binary community. Emphasis was on the importance of mental health and was created to ensure the San Antonio Trans community has equal access to care, services, and a space where they can be themselves.





On June 24th, Pannaga Prasad and Brooke Mjolsness offered a virtual session entitled Beginner's Chair Yoga Class. The session was presented by a Professional Yoga Instructor from the Idoyogasa organization.

On June 25th, Pannaga Prasad and Diana Starrett offered a virtual session entitled How to maintain healthy skin through the application of skin care products and achieve better skin results: women and men. The session was presented by a professional, independent skincare and beauty consultant from May Kay and Rodan+Fields.

## **LATINO COLLECTION & RESOURCE CENTER**

The Latino Collection and Resource Center developed a new partnership with the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM) San Antonio. The inaugural program to result from this collaboration was presented to the public on June 28. The workshop, "Descarga Cultura," was presented in Spanish and covered UNAM's cultural podcast "Descarga Cultura" and its corresponding resources. The planning of the event, with LCRC Manager Emily Flores and UNAM San Antonio Director Paula de Gortari, involved staff in both San Antonio and Mexico City. The video, available on Facebook, has been viewed nearly 2,000 times.

Also during the month of June, Blue Star Contemporary MOSAIC Program Coordinator Aminah Parham installed a new exhibit of student work in the LCRC Gallery. The MOSAIC Student Artist Program is an after-school opportunity open to area high schoolers that allows students to learn about the business administration side of art while developing their artistic skills.

## **TEXANA/ GENEALOGY**

Librarian Sylvia Reyna presented the class “Preserving Your Family Documents” at Igo library on June 7. She explained some of the ways to handle, store and even repair important family papers and photographs so as to best preserve them for future generations.

In celebration of Juneteenth, Librarian Matt De Waelsche arranged for Mr. Allee Wallace, the official photographer of the San Antonio Juneteenth Coalition, to share his experiences of documenting San Antonio’s Juneteenth and Martin Luther King Jr. parades. The events took place at three branch locations, which included the Pan American Library on June 11, the Molly Pruitt Library at Roosevelt High School on June 12 and the Carver Library on June 14. The program at the Pruitt Library also featured music with children's interpretive dancers.

Ms. Reyna also participated in Carver Library’s Juneteenth Celebration on June 18 by leading an African American Genealogy program. She discussed the different strategies that could be employed for researching African American families and the types of resources available through the San Antonio Public Library.

On June 18 and 25, Ms. Reyna facilitated a two-part writing workshop at Collins Garden Library, led by Eduardo Garza, entitled “Healing through Writing.” Mr. Garza showed how the written word can be used in a therapeutic way to repair one's psyche and heal emotionally.

Librarian Deborah Countess led a virtual beginning genealogy class on June 21 that went over the first steps to take when researching your family's history. Ms. Countess also went over how to access and begin using the library database *Ancestry Library Edition* and offered tips on the best ways to navigate this vast genealogical website.

Special Collections Manager Heather Ferguson was invited by the Conopus Club of San Antonio to be the guest speaker at their weekly meeting on Friday, June 24. The luncheon was held at the San Antonio Country Club with 90 members in attendance. Ms. Ferguson’s presentation discussed the Library’s Texana/Genealogy Department and highlighted unique special collections from the vault. She also shared details about the City’s 2017-2022 Bond renovations that are planned for the Texana Resource Center.

On June 28 Librarian Andy Crews led a virtual presentation about the Fold3 database resource, which focuses primarily on military records. Mr. Crews demonstrated examples of records that can be located for ancestors with military service. He also presented a recently developed class entitled “What’s New in the 1950 Census” to the Elderberries group at the Igo Library on June 29.

Library Assistant Elissa Vura along with Librarian Tim Johnson (Igo Library) and Library Assistant Mary Elizabeth Fernandez (Central – Children's) hosted the Escape the Earth podcast—a monthly sci-fi and fantasy book discussion. The June episode, featured *Black Sun* by Rebecca Roanhorse and has received 175 plays to date, making it the most listened-to episode of the podcast so far. Teens continued to improve the Discord user experience and suggest server channels for their wide interests. During in-person weekly Teen Time at BHL, teens drove the decision making and summer programming activities. Teens made new and stronger connections with peers beyond their schools. Teens are interested in building their leadership skills and steering Teen Time decisions. Teens submitted requests for free 3d prints, custom buttons, and magnets, and picked them up from the branch.

Saturday, June 18, Teen Pride Committee members Castillo and Matthew Loaiza, Teen Services Librarian II, Central, facilitated a Teen Pride Celebration at the Central Library. Teens created crowns, cooked rainbow grilled cheese sandwiches, and enjoyed taking photos with Teen Services' photo booth. Rainbow Films, shorts, and music videos played while teens made new social connections. Teens from the 210teenlibrary Discord server met in person for the first time. Saturday, June 25, Castillo and Loaiza facilitated off-site library services at the "Pride Bigger Than Texas" Festival and Parade. Pride San Antonio coordinated the gathering of the equality-minded San Antonio metropolitan community to celebrate and promote hope and awareness of equality and diversity through a cavalcade of events designed to recognize, accept, and celebrate the differences and contributions of the LGBTQIA community. Teen Services hosted a San Antonio Public Library festival booth with the VROOM! Van during the "Pride Bigger Than Texas Festival" at Crockett Park. Attendees were able to participate in a DIY glitter glam-up activity using aloe vera to help combat the sunny day. Attendees also spun a wheel to receive some library swag, including Pride-inspired buttons @210teenlibrary pencils, stickers, sunglasses, and free books. That evening, marchers including library staff, teen volunteers, family, and

friends represented the San Antonio Public Library in the “Pride Bigger Than Texas” Parade. The group marched along the parade route with Teen Services’ VROOM! Van.

In the area of professional development, Castillo was selected as one of 50 business individuals for the San Antonio Hispanic Chamber of Commerce’s 2022 Alexander Briseño Leadership Development Program (ABLDP). Castillo serves on the Arts & Culture Action Team. Participants are immersed in educational sessions that address topics that spark an interest in becoming a change agent in San Antonio. ## CARVER

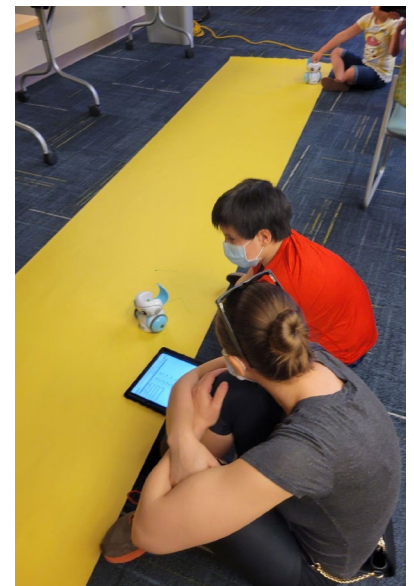

On June 7<sup>th</sup>, Ms. Ramirez hosted an in-person Coding with Robots activity in the Carver branch meeting room. Children at this event used Artie Robot to code various drawings using Blockly.

On June 9<sup>th</sup>, Ms. Ramirez hosted an in-person daycare event with the Learning with Grace center. Children in this program listened to two stories, then created their own butterflies using recycled materials. Any left-over craft activities were packaged as Take-and-Make craft activities for children with the assistance of Ms. Elvia Rodriguez. On June 15<sup>th</sup> and June 22<sup>nd</sup>, Ms. Ramirez sang songs and hosted one Toddler Time online program at 10:00 a.m. On June 23<sup>rd</sup> Tambo Rhythms visited the Carver library to play drums with 23 children, 20 adults, and 2 teens.

Ms. Ramirez also has created large table-size coloring sheets for children to color while visiting the library and she has also completed a new design for the children’s display case, which was previously unused. Throughout the month, Ms. Ramirez and the entire Carver staff continued to promote the Children’s Summer Reading Program at the Carver branch library.

Teen Librarian Shannan Prukop, along with the other members of the Teen Pride workgroup, helped plan and run the Teen Pride Party at the Central Library on June 18<sup>th</sup>, where teens made crowns and rainbow grilled cheese sandwiches, watched queer music videos, and took selfies. Through this event, queer teens were able to meet their peers and feel supported by the community. Mx. Prukop continued to make



the Teen Room at Carver a space welcoming to teens, including setting out drawing supplies and setting up a shelf with board games available to play, as well as covering the tables with paper for teens to draw and write on. They continued running the weekly Dungeons & Dragons (D&D) and Sunday Funday programs on the 210teenlibrary Discord server, with teens often taking the initiative to create their own games to run during D&D or choosing games to run during Sunday Funday, showing leadership and decision making skills.

Photographer Allee Wallace visited on Tuesday, June 14<sup>th</sup> to launch Juneteenth Week at Carver Branch. Mr. Wallace, a protégé of renowned photographer Ansel Adams, hosted a conversation that recalled his long career documenting Juneteenth celebrations in the city through photography.

On Saturday, June 18, the branch followed up Mr. Wallace's presentation with its day-long celebration of Juneteenth. Events kicked off at 10 a.m. with breakfast and the opening of the *Nias and Beverly Harris Africana Collection*, curated by Branch Manager D.L. Grant. The collection featured nearly a hundred artifacts and sculpture pieces from travels the Harrises made to Africa over a 30-year period. The branch staff was fortunate to be able to bring such an exhibit to the community that also included antebellum relics that conveyed the experiences of African Americans during their enslavement. Historian Jerelyne Castleberry Williams, author of *The Brackenridge Colored School* also shared pieces of her own collection, which featured images from San Antonio's early celebrations of Juneteenth, some dating back to the late 1890s and early 1900s. But there was, even more, to see as the African American Quilt Circle of San Antonio (AAQCSA) offered an exhibition dedicated to the tradition of African American quilting.

At 11 a.m., visitors were ushered into the Prudence Curry Meeting Room for a formal welcome, where San Antonio author Antoinette V. Franklin, shared her original poem, *Forgotten*, honoring the memory of enslaved African Americans in San Antonio and Texas history.

Having secured permission from the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, the branch then screened the historical documentary, *Just a Ferry Ride to Freedom*, which focuses on the plight of enslaved African Americans in Texas who sought freedom across the Rio Grande in Mexico. The documentary also sheds light on the little-known alternative route of the Underground Railroad, the one that led South to Mexico as opposed to the more popularized route to Canada.

Following the screening, local journalist Denise McVea moderated a rousing panel discussion of topics generated. Panelists Dr. Charles Gentry, UTSA lecturer, and writer/professor Mario M. Salas also fielded questions from the audience. The final event of the day was a presentation on African American genealogy by archivist/librarian Sylvia Reyna of SAPL's Texana Genealogy Department.

## CODY

Children's Librarian Kristin Yourdon has brought programming for our youngest patrons to the great outdoors! The weekly Family Story Time, held in the parking lot before the library opens on Monday mornings, featured hats, dinosaurs, and vehicle themes. After each Story Time children had the chance to pop some bubbles and draw with sidewalk chalk. On June 7th Yourdon held a special Yoga Story Time at Hardberger Park. Yourdon told a story of a hike through the park which incorporated many yoga poses.

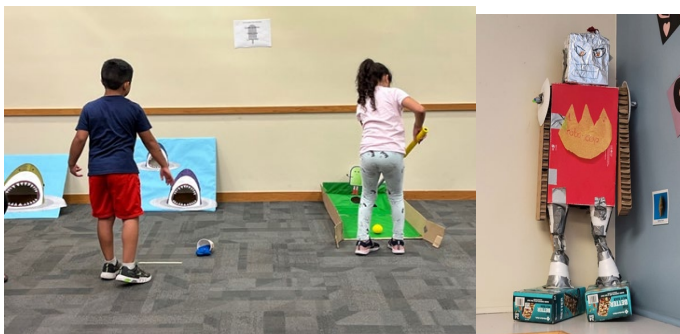




Lego Club and Art Club alternate Fridays this summer. During each Lego Club program, children build from a mystery bag of Legos or learn a new art technique. Lego creations were put on display after each program. In Art Club, children created tissue paper art and learned to create their own crayon resist watercolor paintings.



Special programs for children were a weekly event. On June 2nd school-age children gathered to celebrate the beginning of summer and played mini golf, enjoyed a shark-themed corn hole game, made their own coffee filter artwork, and enjoyed a paleta each! On June 9th the branch hosted a STEM Challenge Olympics. Cody continues to host two book clubs and the ESL class from neighboring Westfall Library, in addition to the five regular book clubs, the film club, and the Adante Senior Living book club. Selections for all clubs are handled by Library Assistant extraordinaire Luanne Bloom. Library Assistant Haly LeFlore facilitates the weekly Fiber Club on Monday nights.

On June 10, Adult Services Librarian Michael Dunbar-Rodney worked with Brooke Mjolsness and Victoria Villalobos to organize an online Pride Trivia Night, in partnership with Pride Center San Antonio. On June 18, Dunbar-Rodney, along with Josh Yurcheshen, hosted the weekly Queer Crafternoon program online; the listening choice for the week was The Silt Verses, a fantasy-horror podcast.

During Pride Month, the glass display cabinet featured items from the University of Texas at San Antonio's LGBTQIA+ archival collection, selected and arranged by Melissa Goelke, LGBTQIA+ Scholar and Assistant Archivist. The display consisted of artifacts and photos documenting San Antonio's queer past.

On June 25th, Dunbar-Rodney represented SAPL at the San Antonio Pride Bigger Than Texas festival in Crockett Park. The SAPL table offered promotional items, program fliers, and resources such as the Trans Community Resource Zine and MySAPL app bookmarks to over 300 people. Several of the visitors took advantage of the opportunity to register for temporary online library cards in order to access our digital collections.

## COLLINS GARDEN



The Collins Garden Library hosted two Metro Health flu and COVID-19 vaccine Pop-Up Clinics on June 3 and June 24. The June 24<sup>th</sup> clinic saw children ages 5 and under receive their COVID-19 vaccines. Staff at the clinic were very happy to report that they received some requests for Back to School vaccines.

June is National PTSD month and the branch hosted *Healing through writing*. Organized by the Texana department, Jazz Poet of San Antonio founding member Eduardo C. Garza led a two-part session - June 18 and 29 - demonstrating how to use writing as a tool for healing and wellness.

**Teens:**

## **FOREST HILLS**

#### **Community Center**

This has been a great opportunity to reach out to families who were not aware of the library services. The attendees of the summer camp have been enthusiastic about the displays and ask to check things out when they are picked up for the day.

#### **Children's**

Ms. Menchaca was pleased to help Igo Library host their Story Time on Thursday morning. Children had a lot of fun singing and listening to stories. She also helped with the online Yoga Story Time where the children worked on a scavenger hunt while incorporating movements as well as online Lego Time where the participants always make unique creations. She was also able to participate in online Story Time and online baby time where the librarians played songs, and rhymes and taught caregivers about early literacy.

Ms. Menchaca hosted an Outdoor Story Time at Gilbert Garza Park and Jane Dubbel Park. Little Read Wagon helped out with toys and creative opportunities for kids. Ms. Menchaca read, sang, and played with the children who attended and the Gilbert Garza Community Center hosted Mr. Pitts. He entertained children with tricks and magic; families had a lot of fun.

## Teens

The summer reading t-shirts have been a big hit with the teens at the community center. Those who attend the summer day camp frequently show up wearing their t-shirt, they have also been checking out more YA books as well as requesting more books to be sent to the center so they can pick them up after camp. The camp's attendees have a summer book club with books provided by the San Antonio Public Library, this month they read "Lupe Wong Won't Dance," and the park's staff incorporated activities related to the book each week.

# GREAT NORTHWEST

Great Northwest Library's Stephanie Vasquez hosted a craft-style program for adults in the month of June; the Library Bee quilting group for adults who meet once a month and work on quilting projects and learn new skills. Jenn Tristan led a group in a Cut and Glue project making collages out of old magazines and scrap paper.

In June, Library assistant Amber Hughes facilitated 4 weekly in-person Teen Time programs. Teens in the community were provided the opportunity to create and plan summer programming. Teens planned several craft projects and played video games with their peers.

This month the tweens program attendees were busy creating their own patents and learned the difference between an invention and an innovation. ## Children's Service

Children's Librarian Carrie Vance continues to contribute to the online programs of Baby and Toddler Time Online – Live and the Proud to Be Me: Rainbow Families. Participants appreciate having the flexibility that the virtual format provides.

Story Time in the Park has proven to be very popular, with attendance averaging over 100 people in June. Ms. Vance had a lot of help with planning, preparation, and after activities from Igo's newest employee, temporary Library Services Specialist Mikala Thomas, along with assistance in presenting from Children's Librarians Ana Menchaca (Forest Hills) and Amanda Neace (Brook Hollow). Families are very excited to see the return of weekly programs with favorite songs and new books. The after activities are also hugely popular and have included bubbles, sidewalk chalk, streamer wands, kites, and just spending time on the playground with friends both old and new.

On June 15, the branch hosted Process Art at Igo. Ms. Vance and Ms. Thomas basically filled 8 tables with basic craft supplies and recycled materials like toilet paper tubes and let the children take whatever they wanted for their creations. 44 children showed the power of their imaginations and creativity with paper plate cities, paper bag puppets, toilet paper tube robots and monsters, and a planet made from pom-poms.

As part of Summer with SAPL, TamboRhythms visited the branch on June 22. Mr. Jorge Ochoa got 30 children and their grownups drumming up a storm. The children always enjoy the part where Mr. Ochoa allows them to direct the drumming with different signals.

On June 11 Texana/Genealogy's Matt Dewaelsche presented a "Beginning Genealogy" class at Johnston. On June 22 Johnston hosted one of Metro Health's first popup vaccine clinics that included COVID vaccines for children ages 6 months and up. The clinic was successful and included camera crews from Spectrum News and KENS 5 reporting on the clinic.

Branch Manager Cristine Mitchamore represented the library at a Pride Resource Fair sponsored by BCFS on June 17. Ms. Mitchamore answered Reader's Advisory questions for patrons through the San Antonio Public

Library's (SAPL's) LibPicks virtual service, offering suggestions for future reading (or watching) based on the patron's interests.

Children's Librarian Tiffany Durham kicked off summer by helping patrons decorate the library windows with colorful rainbows and then switched mid-month to a create-your-own pineapple craft. Librarians Robin Alcorta and Jasmin Salinas, along with Circulation Attendant Walden Booker, attended the PRIDE festival and parade. Librarian Salinas took a shift telling the community about the library and making rainbow wands for them to enjoy.

June saw the kickoff of Summer with SAPL at Landa. Branch staff welcomed the community with a Collaborative Art program. Families were provided supplies to design a paleta. The paletas were then added to the walls in the children's area for decoration.

As part of Summer with SAPL, Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas presented an outdoor Yoga Movement Story Time with Children's Librarian Shannon Seglin. Several young toddlers worked on balance and large motor development through songs and rhymes.

The third event of the summer was Process Art presented by Librarian Salinas. Multiple tables of art supplies and recycled materials were placed around the grounds and terrace. Families enjoyed creating together in nature! More than 100 people joined Librarian Salinas for this event!

In mid-June, Librarian Salinas hosted an in-person Robot Exploration Afternoon. Families were encouraged to experiment with the Artie 3000s, Sphero minis, and Cubelets purchased by Children's Services.

Throughout June, two school groups visited Landa. Alamo Heights Elementary School brought over their soon-to-be second and third graders. They enjoyed a tour of the library by Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas, a Story Time with Igo Branch's Children's Librarian Carrie Vance, and free time to make kites. Librarian Salinas received multiple cards and banners from the school saying thank you for a great visit and for getting to see the bathtub! All but two of the eight attendees received the book very well, with one exception still finding the pick enjoyable, and the other being a new member and not having read the book. Everyone had interesting perceptions of immigrants, their lives, and their experiences, and were generally astounded by the level of hardship the author experienced. They had no idea it could be that bad! Many personal anecdotes were shared regarding how immigration has affected them and their friends and family, we had fantastic and deep discussions about race and discrimination.

As part of the Summer with SAPL events, Jane McDaniel (who happens to be a Landa Library user) told traditional Irish stories. Jane is a member of the San Antonio Storytellers, an organization of storytellers and story lovers in the Central and South Texas area. The goal of the organization is to reintroduce the art of oral storytelling to the community at large. The audience loved the program so much, they had to be asked to leave after the Branch closed!

As of this writing, 360 children have signed up for the summer reading program at Maverick. The children have been excited to receive books when they register. Our bulletin board on our window is crowded with lots of colorful book shapes with registrant’s names on them. Children’s Librarian, Amy Roberts, had 10 programs in June with a total of 587 attendees! She was thrilled that indoor programming was back for ages 5-12 specifically. Programs included Lego Time, Crafty Kids, and a wonderful performance by Happy Tails on June 22. Ms. Anita from Happy Tails brought animals like a porcupine, python, macaw and an alpaca!

Ms. Roberts read “Inside Cat” by Brian Wenzel for Dial-A-Story on June 28. She curated another Story Time on June 20, using the book “I Like Trains” by Daisy Hirst, for the Tiny Tots website. In addition, Ms. Roberts attended a few trainings during the reporting period. She attended Lib Chat Training on June 2, Climate Training on June 7, Active Shooter Threat Training on June 7 and PIC (Person in Charge) cell phone training on June 30.

Library Assistant Mary Lou Bleichwehl, assisted by Library Aide Taylur Loera, facilitated Teen Time on Tuesday evenings. In June, Teens requested and watched Spiderman II and engaged in a variety of table top games. On June 1st, the McCreless Branch hosted the Library Director, the Mayor, and many special guests for the Summer Reading kick-off where they viewed examples of programming and activities available for patrons during the summer. On June 18<sup>th</sup>, a community input meeting took place at the branch to rename the McCreless meeting room in honor of community leader Elizabeth Cornelia Gaenslen Trainor. On June 28<sup>th</sup>, the branch hosted the San Antonio Metro Health Pop Up vaccine clinic, which provides Flu, COVID, and school-required vaccines to the local community.



Children’s Librarian Nicole San Martin and Library Services Specialist Elvia Rodriguez also kicked off the summer with outreach events to La Misi3n Childcare and Japhet Academy to provide information about the Mayor’s Summer Library Club and to share stories and songs with the children at each location. At the branch, several programs were hosted for children including LEGO Club on Mondays, Tween Time on

Besides her regular duties, Ms. DeBow worked with the McCreless Friends during their Saturday workday to re-organize donations and conducted a library tour for members of Seton House, who were excited to receive library cards and hear about all the services SAPL has to offer.



Library Assistant Joseph Gonzales began a monthly Movie Night series. The first movie featured was *Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom* with 14 patrons in attendance. As part of the Pop Culture Committee, he continues to contribute with new ideas during its monthly meetings. Mr. Gonzales is always ready to volunteer and help fellow staff at other branches when necessary.

The McCreless Learn Center launched its first multi-level English Class on June 4<sup>th</sup>, and students have responded enthusiastically, both to the interactive class content, and to Learn educator Lodie Mueller’s distinctive philosophy and methodology. Participants in this Saturday-morning class have ranged from a 75-year-old woman who had never attended an English class in her life, to a woman with a Bachelor’s degree who wants to improve her grammar and pronunciation. One woman shared, “I liked meeting new people, and I liked that this is the first time I have felt comfortable speaking English in front of other people.” Lodie loves serving the McCreless community through this class as well as through regular Learn services during the 1:00-6:00 pm walk-in hours.

## MEMORIAL

New beginning for Memorial. Library on the Go was placed in storage and staff is now providing interim services from the Marionist Archives on the campus of St. Mary’s University. The 2 Librarians in charge are Adult Services Librarian Freddy Hudson and Children’s Librarian Christine Deffendall. Patrons can call staff inside the building and once their library card is verified their hold items will be brought outside for patrons to pick up. This is basically the same set up operation that was used during the LOTG tenure. No fiscal transactions are available. No printing nor copying operations are available either.

The Book Drop remained on the Memorial campus and is emptied twice daily by either LICs.

Viewing it from the exterior the new front lobby is almost complete. Counters and cabinets in staff work areas are presently being installed. The new Circ area is beginning to take shape and will look really nice when the work is completed.

Children’s Librarian Christine Deffendall made three contributions to the library’s digital programming efforts during the month of June. A curated Story Time, published June 6, was based on the book *Oona*,

written by Kelly DiPucchio and illustrated by Raissa Figueroa. Cindy also welcomed a group from the Seton Home which provides housing to teen moms. Cindy shared with them information on library resources. All teen moms were able to get a library card during the visit.

## PAN AMERICAN

On June 3<sup>rd</sup>, the branch hosted the San Antonio Metro Health Mobile Clinic. Free COVID-19 Immunizations and Boosters shots were offered, free of charge. Many visitors thanked staff for hosting the mobile clinic. Most comments referred to how convenient and hassle free it was for them to use.

The branch hosted Meditation Classes on all Saturday's during June. The classes continue to get a good attendance. Due to some other obligations for the class facilitator, the Meditation classes will take July and August off. Meditation Classes will resume in September.

On June 11<sup>th</sup>, the branch hosted a Juneteenth Presentation by Mr. Allee Wallace. Mr. Wallace is the official photographer of the San Antonio Juneteenth Coalition. He spoke about his artwork, career and experiences chronicling African American life on San Antonio's east side. He showcased many of the photographs that he has taken throughout his career, truly amazing artwork.



Adult Services Librarian, Adrian Leal, hosted two "Puzzle Times" during the month of June. "Puzzle Time" is an Adult Program that offers participants the opportunity to spend some time putting their very own puzzle together. Puzzles are provided free of charge and participants can keep the puzzle they put together.

During the month of June, Teen Services Librarian Gladys Nunez hosted different teen activities every Monday. Ms. Nunez participated in outreach activities at Harlandale High School on June 2nd. Attached are some pictures of the different activities done during Teen Time



During Outreach, the Harlandale High School librarian requested an information table during two lunch periods to let students know about SAPL and what was going on for teens for the summer and signing them up for library cards. Ms Nunez gave away some free pencils and passed out flyers for Teen Time. She also, took a few of the free teen summer t-shirts and buttons so the first wave of students got a t-shirt and/or button.

Children's librarian Jacqueline Gonzales completed 1 outreach for the month of June at La Petite Academy on Wurzbach. She read, sang songs, and told stories to 22 children and 2 adults. She read *Pete the Cat Crayons Rock!* By Kimberly and James Dean. Children learned simple sign language to sing along with a hello and goodbye song, as well as received information about the Summer Reading Program at Pan American Library.

In addition, Mrs. Gonzales also held Tween Time at the branch, where a total of 3 tweens attended. For the program, they learned about peyote stitching and how to create a flower pattern bracelet and/or how to take a pattern and bead with it.

Process Art was another program that was held for children. There were 2 children and 1 adult that attended. Art supplies of all kinds were placed on a long table, and attendees were challenged to start with only 2 craft supplies to create something. As a given, they were provided scissors and glue at their table to help, but the challenge made for a fun time. As the program progressed, challenges were thrown at them, and they had to pick another craft supply for their neighbor, and then the children's librarian had to pick a supply for them.

Growing Up Wild was a Summer Reading program brought to the Pan American by Mrs. Gonzales. It was presented by Parks and Recreation and took place outside on the porch. A total of 6 kids and 6 adults attended. Children got to hear a story, learn about fish, and do a craft.

Sue Kuentz Storyteller was also asked to be a guest performer at the branch as part of the Summer Reading lineup. She told amazing stories, sang, and got the kids excited about storytelling. A total of 6 kids and 5 adults attended.

Mrs. Gonzales, Children's librarian participated in Toddler Time ONLINE for the SAPL system, where children's librarians from all over SAPL get together to put on an online program. She acted as host and helped present songs for the month of June. Some songs she sang were *Peanut Butter and Jelly* and *Alice the Camel*.

Library Assistant Stephanie Perez hosted the Embroidery Program. This program has two meetings a month. One Zoom meeting and one in-person. Miss Perez provides resources for learning about embroidery and brings together others that also enjoy needlecrafts. The dates for the program were June 13<sup>th</sup> and June 27<sup>th</sup>. The purpose is to bring people together and encourage people's creativity. This program is for adults only.

Another very successful program hosted by Ms. Perez is the Plant Swap Program. The event was to bring people together to trade plants and plant cuttings. Patrons turned in their for-trade items to Ms. Perez to redeem tickets. Then they used the tickets to pick from the plants that others have for trade. The event was on June 10<sup>th</sup>. This was an adult-only event.

Ms. Perez has also been working as part of the Esports Committee. During the month of June, she has been building a LibGuide to host an online contest for patrons that play Animal Crossing: New Horizons. Patrons will be able to submit information and show off their virtual creations to others. The 2 persons with the most votes will win prizes that are within the game itself.

## PARMAN

Flamingos have taken over the Parman Branch Library! To celebrate Summer with SAPL, Children's Librarians, Teague and Lisa decorated the windows with the larger-than-life pink birds. With the help of entire staff, Parman branch was able to offer every registrant of the Summer Reading Program the chance to create their own flamingo to display in the library. Over 1400 children signed up in June and the tops of Parman shelves hold the largest flock ever seen in a library!



Parman entertained its young patrons with many activities and performers throughout the month of June. Snakes, rats, and birds visited Parman with their handler Tom Kinsey, who shared his knowledge about Texas wildlife with attending families. John's Got Magic wowed the audience with mystifying tricks during his high-energy performance. Kids and grown-ups alike thoroughly enjoyed playing in foam when Big Bubbles stopped by. 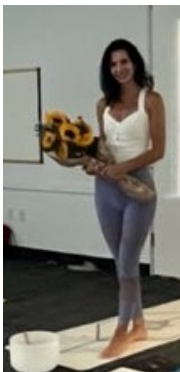

*Music Monday* carried over into the Summer and has maintained a strong following for those teens wishing to explore varying musical interests. The *Tuesday Teen Time* program allowed teens to express their creativity. The Teen Services staff made a foray onto the Roosevelt High School campus and connected with students attending Summer School, letting them know about programs and events happening at Pruitt and taking suggestions about what would interest teens in a summer library setting.

Teen Services Librarian Sheri Watkins accompanied Children's Services Librarian Lucy Cisneros on an outreach event at Montgomery Elementary where all SAPL and Pruitt services were promoted. Additionally, Pruitt Adult Services and Teen Services worked together for the successful production of *"Celebrating Juneteenth: A Tribute In Praise and Pictures."* This family-friendly event featured Allee Wallace, the Official Juneteenth Coalition Photographer, along with the Hope Fellowship Church Praise Dancers. During June, 13 children's programs took place at Schaefer. Blake the Magician performed magic for about 150 kids and adults on June 7. Children's Librarian Leslie Elsasser started Outdoor Story Time on June 1 on the playground. This program takes place each Wednesday. The kids hear stories, sing and have play time with bubbles and chalk or have other play activities like ice chalk. 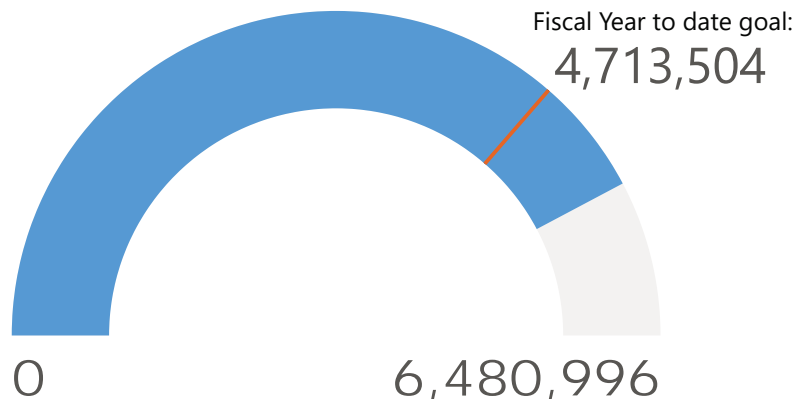

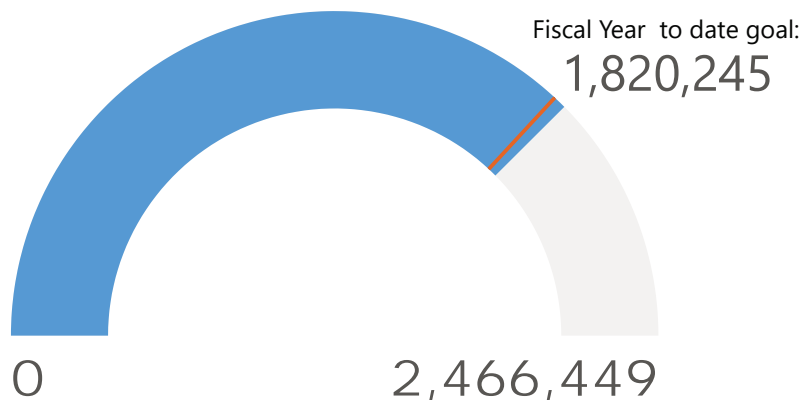


### FY 2022 to date Items Borrowed

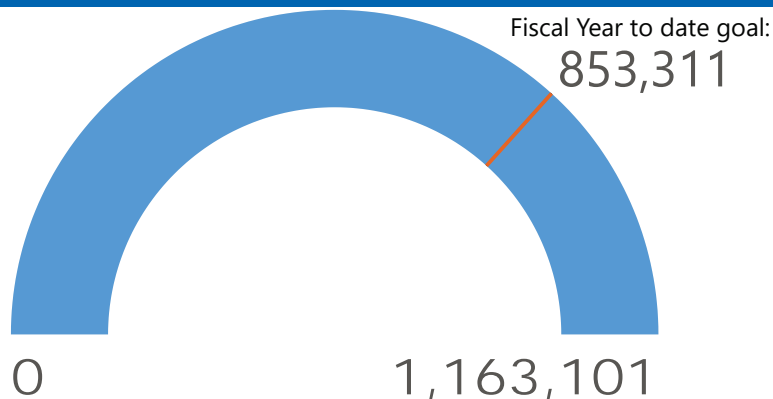

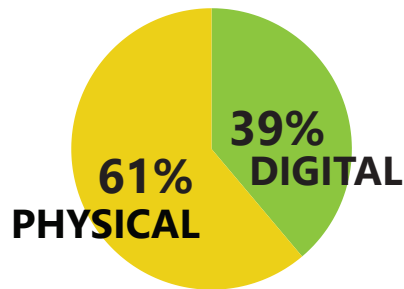

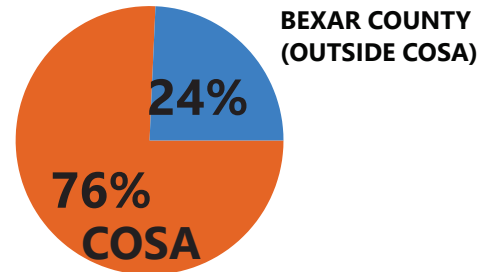

## Circulation - Fiscal Year to Date - June 2022



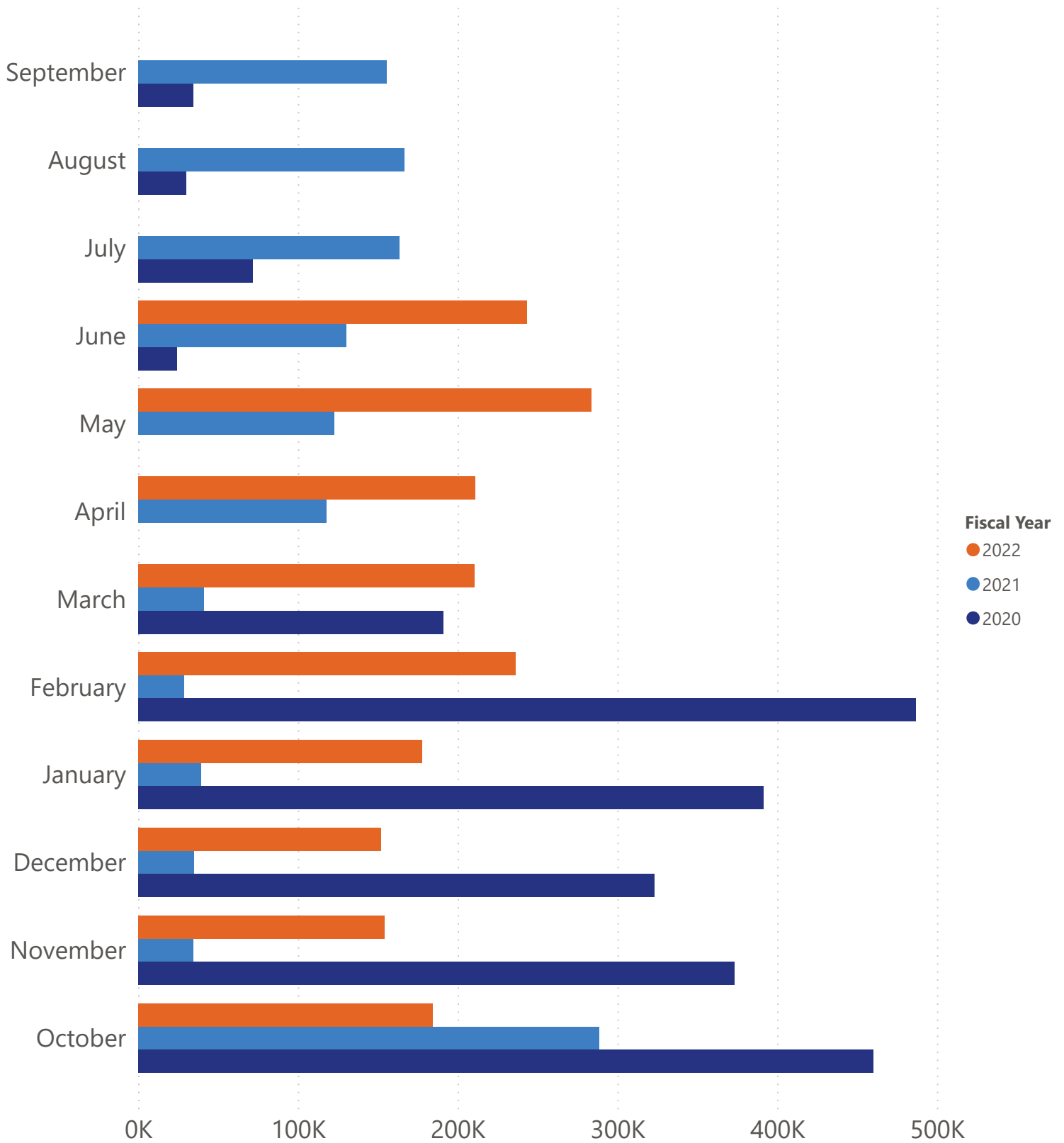

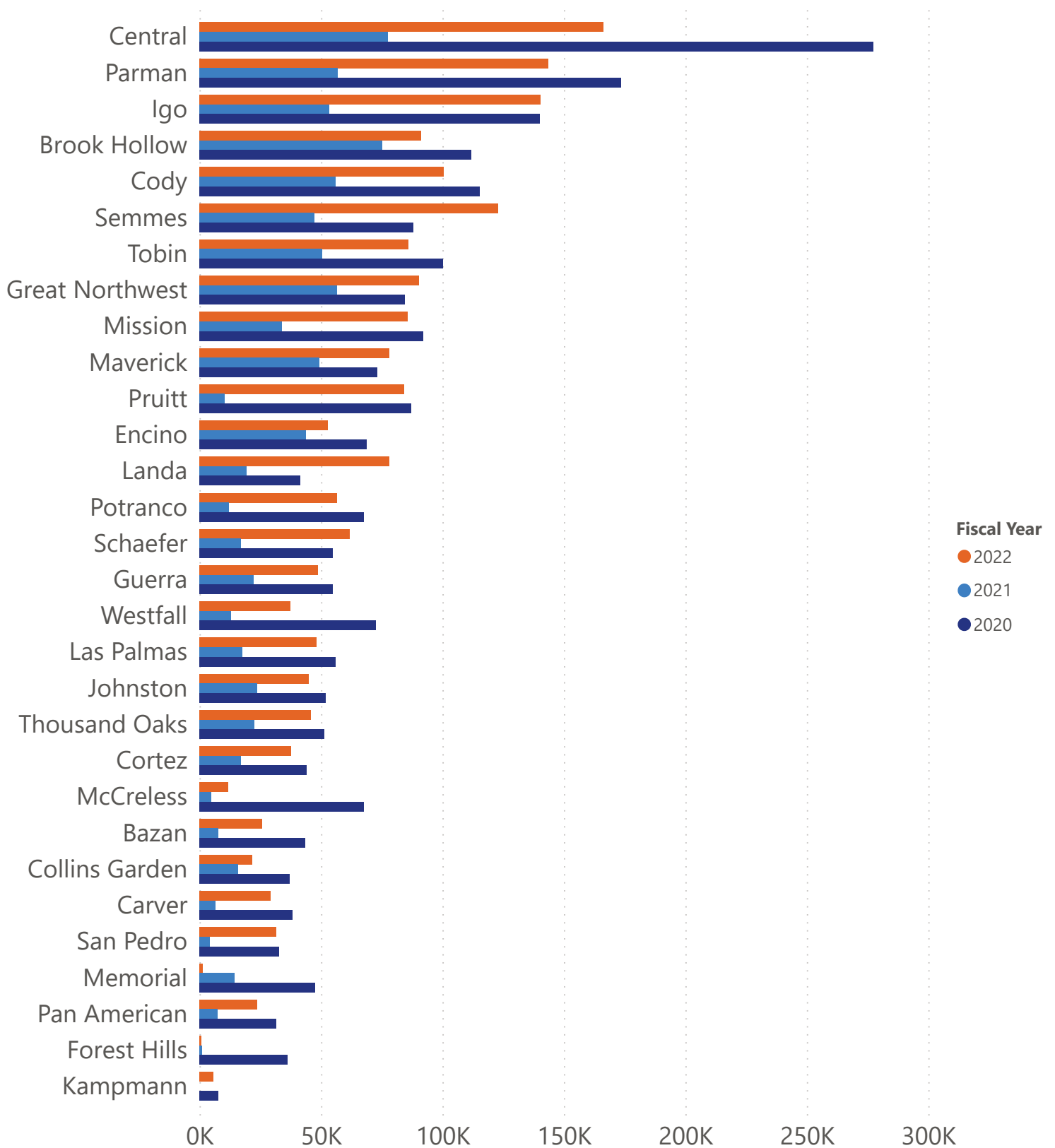

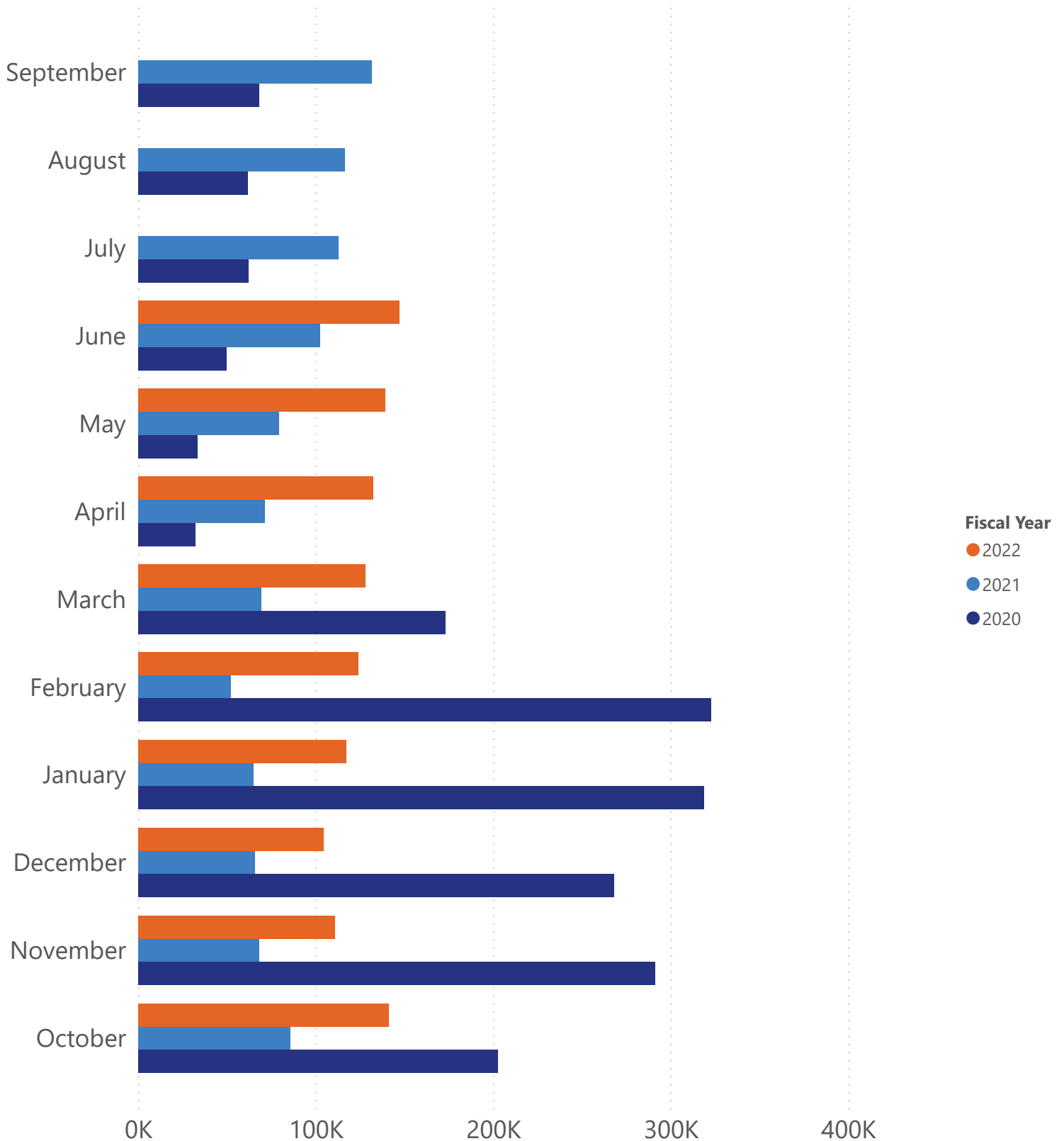
