VISION

The Mexican American Civil Rights Institute envisions communities where all Americans are inspired by the Mexican American civil rights legacy and see themselves as participants and transformational leaders in the ongoing struggle for social justice, inclusion, and equity.





GUIDING PRINCIPLES AND BELIEFS

Civil rights are an expansive and significant set of rights designed to protect individuals from unfair treatment. For the Mexican American community, they are the rights of individuals to receive equal treatment and be free from discrimination including in the areas of education, employment, voting, housing, public accommodations, immigration, economic opportunity, as well as on the basis of race, ethnicity, nationality, gender, sexuality, and more. We strongly believe that all individuals should be treated with dignity and respect and are part of our common humanity.

- <u>Our roots are in San Antonio and South Texas</u>—San Antonio and the South Texas region are the birthplace of numerous significant Mexican American social justice organizations, leaders, and historic events that have shaped the history of civil rights in the United States.
- MACRI continues the legacy of Mexican American social justice activism and advocacy— We believe knowledge of our civil rights history inspires action to advance social justice, amplify voices, and enhance the quality of life of individuals, families and communities.

- Mexican American civil rights history is ongoing, dynamic, and exceedingly relevant— Telling and retelling our history of Mexican American civil rights has the power to transform our collective consciousness, lived experience, identity, resilience, and selfdetermination, now and into the future.

MACRI Talks: Free virtual talks on Mexican American civil rights history and current civil and human rights issues featuring nationally recognized scholars, leaders, and activists.

<u>Digital Archive</u>: A digital archive focused on Mexican American civil rights history materials, including:

- An oral history initiative to document first-hand stories of Mexican American civil rights efforts, and
- A digital archive portal that will connect our new digital archive collection to

 Mexican American civil rights-related holdings at existing digital collections around the country.

Exhibitions: Engaging and informative exhibitions on Mexican American civil rights topics. A digital exhibition on the history of Mexican American civil rights in San Antonio and South Texas will launch online in August 2021. A touring version of the exhibit will launch in Fall 2021.
