San Antonio Public Library Director's Report October 2021

San Antonio Public Library (SAPL) and District 9 Council Member John Courage announced the groundbreaking of the new ADA accessible playground and adult exercise area at the Encino Branch Library on Friday, October 29.

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DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar met with the Public Library Association as Chair of the 2022 Nominating Committee to begin to process for the slate for the PLA 2022 Officer Elections.

Mr. Salazar met with new District 6 Library Trustee Fernanda Cardenas to provide a New Trustee Orientation on October 20. He met with new District 5 Library Trustee N. Jeremy Landin to provide a New Trustee Orientation on October 22.

Ramiro S. Salazar participated in the Executive Board Meeting of the San Antonio Public Library Foundation on October 20.

On October 23, the San Antonio Public Library Foundation held its annual Catrina Ball, a fundraiser for the Library and the Foundation. Mr. Salazar served as El Catrin for the event. The event was a success.

The groundbreaking ceremony for the playground for the Encino Branch Library took place on November 22. Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar and District 9 Councilmember John Courage delivered remarks as part of the ceremony.

Graphics

The Graphics Team created publicity materials for a variety of programs and events during this reporting period, including graphics for Dia de Muertos, Bond project updates, the iPad lending program at senior centers, displays for Texana at the San Antonio Public Library Foundation's Catrina Ball, and updated branch hours signage, as well as social media and other promotion for branch events.

DIGITAL SERVICES

On October 12, Digital Services Coordinator Adam Spana met with Children's Services Coordinator Cresencia Huff to discuss the Beanstack reading challenge platform as a possible candidate to consider for use in future summer reading programs.

Digital Library Services Analyst Tricia Masterson led a meeting between Digital Services and Marketing on October 13 to plan a marketing campaign for the online print portal.

On October 14, Mr. Spana presented an update on the Change Management call regarding the successful launch of the library's updated app.

On October 14, Mr. Spana and Digital Library Services Supervisor Rolf Laun spoke with Librarian II (Teen Services) Matthew Loaiza as well as Verónica Díaz and Maria Miers members of the Arts & Culture Action Team, about possible options for the Library to collaborate on issuing "museum passes" to patrons.

On October 14, Mr. Spana, Community and Public Relations Manager Scott Williams and Library Services Administrator Ron Suszek met with Alyx Park, Senior Partnership Development Lead for BiblioCommons, to discuss the Dallas Public Library's experience with launching the BiblioWeb website management system. BiblioWeb is one component of a suite of services provided by BiblioCommons. The library currently uses the BiblioCore catalog and the BiblioApp. BiblioWeb would provide stronger integration of these services, improved customer experience and a stronger focus and presentation of library events and collections.

On October 21, Mr. Laun attended a City HR focus group for Professional Employees, on the subject of the City's total compensation package. The results of that discussion, and talks with similar focus groups, will help the Human Resources department to create a survey for City staff concerning compensation and various ways to change or improve what the City offers.

On October 25, Mr. Spana, Mr. Laun and Digital Library Services Specialist Brian Douglass met with Mr. Williams to discuss increased use of UTMs (urchin tracking module) within Google Analytics to produce a better understanding of the reach and success of Library marketing campaigns.

On October 28, Mr. Spana joined colleagues from the Library and ITSD to plan for a test of a fail-over network connection for library branches. When fully implemented, the fail-over network will provide an alternative to the main network connection in the event of its failure and mitigate any interruption to library services during such an event.

On October 29, Mr. Spana met with the incident report system team (a joint Library/ITSD endeavor) to discuss the findings from the first round of user acceptance testing of the new system.

During the month of October, the Digital Services Info Team reached 327 staff users and had a very active month with 160 posts, 1,342 replies, 239 mentions, and 1,180 reactions. The Digital Services team also responded to 215 internal chat requests and 285 tickets from staff..

LITTLE READ WAGON

October saw Little Read Wagon (LRW) staff return to in-person services, while maintaining virtual program offerings as health metrics began to drastically improve. The 2021-2022 early childhood training highlighted Landa Branch Library on October 2 and Collins Garden Branch Library on October 23. Early childhood teachers and families joined the Saturday virtual workshops and were invited to play on the branch library grounds the following day, Sunday. LRW used open ended play materials and captured images of children of all ages with them, from toddlers to ten-year olds, playing independently and together. A StoryWalk® is set up too and the current title is *Wonder Walkers* by Micha Archer.

As a component of the Saturday *Hello from the Library* training, LRW staff created videos of featured branches as an invitation to visit. Michelle Rickman created a video of LEARN services, how to check out a book from a child's perspective and an invitation directly to Spanish speakers from Ana Menchaca. These videos will help those unfamiliar with libraries, providing a visual of what to expect and what they will experience. Feedback from participants is overwhelmingly positive and LRW is tweaking the dates so that virtual workshops are followed a week later by outdoor play and both events will be on a Saturday.

LRW staff represented the library at large community events. Staff prepared giveaway materials for 500 Avance Dia de la familia participants and delivered them so that Avance staff could distribute items. Clair Larkin and Julia Lazarin met with Pre-K 4 SA families on Saturday, October 9 at Wolff Stadium to celebrate their Family Reunion. Ms. Lazarin created a two-sided map that featured library branches with or adjacent to playgrounds and included a scavenger hunt. Over 200 families were delighted to see these maps and stated that having this information will definitely entice them to visit. Children's librarians have requested copies for giving away to library patrons and at outreach events.

A number of early literacy workshops were presented throughout the month. Ms. Lazarin presented virtually at two Pre-K 4 SA sessions and held one in-person workshops at Knox Early Childhood Center. Eva Banda joined Ms. Lazarin to provide two workshop opportunities for Pre-K 4 SA Spanish speaking families. Megan Cruz presented at Gonzales Early Childhood Center. For any event that occurred online, books, bedtime routine charts and library information were delivered post-presentation. Ms. Cruz visited teen parents in-person at Southwest High School, Ms. Larkin visited teen parents virtually at Navarro Academy, while Ms. Banda presented Story Time virtually to children at Navarro Learning Center.

LRW staff presented a virtual workshop titled "Mirrors, Windows and Doors: Cultivating Identity-Affirming Libraries" at the Texas Library Association's District 10 conference. This workshop was similar to the series that LRW offered to San Antonio Public Library staff and hope to offer again in the near future. The topic also has ties to the certification in Trauma-Informed, Resilient Community training that Ms. Larkin and Ms. Lazarin are pursuing.

LRW loaned the *Wonder Walkers* Storywalk® to the San Antonio River Authority Foundation for display at this year's Pollinator Festival on October 16. The StoryWalk® was displayed along the river trail at Confluence Park. Numerous requests have come in for more StoryWalk® displays at locations throughout the city. A number of possibilities are under consideration to continue providing this popular service.



CHILDREN’S (SYSTEM-WIDE)

In October the Children’s Services team welcomed two new colleagues: Dawn Zeig (Potranco) and Cheryl Penick (Thousand Oaks). Both are new to the San Antonio Public Library (SAPL). Zeig and Penick quickly began to get to know their children’s services colleagues by signing on to Zoom programs and reaching out with questions. Several team members appeared in an Employee Spotlight video which was shared as part of the City Manager’s Report at a recent City Council meeting. Julia Lazarin, Ana Menchaca, and Shannon Seglin were interviewed for the feature.

On October 13, for the first time since February 2020, the children’s librarians met in person. Parks and Recreation permitted use of the clubhouse at Roosevelt Park for the occasion, allowing for ample indoor and outdoor space in a lovely setting. Fred Cardenas of Family Service made a brief presentation to the group about his organization and the resources available to support children and families for free or on a sliding scale. He led the group through a discussion on adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and how community supports such as public libraries contribute to resilience.

With the improvement in community health conditions, children’s librarians eagerly began offering outdoor programs for families and children of various ages. The initial programs were held at the Johnston, San Pedro, Collins Garden, and Landa Branch Libraries, with more programs in the works for November. In most cases, children’s librarians worked in pairs or small groups to provide ideas and on-hand support for each other.

A group of youth librarians from the region, extending to New Braunfels, Seguin, and Boerne, met October 28 at the Mammen Family Public Library in Bulverde. Coordinator of Children’s Services, Cresencia Huff, represented SAPL at the gathering on the patio of the recently renovated facility. The group shared updates on their respective libraries and enjoyed a tour of the beautiful host library.

The children’s Take-and-Make kit for October-November focused on sensory art. The kits included a large sheet of watercolor paper, tea bag, clothespin, and suggestions for how to use the tea bag plus water to

create colorful designs. Using multiple senses, in this case sight, touch, and smell, facilitates learning and brain development in a fun and creative way.

District 10 of the Texas Library Association and Council of Research and Academic Libraries (CORAL) held a joint conference via Zoom on October 29. The conference theme, Mission Critical, emphasized the importance of representation, student voice, and freedom to read. The inspiring keynote was presented by Cicely Lewis, School Library Journal 2020 School Librarian of the Year. Lewis encouraged librarians to share beyond the classics, look for books that will widen horizons and encourage readers to take action in their communities. SAPL was well-represented with attendees and presenters for three sessions plus a lunch time game of trivia. Cresencia Huff, as District 10 chair-elect, moderated multiple sessions and assisted with conference planning.



TEENS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

Virtual Teen Programs and Activities — The 210teenlibrary Discord workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and consisting of Teen Services Librarians and Liaisons from around the system, worked with off-site teen volunteers (“Teen Mods”) to host weekly virtual teen programs (“clubs”) on Discord (“the server”) along with additional activities and events. Several new teen suggestions appeared on the server, including an official introductions channel, a place to chat about school-related topics, and channels to discuss wild animals and share fun quizzes. Teens continued to use the server to make connections with teens throughout the city and meaningfully interact with one another through clubs, activities, and conversations on the server. To celebrate Halloween, teens had the opportunity to participate in a virtual costume contest on the server. Teens were able to submit up to two entries for the contest, and entries could be photos or drawings of their own costume or their pet’s costumes. Over the course of the month, teens used the server to chat about their costume ideas, share tips and tricks for costume making, and discuss Halloween plans. Overall, teens submitted 15 entries of their own costumes and 6 entries of their pet’s costumes, with 47 votes from teens determining the winners.

For the 210teenlibrary Instagram page, Regina Almanza (Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central) has been creating graphics and videos for posts and stories. These items include teen interest content and highlight celebratory events, such as booklists, and including recipe posts for Halloween featuring teen volunteer Kaylee. Regina will also evaluate teen-created content for posting as well.

Ciana Flores (Library Assistant PT, Teen Library @ Central) continues to engage with teens via the 210teenlibrary Instagram page. Ciana takes both teen and staff content and presents it as posts and stories, as well as creating indirect programming. She continues to participate in Instagram Live videos with Teen Library staff. Ciana has continued to respond to the 3D printing requests from teens on the Discord server. She prints and sends the requested item out to the teens’ preferred library branch for pick up. Ciana also records and submits all monthly statistics associated with the 210teenlibrary Instagram account.

Amisarahi Sarabia (SAPL’s Teen Outreach Specialist) shares teen-created Spotify playlists on the 210teenlibrary Instagram account weekly and creates weekly Instagram Spotify questions with which teens interact. Amisarahi also joins Matthew to host Music Mondays on the 210teenlibrary Discord server in which teens stream their favorite songs and artists while chatting with friends on the server.

Kathleen Fordyce (Manager, Teen Library @ Central) joins Connie Hejl (Teen Services Librarian, Las Palmas) Thursdays on Discord to host the “Random Fandom” club, where teens engage in discussions about different fandoms that interest them and stream their favorite anime shows. Kathleen also continues to serve as a member of the SAPL Incident Reporting Database committee, Teen Services Discord team, and the YA Nonfiction workgroup.

Virtual Teen Content and Resources — The 210teenlibrary Instagram workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza and consisting of Amisarahi Sarabia, Ciana Flores, and Regina Almanza, shared information, resources, activities, and other content for teens on Instagram, created by teen volunteers and Teen Services staff. Teen-created content highlights include how to bleach Halloween shirts, monster face pies, Halloween cookie pops, DIY jar lanterns, and smoky pumpkin deviled eggs, as well as self-care ideas. Teen volunteers also provided daily celebrations (such as “Make a Difference Day,” “National Dessert Day,” and “International Sloth Day”), music playlists (such as “Lo-Fi Study Music” and “Head Bopping Electronic Music”) and other relevant/helpful information through Instagram Stories. Teen Services staff also contributed additional content such as a fall book list, a highlight of Jesse Treviño’s art at the Central Library for Hispanic Heritage Month, and interactive Instagram Stories that focused on pop culture topics and events.

Teen Pride – The Teen Pride workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza and consisting of Chris Castillo (Teen Services Librarian I, Great Northwest), Dacari Lambert (Teen Services Librarian I, Schaefer) and Shannan Prukop (Teen Services Librarian II, Carver), met with Giselle Weyte (Design Communications Coordinator) and Joshua Linares (Graphic Designer) over the past few months to design two new Teen Pride bookmarks for teens – one that highlights Fiesta Youth’s recent donation of LGBTQ+ young adult books and another that expresses the safe spaces that exist for teens at the San Antonio Public Library. With the start of LGBTQ+ History Month in October, these new bookmarks were sent to each library location to hand out to teens and display in their teen spaces. The workgroup also hosted a virtual screening on the 210teenlibrary Discord Server to celebrate LGBTQ+ History Month and the Halloween season.

ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

In October, the San Antonio Public Library recognized National Disability Awareness Month. This recognition included two online programs. The first was hosted on October 20th and was presented by the organization Guide Dogs of Texas. Participants had the opportunity to learn how a professionally bred, raised, trained and personally matched certified guide dog from this organization increases freedom, mobility and independence for Texans age 17 and up impacted by blindness. The second online program, hosted on October 26th and presented by Professor John Cage from the Dept. of American Sign Language and Interpreter Training at San Antonio College, provided participants the opportunity to learn about the various aspects of Deaf Culture including social beliefs, behaviors, art, literary traditions, history, values, and shared institutions of communities that are influenced by deafness, and use sign languages as the main means of communication. Other opportunities facilitated by the Library in recognition of National Disability Awareness Month included the curation of online resources and booklists via a LibGuide, and a Take-and-Make kit distributed at all Library locations.

Halloween was also celebrated by the San Antonio Public Library in October. Opportunities for adults throughout the month were organized under the theme Library Stories to Tell in The Dark. A wide variety of opportunities, both in person and online, were offered. One highlight was the series Screening Screams, which involved a series of showings of horror films that were offered in person at a variety of library locations. As another in person opportunity for film fans, the ongoing program Cinema Terrible was offered in person for the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic moved this program online and featured a showing of the public domain cult classic horror film “Horror Express.” In addition to these in person opportunities, many online opportunities for adults to celebrate Halloween were offered, including a video featuring interviews of unexplained, possibly paranormal, experiences staff have had while working at Library locations, online scavenger hunts and a costume contest, and online zines featuring spooky occurrences and locations in San Antonio.

Two virtual programs were hosted in October to highlight and serve the needs of the LGBTQIA+ community. The first was a trivia program hosted in partnership on October 15th with Pride Center San Antonio to highlight October as LGBTQIA+ History Month. Participants had the opportunity to test their knowledge of LGBTQIA history, pop culture, terminology and more. The second program provided individuals who identify as TGI (transgender, gender diverse or intersex) with information to guide and empower them during the job search process - specifically in preparing for job interviews.

CENTRAL LIBRARY

CHILDREN @ CENTRAL



Shannon Seglin, Central Children's Dept. Assistant Manager, was featured along with two other SAPL Children's specialists, in an Employee Spotlight video which aired at a City Council Meeting. She was filmed conducting a live virtual Story Time and interviewed about her role as a Children's Librarian. Ms. Seglin received many compliments about this video, including praise from the Library Director himself.

Ms. Seglin was integral to the presentation of an exciting in-person outdoor program for children at the neighboring San Pedro Branch Library. She worked closely with Karen Braeuler, Children's Librarian II at San Pedro, to develop and lead a Halloween-themed yoga program for families. Librarian Ashley Stubbs also conducted an in-person Story Time this month. She read stories to toddlers at the Central Christian Day School outdoors near their playground.

Both Librarians were very active in virtual programming. Ms. Seglin presented several live virtual Toddler Time and Story Time programs. She also participated in a virtual LEGO Club program. Ms. Stubbs presented several live online Story Time programs as well. She supported the Tiny Tots and Story Time weekly programs by maintaining their "Books We Love" section of the LibGuide and their curated online programs. She also produced a Story Time video for SAPL's YouTube page and recorded a Dial A Story reading as well.

Central Children's staff continued to develop outreach connections with area child care centers. Ms. Seglin held a live virtual Story Time for children at Madison Square Child Development Center and delivered books in support of their curriculum. Ms. Stubbs made similar book deliveries to Central Christian Day School. Ms. Seglin also partnered with Little Read Wagon to share library resources with parents at Upbring Head Start Preschool in a virtual presentation.

TEEN LIBRARY @ CENTRAL

The Teen Library is now accessible to teens and for safety reasons during construction, Teen Library staff are accompanying teens from the Central Interim space up to the third floor. Teens are able to use computers in the Teen Library, browse the collection, use craft supplies, play video games, and use select music instruments and the 3D printer. Teens that have not been able to visit the space since before the pandemic are excited to return, and new teens are discovering their Teen Library.

Staff provided several tours of the Teen Library to high school classes from schools in Central Library's service area to spread the word about the Teen Library opening. Teen Library staff spoke with over 350 students from Fox Tech and CAST Tech High Schools over several days about the resources and activities available for them in the Teen Library, as well as homework help from Brainfuse, opportunities for earning volunteer service hours and free afterschool snacks provided by the SA Food Bank.

REFERENCE

In the month of October members of the Halloween Initiative worked on several systemwide projects. Contributions included the "Library Stories to Tell in the Dark" LibGuide (created by Michelle Villarreal and Melissa Gomez), a digital and print coloring book (illustrated by Brianna Glass), a spooky scavenger hunt (created by Melissa Gomez), digital zines (created by Michelle Villarreal), a spooky film of staff recollections of experiences with the unexplained (Lead editor and Cinematographer: J.D. Elizondo, acting and assistance: Michelle Villarreal, Brianna Glass and members of the Teen department), and a virtual costume contest (created by several members of the Halloween Initiative).

Julia Selwyn and Michelle Villarreal created systemwide Omingo training for our new Incident Report database. The training will be rolled out to San Antonio Public Library staff in November and December.

On October 6th, Pannaga Prasad and Jordan Torres hosted an online session entitled "Classical Dance Performance: Bharatanatyam" over the library Zoom online platform as an art and culture theme. This session was offered by Kaveri Natya Yoga Dance Group organization. Pannaga Prasad also hosted "Beginner's Chair Yoga Class" (Oct 8 and Oct 22), "Discover Self-Care Through Ayurveda" (October 13th), and "How to Maintain Healthy Skin Through Application of Skin Products to Achieve Better Skin Results (October 23th) with her branch partners.

On October 15th, the Central Library hosted a LGBTQIA+ trivia night on Zoom in partnership with Pride Center San Antonio in honor of Queer History Month. The Pride Center provided prizes for the top three scorers. There were five attendees, and they commented on how much they appreciated the library putting on the program and the facts learned during the game.

On October 20th from 6-7 pm, Cynthia "Cindy" de León and Blanca Silvia Hernandez offered a Disability Awareness program, "Meet the Guide Dogs of Texas" on Zoom. It was presented by The Guide Dogs of Texas, Inc's Director of Development, Dr. Carol Ann Tonn and Marketing Manager Reina Gonzales from The Guide Dogs of Texas, Inc. (GDTX.) Participants learned how GDTX professionally breeds, raises, trains and personally matches certified guide dogs with Texans age 17 and up impacted by blindness. Participants also listened to a firsthand account of how life-changing a guide dog has been from a GDTX client and had the opportunity to meet two guide dogs in training, Luke and Laura.

On October 26th, from 6-7 pm Cynthia "Cindy" de León and Blanca Silvia Hernandez offered a Disability Awareness program, " Deaf Culture 101" on Zoom. It was presented by John Cage, Assistant Professor

of American Sign Language (ASL) at San Antonio College and his interpreters Susan Leonard and Grantham Woods. Mr. Cage taught participants ASL vocabulary related to libraries, and discussed various aspects of Deaf Culture including social beliefs, and behaviors. He even told some jokes that included ASL puns. Mr. Cage also answered many questions from the audience after the presentation.

On October 26th, the Central Library hosted a Zoom program about job interviewing as a transgender, gender diverse, and intersex person. The presenter was Sydney Rogers who is the Training & Education Manager for TransCanWork, Inc., a California based nonprofit that advocates for workplace equity. The San Antonio Gender Association and Pride Center San Antonio partnered with the library to promote the program. There were nine attendees, and there was active engagement during the program with attendees asking questions throughout the program. TransCanWork has other workshops available that Central would like to host, but will have to wait until additional grants are found to provide funds.

On October 26th, Lorin Flores and Joseph Gonzales hosted the first in-person Cinema Terrible since 2020. The film shown was "Horror Express," a public domain cult classic horror film starring Peter Cushing, Christopher Lee, and Telly Savalas.

On October 29th, Lorin Flores and Michael Dunbar-Rodney from Central were invited to give their presentation "Alternatives To Zoom: Twitch & Discord" at the Texas Library Association D10 conference. They were joined by Edward Mayberry from the Thousand Oaks branch. There were 18 attendees for the online presentation which contained updated information from its first iteration presented at the American Library Association online conference in 2020.

LATINO COLLECTION & RESOURCE CENTER

María Amparo Escandón, #1 Los Angeles Times bestselling author of "Esperanza's Box of Saints," presented her newest book, "L.A. Weather," with an Author Talk in Spanish on October 5 and in English on October 12. Escandón discussed the cultural influences in her work and the process of bilingual writing, as she explained she thinks in Spanish and writes in English.

On October 12, the LCRC presented the film "Moebius," preceded by the short "La luna y el colibrí" as part of the Latinx Film Festival "Raza Cósmica," organized by MonteVideo Productions and co-sponsored by the LCRC. Renowned Argentinian filmmaker Gustavo Mosquera, director of the classic masterpiece "Moebius" and local filmmaker Luis Puente participated in a Director's Talk after the film and responded to audience questions. On October 14, the LCRC presented the film "Children of Men" at Art Pace as part of the film festival as well. The events were held in Spanish and highlighted in local publications such as The Current.

Interim Program Manager Emily Flores continues to offer English classes, lead an English Conversation Group and co-teach an English as a Second Language Book Club. During the month of October, a large selection of both Spanish and LCRC Collection books were put on offer to the public in the temporary space in an effort to better serve diverse community needs and interests.

In celebration of October being Family History Month, Library Assistant Clarissa Chavira, Librarian I's Andy Crews and Sylvia Reyna and Librarian II's Deborah Countess and Matt De Waelsche visited nine branch libraries to share their knowledge and bring awareness to the genealogy resources available through the library that can help people uncover their past. With funding provided by the San Antonio Public Library Foundation, staff developed a "Take-and-Make" craft involving a way for families to record important celebration dates. The custom designed Family Celebrations Calendar Board was created as a colorful and unique way for families to keep track of not just birthdays, but also anniversaries and other celebratory dates that beg to be remembered. The kits were distributed at Brook Hollow, Cody, Cortez, Igo, Pan Am, Parman, Pruitt, Schaefer and Thousand Oaks and included all the necessary supplies families would need to complete the craft and then hang the calendar for everyone to enjoy.

Ms. Reyna was interviewed on October 15 about her encounters and memories working with the late John Igo. The interview, conducted by University of Texas at San Antonio marketing students, was one of several planned for inclusion in a memorial video about Mr. Igo being presented in December at the Igo Library.

On October 22, Mr. De Waelsche was interviewed by a Chicago National Public Radio reporter regarding the local "Ghost Tracks" legend that has persisted here in San Antonio for decades and which apparently mirrors an urban legend there in Chicago. Chicago's ghost crossing is almost identical and the reporter contacted Express-News columnist Paula Allen who informed him of a discovery Mr. De Waelsche had made several years ago. The research discovery proved that in 1938 a train did hit a stalled school bus, but in Salt Lake City, Utah, not San Antonio or Chicago. The Utah accident, which claimed the lives of 26 people, was front-page news, both here in the San Antonio newspapers, as well as in the Chicago Tribune.

The Texana/Genealogy Department was invited by the San Antonio Public Library Foundation (SAPLF) to staff a display table at the 2021 Catrina Ball on October 23. Haley Holmes, Public Services Administrator for the Central Library attended the event to represent the department. The display highlighted three areas of public interest: (1) Texana and Genealogy Collections at the Central Library; (2) the 2017 Texana Bond Project; and (3) The Winds and Words of War traveling exhibitions, 2008-2019.

BRANCH LOCATIONS

BAZAN

The Bazan branch was a host site for the *Chalk It Up!* festival on October 9 which included two feature artists who created original large-scale murals on the theme of *The Spirit of San Antonio*. The public was also invited to participate and create their own smaller scale works of art. The event attracted many individuals and families who filled the shaded sidewalk in front of the library with a beautiful array of characters and colors.

The *Bazan branch Virtual Bazan Book Club* met in October to read *Practical Magic* by Alice Hoffman. The book was published in 1995 and later made into a movie. The group fell head over heels for the witchy drama and discovered that the book and movie versions were very different. The book group loved it so much that they made plans to include the *Practical Magic* series in their reading list for 2022. It was the perfect read for the Halloween season.

The *Teen Gaming Club*, hosted by Teen Librarian Georgina Garcia, saw an increase in teen participation over the past few weeks. Several teens showed initiative with creating and sharing with the group. One young game designer showed everyone how to create and manipulate sprites and volunteered to create a custom game prompting interaction between other participants. One regular was inspired to create a trivia game on Kahoot about music in video games. *Gaming Club's* teen-mod, an Esports player, dedicated his time to coach teens on how to improve their gameplay with Valorant, a free online PC game. Various teens shared that their schools take video gaming seriously by sponsoring Esports clubs and participation in UIL Esports.

Teen Librarian Georgina Garcia alongside Teen Librarian from the Pan American branch Cassie Garza offered teens resources for internship opportunities with video game developing companies, and most importantly cultivated a positive outlook with gaming.

Ms. Garcia attended National Night Out at Lanier High School with Teen Librarian Cassie Garza. The event was well attended and most, if not all of the people visiting the library booth were teens. Ms. Garcia was equipped with resources to share with teens about volunteering, Homework Help, and online teen programming. Teens left with free comic books, summer teen shirts, and teen Take-and-Make kits. One of the teens took the time to share her interest in poetry and recited two poems with the Teen Librarians. Ms. Garcia gave her reading recommendations based on her writing style.

The Esports Committee hosted another Animal Crossing program on October 29. The program featured a Halloween themed obstacle course and guests participated in a costume contest. Library Assistant at Mission Mari Castellano and Ms. Garcia facilitated the event.

BROOK HOLLOW

Brook Hollow Library (BHL) hosted Bexar County Joint Constitutional Amendment, General, Special and Bond Elections, Early Voting, October 18-29 and Election Day, November 2, 2021. BHL & Manager Jeannette Davies hosted City of San Antonio (COSA) Councilperson John Courage Friday, November 6,

2021 from 10-12 pm as he met with constituents. Davies toured the library with the councilperson and discussed future needs for the facility. CPS Energy and San Antonio Water System (SAWS) were on site as well. Davies hosted Noon Time Helping of Cooking Halloween Madness in SAPL's Virtual Kitchen, October 14, 28, @ noon, featuring Halloween treats including donut hole, pretzel and tootsie pop ghosts; mini-dirt cups and candy corn concoctions. Davies completed Employee Performance Evaluations for employees at Brook Hollow and some from the Collins Garden Libraries. Davies also attended the San Antonio Public Library Foundation's (SAPLF) Catrina Ball at the Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center in October and in November the Texas Library Association's (TLA) District 10 Social at The Good Kind Southtown.

Adults: Brook Hollow Library Adult Services Librarian Marco De Leon attended REFORMA's National Conference V11 in November. REFORMA is the National Associate to Promote Library and Information Services to Latinos and Spanish-Speaking. De Leon continues to host two popular virtual programs and manages three in-person and hybrid book clubs. In October, the Among Us and Spyfall virtual programs had full attendance. De Leon hosted The Mystery Book and The La Tertulia Book Clubs and De Leon continues to co-host the Science Fiction & Fantasy Book Club as a hybrid meeting with some members virtually and those who meet in-person at the Potranco Branch Library. BHL Mystery Book Club read *Nobody's Sweetheart Now* by Maggie Robinson, The La Tertulia Book Club read *Los Niños Del Verano* by Dot Hutchison and the Science Fiction & Fantasy Book Club read *City of Brass* by S.A. Chakraborty.

Children: In October, Brook Hollow Library Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas and Children's Librarian Valerie Carroll from the Semmes Library presented two virtual outreaches to discuss library services with the parents of Eisenhower and Driscoll Middle School students. Salinas also helped set up, clean up, and facilitate at the Landa Boo in-person Halloween event where ninety-five children attended with their grown-ups. Salinas and Library Assistant Jennifer Olivarez developed two spooky-themed Scavenger Hunts for BHL families to enjoy doing together in the children's area. Olivarez also created an iSpy table game for families to do together when visiting. Circulation staff at BHL distributed more than sixty Hispanic Heritage and Nature Rubbing Take-and-Make craft kits for children provided by SAPL Children's Services. Salinas participated in creating content for Game Time Online; Baby Time Online; Tweens Play Among Us; and Lego Time Online. She hosted Zoom meetings for Art Club Online and Read to a Dog Online. Salinas converted the long-time in-person Read to a Dog program into a virtual program and continues to lead the group of Children's Librarians that help to facilitate the program twice a month. The Read to A Dog Online program was featured in the Government and Public Affairs video in October, and the program received 3,299 total engagement interactions on the SAPL's Facebook account. Salinas also wrote a book review for the SAPL Children's blog found on the SAPL Children's Services webpage and edited video content created for toddlers for the mySAPL YouTube Channel.

Teens: Teen Librarian Julia Pouliot continues to co-host Music Mondays, a music program for teens on the 210teenlibrary Discord. Pouliot and her fellow host serve as moderators as teens choose their own music to share while typing to each other about their interests, and sharing stories of what they have been up to throughout the week. Recently teens got creative sharing the music they grew up listening to. Pouliot visited Coker Elementary School for literacy night in October. She was stationed at a table outside the library where she interacted with students and parents informing them on all the updated offerings at Brook Hollow Library and online across the San Antonio Public Libraries. Pouliot handed out information about the new library hours, online academic help for students, and buttons and pencils to promote community engagement. Pouliot is looking forward to once again hosting Teen Time in person starting November 9, 2021. Teens are encouraged to meet up in person to play games, craft, and hang out in the Brook Hollow Library meeting room.

CARVER

Carver branch has continued to facilitate opportunities for seniors in its service area to keep fit. Two programs drew fitness minded individuals to its mat and chair yoga venues. Mat yoga attracted modest attendance with enthusiastic participants in October. However, chair yoga attracted nearly 20 participants during the same month.

For parents seeking to build stronger relationships with their LGBTQ children, the branch invited author-pediatrician Uchenna Lizmay Ume to offer them support and guidance. Ume, also known as Dr. Lulu, is the author of several books, *How to Raise Well Rounded Children*, *How to Teach Your Children about Racism* and *A Teen's Life*. Parents were able to ask questions and discuss their experiences. One audience member traveled from the Houston area to attend.

A program proposal submitted by Carver Branch's Teen II Librarian Shannan Prukop and Matthew Loaiza of Central Library, also a Teen II Librarian, was accepted for the LibLearnX virtual conference sponsored by the American Library Association. The event will be held January 21-24, 2024. Their session is entitled "A Virtual Place of their Own: Providing Radical Teen Services on Discord." According to Teen Services Coordinator Jennifer Velasquez, the program "will highlight the ground-breaking efforts made by SAPL Teen Services to swiftly develop and evolve online communities for teens during the pandemic -- services that have become a best-practice and have fundamentally shifted our approach to teen participation and engagement."

In October, the LEARN Center was used by 33 individual patrons for a total of 86 sessions. Each month there have been more patrons and more sessions, demonstrating that the Carver LEARN Center is being utilized increasingly.

Forty-two sessions were dedicated to improving computer skills, twenty sessions were dedicated to job search, job applications and job-related activities, and fourteen sessions were dedicated to submitting government forms.

One patron completed the Digital Inclusion program and received her certificate in October and was expected to begin working on her second certificate.

A new Learn Spanish 1 course began in October with a total of thirteen new students. Four students advanced from Learn Spanish 2 to the Learn Spanish 3 class. Four students completed Learn Spanish 3 and are requesting a fourth course. Each Learn Spanish class meets twice a week on Zoom.

The Training Officer also held the Film Noir Club's monthly meeting. There is a steady participation of about ten patrons in this club. The club was expected to celebrate its one year anniversary in November.

Teen Librarian Shannan Prukop transferred from Johnston to Carver branch in mid-September, taking on the role of assistant branch manager as well as Teen Librarian II. Mx. Prukop attended Big Texas Comic Con with Rhonda Woolhouse on October 10th as part of the Pop Culture Committee, providing Take-and-Make crafts for kids and information for adults about the library and its services. On October 13th, Mx. Prukop and Daniella Toll switched roles in the Dungeons & Dragons program for teens, with Prukop leading and Toll observing. While furniture continues to arrive for the renovated teen space, Mx. Prukop worked to update the teen collection and make sure teens feel welcome in the library.

CODY

The Cody Branch Library served as an early voting polling site for the Joint Constitutional Amendment, from October 18 to 29, and an election date site as well, on November 2.

Library Assistants Luanne Bloom and Angela Olivarez continue to engage the staff in Wellness activities, twice a month. Luanne also represented the San Antonio Public Library at the District 8 Resource Fair, held at the University United Methodist Church on October 19.

Children's Librarian Kristin Yourdon presented during Story Time Online on October 7th. Yourdon read an interactive story called *The Hungry Bunny* by Claudia Rueda and had children complete several actions with scarves or blankets to go along with the story. Yourdon then sang an action song about the leaves changing colors, and taught the children an action rhyme called *Pumpkin, Pumpkin* that teaches about how pumpkins grow from seeds.

Yourdon and Library Assistant Haly LeFlore continued to offer weekly scavenger hunts in the children's area. For the first week, Yourdon created a Fall Leaves scavenger hunt in which children had to find 10 different leaves and then do a leaf rubbing on their paper with crayon to reveal a secret message. The second week, LeFlore set out a Disney Buddies scavenger hunt. Children had to match characters from the same Disney movies and then find them in the children's section.



For the third week, Yourdon set out a paper lantern scavenger hunt. Children had to find eight paper lanterns hanging in the children's section, with a letter hanging from it. Children had to put each letter on their answer sheet to reveal a secret message. Finally, during the last week in October, Yourdon and LeFlore set up a Pumpkin Patch scavenger hunt. Children had to follow the pictures of hay bales through the library, complete actions like tiptoe past pictures of ghosts, and draw the faces of 11 unique jack-o'-lanterns hidden along the route.

Yourdon put together Take-and-Make kits during the month of October, including a Fall Leaf kit which children could use to make their own colorful trees out of brown construction paper and small squares of tissue paper in various fall colors. There was also a Jack-O'-Lantern Playdough kit which included black beans, googly eyes, straws, and construction paper to make a jack-o'-lantern.

In October, Teen Librarian Amy Rae Weaver continued to ramp up services for both Teens and Adults at the Cody Library. Adults had numerous opportunities to try out new crafts, both in the library and outside it. Amy Rae worked with Debbie Countess to set up a Family History Month tabling event on October 9, featuring a Take-and-Make Family Calendar craft to help keep track of important events like birthdays. Other Take-and-Make crafts available at the Cody Library during October included the last of the mason jar papercrafts, papel picado décor for Día de los Muertos, bat brooches for Halloween, and hand-lettering kits. Starting on October 18, crafty adults could also participate in Cody's new Fiber Club, where they met weekly on Monday evenings to practice and share their fiber arts skills, with library assistant Haly LeFlore.

Teen Time came back in a big way, starting on October 12th. Teens expressed their identities and exercised their creative sides by designing and assembling their own pins. Since it was the day after National Coming Out Day, LGBTQ+ identities were on attendees' minds, and they chose to create preferred pronouns and flag pins in addition to other designs. On October 19th, they learned some basic jewelry-making skills when they used Shrinky Dinks to create their own keychains – and used lateral

thinking to solve problems that arose! For October 26th, to celebrate the spooky season, they designed their own ceramic skull banks. One teen decorated theirs to give as a gift!

Teens who didn't have the time to hang out could also take home multiple activity kits designed to celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month as well as prepare for Día de los Muertos. By making a Libro de las Calaveras, teens could create a skull-shaped book to write memories, poetry, or whatever else appealed to them, while a hojalata-inspired picture frame could be used for photos of loved ones who have passed.

COLLINS GARDEN



The Collins Garden Branch served as an early voting location from October 18 to October 29, for the Joint Constitutional Amendment, General, Special Bond Elections.

Teen Services Librarian Daniella Toll onboarded a new enthusiastic volunteer at the branch. For the Off-site Teen Volunteers, Ms. Toll answered questions and assisted 11 teens with volunteer applications on the 210teenlibrary Discord server, Instagram and Spotify platforms. In the month of October, the 9 active teen volunteers donated over 75 hours by creating content for the 210teenlibrary Instagram account, curating playlists for their peers and acting as Teen Moderators and Club Assistants on the 210 Teen Library server. On October 5, Ms. Toll assisted with the Older Adult Device lending program at the Normoyle Community Center, creating library cards and checking out iPads to seniors. On October 9, she hosted the 210teenlibrary Teen Moderator meeting and discussed roles and objectives for the coming month. Ms. Toll assisted Teen Services Librarian Shannan Prukop with a weekly teen program on the 210teenlibrary Discord server - Dungeons and Dragons. A total of 14 teens attended the October Wednesday clubs with the teen-requested theme of spooky stories.

Children's Librarian Gina Brudi attended, "Hello from the Library-Building Community Connection" workshop hosted by Little Read Wagon on October 23rd. She answered questions from participants, read a story and presented the rhyme, Two Little Black Bats. On Sunday September 24th the first Play & Learn at the Collins Garden Library took place in the green space area behind the library in conjunction with Little Read Wagon. Children engaged in free play with balls, buckets, cardboard boxes, sidewalk chalk and foam building materials. Each child received a free book to take home. As part of the Babies and Toddlers work group Ms. Brudi engaged young children via Zoom with stories and rhymes. She continued her online Story Time outreach with Knox Early Education Center with books, rhymes and songs. Ms.

Brudi assisted at the Baby Boo event at Landa Library on October 26th. She facilitated the monthly Collins Garden Adult Book Club. The group read **Calypso** by David Sedaris.

Ms. Lea Ann presented a live interactive Art Club Online Zoom program on October 14. Ms. Lea Ann showed a variety of techniques to use oil pastels, chalk pastels, and chalk on black paper to create original artworks

GREAT NORTHWEST

Great Northwest Branch Library Children's librarian Cari Raley sent the Explorers@Home on a trip to Italy this month. This month's theme was mainly focused around food. The families made their own chef's hat to wear while cooking some great Italian food at home. They learned an Italian folk dance and painted their own version of the Mona Lisa. The ABC Club@Home has completed exploring the alphabet! They will get to take a short break before starting up again.

During October, Teen librarian Chris Castillo facilitated four virtual Teen programs on the 210teenlibrary Discord server. In Teen Time, teens expressed displeasure about the volume of their school assignments, suggested scary movies to watch in preparation for Halloween, and a teen promoted their teen-led video game training camp about the video game title *Valorant*.

Teen Time and Create Club switched days during October. In Create Club, teens proudly shared a wide array of creative works ranging from artworks created for a virtual health competition, their own programmed video games, creative cake baking for class, cosplay progress, musical compositions, and CAD robot designs. The support that teens give each other encourages a wide variety of creative expression throughout the server, not solely exclusive to Create Club.

The Teen Pride committee planned, promoted, and screened the film *Paranorman* on the 210TeenLibrary Discord server.

Teens suggested Discord server improvements including new role designations for a teen's home branch, #wildanimals, #quizzes, #school, and #introductions. Teens submitted requests for free 3d printing, custom buttons, and magnets services, and picked them up from the branch.

In support of the Latino Resource Collection's Hispanic Heritage Month programming, Castillo facilitated a film screening outreach at *Raza C3smica: A Constellation of Classic and Contemporary Latinx Science Fiction*. In collaboration with MonteVideo and Presa House Gallery, this event was hosted at Artpace. Local director Grace Goen provided the audience with an introduction of her short film.

Adult Services librarian Stephanie Vazquez created a Craft Demo video on Halloween crafts for the San Antonio Public Library's YouTube channel. Ms. Vazquez also created and distributed Optical Illusion and Halloween Origami Take-and-Make kits for October. Great Northwest Library partnered with the Parks and Recreation Department and offered a Fitness in the Park program at the library on October 7 and 14.

She was the host of Story Time Online Oct. 14 and on Oct. 28 she presented pumpkin-themed songs and rhymes for the pre-school kids. LEGO Club Online is every other Tuesday afternoon for school-age kids, and Leslie was the host for each program and presented the free building challenge to the kids each program in October. During the program, the kids are given five building challenges and have five minutes to use their imaginations to create something that they can share with the group when time is up. Leslie also participated in her first Game Time Online program on

Oct. 21. She led the kids in a fun drawing challenge where the kids had to draw scenes given by Leslie, but the catch was that the paper was on their heads.

Passive programming also took place at the branch during October. Toward the end of October, kids were given sidewalk chalk and were encouraged to be creative and draw on the Schaefer sidewalks. They also had the opportunity to decorate pumpkins made out of construction paper to tape to a pumpkin patch in the children's area of the library.

Leslie is also the co-lead of the Summer 2022 committee and weekly meetings and preparations are underway.

This month Library Assistant BlancaSilvia Hernandez:

Published a Spotify Halloween themed playlist and a curated BiblioCommons list for Schaefer's I ♥ Vinyl monthly program. Schaefer staff contributed their favorite spooky music to share with patrons.

She created a Disability Awareness Stress Ball Take-and-Make for site-wide distribution to patrons and featured local and national events promoting Disability Awareness in the Disability Resources LibGuide. Dacari continues to work with teen services colleagues to meet the needs of teens across San Antonio with modified services and programming. Weather*, and assisting in the viewing of "*Children of Men*" for the Raza C6smica Film Screening and Director Introduction. Teen patrons have been steadily returning to Westfall to study in groups and spend time in the Teen Space. Ms. Merino helped create book displays for *Dia de Los Muertos* and *Spooky Stories*. She also filled in as LIC at the Carver Library on Saturday, October 2nd. Ms. Merino visited Nimitz Middle School at the request of the

school librarian and brought out informational pamphlets and flyers about San Antonio Public Library services. Because the Nimitz Librarian asked about digital resources, SAPL Children's Services and Marketing worked together to create a digital flyer that could be sent out to schools. This will be a very helpful tool in helping to support students and their parents, of which Ms. Merino was happy to be a part.








FY 2022 to date Items Borrowed




FY 2022 to date Library Visits




